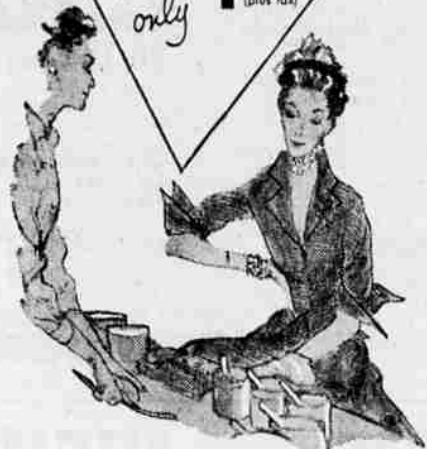

Sen. Morse Raps Press Handling Of Steel Dispute

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Morse (R-Ore.) said Tuesday national reporting of the steel dispute ignored "the seriousness of the situation" when President Truman seized the steel industry and concentrated instead on "the political overtones."

Morse, who has backed up the seizure from the start, said he considers this "one of the saddest failures of American journalism in my recollection." He added:

"In this instance, I think the press, radio and television failed to meet their public trust. They are all tarred with the same brush."

Morse made his comments at a Senate Labor subcommittee's hearings on a bill he is sponsoring to authorize seizure of defense plants. Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) was "shocked and amazed" because he the only other senator present and he chimed in with some comments of his own.

"shocked and amazed" because he had not seen any newspaper account of testimony Secretary of Defense Lovett gave to this subcommittee on April 24 about the importance of steel to defense.

Charge Is Refuted
(The Associated Press quoted Lovett on that date as saying any prolonged stoppage of steel production "could result in tragedy and disaster"; that "a sudden and large-scale resumption of combat in Korea may occur at any time," and that he did not see how any President "in a critical time such as this could allow a major stoppage of steel" but that the Defense Department had no opinion on the methods Truman used.)

(Lovett was quoted in a general AP story on the steel situation. The story was widely published by AP member newspapers.)

Morse said "much of the newspaper comment seemed to follow remarkably the content of full-page ads, for and by the steel companies."

He went on to say that conventions of newspaper editors and publishers adopted resolutions condemning the steel seizure last month but Morse said neither of the groups made any effort to investigate the facts in the dispute.

Secretary of Labor Tobin, who was in the witness chair, put in:

"Every contention you make in this situation is borne out by the facts."

On April 24, the American Newspaper Publishers Association, meeting in New York, adopted a resolution censuring Truman's seizure of the steel industry and saying it would "resist and defeat" any seizure move against the press by any President.

Salem Newspaper Plans \$300,000 Home

SALEM (AP) — A new \$300,000 building is to be built for the Oregon Statesman in downtown Salem. Publisher Charles A. Sprague said Wednesday.

A contract has been signed for the L-shaped structure with Viesko and Post, Salem contractors, and work will begin in a few days, Sprague said. It will be completed in about eight months.

The one-story building with basement at North Church and Chokecheta Sts. will have some 28,000 feet of space—more than double the space in the present plant which has been occupied for 34 years.

SPOT ADVICE

SOFT DRINK & ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE STAINS

With warm weather approaching, there's hardly a family in the land that won't be drinking either soft drinks or alcoholic drinks of some kind.

From the standpoint of clothes, and the inevitable spilling and staining, a few words to the wise can help avoid serious consequences.

SOFT DRINKS. All of the common soft drinks, such as the colas, root-beer, ginger ale, and "pop" fall into the category of the "tannin-like" stains. This means, of course, that stains caused by soft drinks are often invisible until heat is applied. Then the characteristic brown stain appears—fixed for good.

The same suggestions apply here that do for all "tannin-like" stains. If the garment is washable, sponge it out with clear water only. NEVER USE SOAP. And don't iron until absolutely sure all of the soft drink is out.

If the garment is a dry cleanable one, DO NOTHING. No rubbing or wiping. And if you'll tell us where the stain is when you bring the garment in, we'll give it the special treatment such stains require. And don't let the garment sit around in the closet. Moths just love stains.

ALCOHOLIC DRINKS. In general, the same precaution should be followed as with soft drinks. The one exception is that alcohol frequently causes dyes to bleed off. There is, fortunately, no real remedy for this.

And so it follows that, with washable garments, you may take immediate emergency treatment yourself. Naturally, the sooner after staining you do, the better.

With dry cleanable garments we recommend that you immediately bring them in for cleaning.

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Higher Wages Or Strike, Steel Union's Edict

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The CIO Steelworkers Wednesday unanimously agreed to close the nation's steel mills in a new strike if industry fails to grant promptly a satisfactory wage increase.

The 2,500 delegates to the sixth biennial convention rose and shouted approval of the resolution.

The convention turned into a mass demonstration.

Delegates swarmed over the speaker's platform shaking President Philip Murray's hand, yelling, shouting, tossing confetti and shooting off fire-crackers.

The huge convention hall was a bedlam for a full 10 minutes after Murray asked the delegates to rise in support of the resolution that demanded "the crisis in the steel industry must be promptly resolved."

In the demonstration, the shouting whistling, cheering delegates chanted, "no contract, no work."

Want '52' Wages
"We cannot and will not continue indefinitely to work in 1952 for 1950 wages and working conditions."

"We cannot and will not continue indefinitely to work without satisfactory collective bargaining contracts."

"We re-emphasized the position we expressed at our special convention in January."

"We re-emphasized our determination to achieve our goal. Our cause is just. We ask only that which is our due. We ask for no more. We will take no less."

The rank and file steelworkers stirred up talk of a new steel strike before and after an address by Secretary of Labor Maurice Tobin, who told the convention he supported them in their demand for a wage increase.

Discussion of the resolution took up most of the day's session as delegates after delegate took the floor and demanded that America's steelmakers sign a new contract based on the recommendations of the Wage Stabilization Board.

Tobin told the steelworkers he stands "heart and soul and spirit" behind them in their fight for more pay.

Michigan Woods Face Invasion Of Caterpillars

HIBBING, Minn. (AP) — Billions of leaf-eating forest tent caterpillars are stripping many trees in 11 million acres of Northern Minnesota in the greatest infestation by the pest on record, state entomologists said Friday.

The hairy, slate-colored worms, about an inch long, are swarming over unprotected leafy trees in such numbers that branches appear like squirming lengths of rope.

In several instances, armies of caterpillars have crawled over roofs, causing locomotives to lose traction and halt.

They are expected to become a highway traffic hazard when they reach their full growth in a week or so.

Housewives sometimes find their washing hung out of doors covered with the hungry worms moving from tree to tree.

Sometimes masses of worms several inches deep have to be shoveled from thresholds of homes in heavily-wooded areas.

Despite their uncouth numbers and hearty appetites, the caterpillars cause little permanent damage to trees, T. L. Aamodt, state entomologist, said.

The principal municipalities and summer resorts in the infested area have been sprayed with DDT—all but knocking out the worms.

Some large pythons attain the length of 30 feet.

Sawyer Asks Airport Money

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer asked Congress Friday for authority to make federal grants during the year beginning July 1 for work on 140 airport projects to cost about 27 million dollars.

The federal government will provide approximately half the cost of each and local sponsors the rest.

Sawyer said in a letter to Congress the projects should be undertaken in the coming year, or in the year beginning July 1, 1954 if not possible earlier.

The projects proposed by the civil aeronautics Administration include:

Medford — Municipal airport, \$52,194, acquisition of land and completion of terminal building.

Pendleton — Pendleton airport, \$29,221, completion of terminal building.

Portland — International airport, \$422,560, construction of apron, taxiways service building for interim use as terminal and development of new terminal area.
