Class Divisions For Swim Pool Courses Listed

It won't be long now! The 1952 municipal swimming pool at Rose School, S. Jackson at Hayes St. will open for the 1952 season on Monday, June 2, Lyle Eddy, Douglas County chapter Red Cross water safety chairman, announces. Eddy simultaneously revealed dates for the Red Cross swimming class program for both children and adults.

"The Red Cross swimming program for beginners, intermediates, swimmers, and junior and senior life-saving will start Monday, June 16 at the Roseburg municipal swimming pool," Eddy stated. "The pool will be open to the public from 1 to 9 p.m. Starting June 16 it will remain open until 10 p.m. The season will close about Sept. 1, he said, depending upon weather conditions.

The fee scale for the public will be 25 cents for adults and 10 cents for children. There is to be no charge for the Red Cross swimming classes, however. Suits and towels may be rented for a small fee. Eddy emphasized that state law requires swimmers to wear bathing caps.

"Classes for instruction will run from 10 a.m. to 12 noon, Monday through Friday, for a two-week training period. Cards will be given to all who pass the various tests. Beginning swimmers must have been in school this last school year," said Eddy.

"Instruction in adult swimming will be given from 12 noon to 1 p.m. if enough are registered," he explained. "A possible later class in the evening will be held if there is enough demand."

Swimming classes will run until Aug. 9. "Those who are not able to advance fast enough to pass in a two-week period will still have necessary instruction so they will be able to improve with individual practice," Eddy said.

Class tests will be given each Friday. Interested persons are asked to register at the Red Cross office by calling either 33255 or 36181, Mrs. R. E. Herman, Roseburg chapter executive secretary, reported. "It is necessary to have registrations in early order that class rolls may be prepared at least a week prior to the opening of instruction. Notification of class time and dates for swimmers will be announced later," she said.

Korean Guerrillas Raid Army Camp Deal Death

trucks came back." If the guerrillas suffered any casualties, they carried them back into the hills less than an hour after the attack began.

Camp Found In Flames

The fighting was heard at U.N. hospital for prisoners of war. A jeepload of Americans and South Korean police, summoned by one of the two uninjured survivors, arrived at the burning camp at 2 a. m.

They found bodies scattered over a wide area.

Two wounded Americans and two dead soldiers were in the area about the tent. The Korean house-boy had been flung over an embankment onto the dry creek bed.

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—Communist truce negotiators Tuesday made a veiled threat of a Red offensive as Korea armistice talks resumed after a three-day recess—but immediately bogged down over the prisoner of war issue.

The prisoner issue alone blocks an armistice. The Reds demand return of all their captured soldiers. The United Nations command says not a single captured Red will be forced to return against his will.

Umpqua Bowmen Win At Eugene

A group of archers, members of the local Umpqua Bowmen club, invaded Eugene last Sunday to participate in the Cascadian Bowmen's annual Invitational Shoot.

The shooting started at 9:30 in the morning with activities centered on the American Round for men, the Columbia Round for women and the Junior American Round for juniors. A special event was held involving the peewees.

The Roseburg contingent managed to garner their share of the laurels. Kathryn Ulrich and Elaine Foster came home with second and third places respectively. In the women's round, while Dorothy Ballou took fourth place honors in the Junior Round, Ruth Digby and Verna Hinds were awarded prize money.

In the afternoon the field archers came into their own on a newly constructed 28 target course set up in Hendricks Park. This proved to be a most difficult course and was laid out through the woods. It had many angle shots of uphill-downhill, across ravines and under overhanging boughs of trees. For example, one shot of approximately 65 yards, was from the top of a motorcycle hill climb site to the bottom. Cyclists are not the only ones able to slide down a steep hill.

On the field course, the only Umpqua Bowman able to land in the money was Ruth Digby. First place, Archer Class, Women's Field Round, was the reading on her award after traversing the course. Those attending the shoot were Larry and Ruth Digby, Earl and Kathryn Ulrich, Verna and Harold Hinds, Ann and Al Holt, George and Elaine Foster, Kenneth and Myrtle Eberhard, Floyd Ward, Leon Snell and several offspring.

The next event on the calendar is the local club's first shoot to be held at the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club grounds on Memorial Day. Events will include target shooting, roving course and the clout. Arrows are scheduled to start flying at 10 a. m. and to continue until well into the afternoon. Prizes will be offered for the various events and the public is cordially invited to come out and spend the day.

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Power Saw Link With Fires Under Forestry Study

Douglas County is included in a study of causes for forest fires in connection with the use of the power saw, according to Fred Southwick, Douglas District fire warden.

In charge of the study is D. D. Robinson, of the Oregon State College Forestry Department.

Local reports of fires will be made to the Douglas Forest Protective Assn. office, Southwick said. Logging operators are being asked such questions as date, time and location of the fire; make and mode of the power saw; how the fire started, such as back fire, spilled fuel or exhaust, and how the fire was extinguished.

Southwick asked cooperation of loggers in reporting such fires to the DFP office whether they develop into big fires or not. Information on the larger fires will be reported by the DFP office, but many of the smaller fires start and are put out without ever being reported.

"Those are the ones we want to know about," the fire warden said.

Thus far Douglas County has had only one fire this year, covering some 35 acres on Canyon Mountain near Myrtle Creek. During the same period last year, some 260 acres had been burned—all in a single forest fire starting April 10, 1951.

DFP fire lookouts are expected to man their posts by June 16 and remain throughout the summer. Lookouts in the Umpqua National Forest will go on the job later.

A new lookout tower, combining replacement of the destroyed Lander's Lookout and the Baughman Lookout, will be constructed next month about a half-mile north and east of the site of the Baughman Lookout, Southwick said. Construction is expected to start June 10.

Lander's Lookout was destroyed last summer in the southward sweep of the 17,000-acre Hubbard Creek fire.

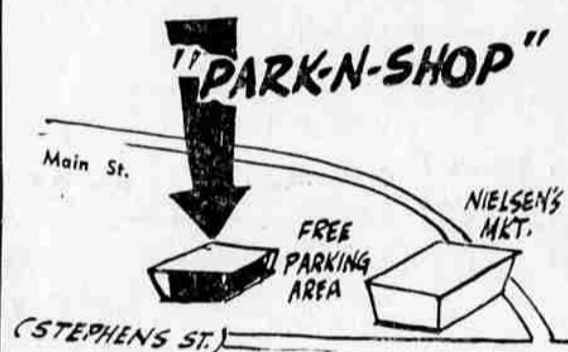
Douglas County Shows Heavy Payroll Boost

Douglas County's payrolls last year totaled \$54,608,517, 20 times the amount reported in 1938, 1939 or 1940, according to figures released by the State Unemployment Commission.

Two-thirds of the total county payroll last year was in the timber industry, the report said.

The rapid rise in the total payroll for the county is shown in the report which sets the total for 1947 at \$27,230,764 and \$46,473,780 in 1950.

Douglas is one of five counties in the select \$50 million payroll group. Other counties with payrolls topping \$50 million are Coos, Marion, Multnomah and Lane.
