Gideon Teams Visit Roseburg Churches Sunday

The state convention of the Oregon State Gideons, Christian business men's organization, was concluded Sunday afternoon, May 25, at the First Christian Church. The convention opened Saturday evening with a dinner-rally at the Umpqua Hotel.

Sunday morning five teams of Gideons, led by Harry Reher of Forest Grove, state president, visited Roseburg churches and presented talks and testimonies. At the afternoon report dinner each team related experiences at each of the churches, including the donations made for the Gideon Bible program. Roseburg churches donated \$325.25 according to Ralph Arnsmeier, treasurer. "This amount will buy 1000 New Testaments," Elward Smith, head of the 15-man Roseburg Gideon camp, reported.

Teams visited the Conservative Baptist Church, First Methodist Church, Green Community Church, North Roseburg Church and Church of the Open Bible. North Roseburg Church reported the largest per capita offering, averaging over one dollar each.

State President Reher, speaking at the Open Bible church, explained the humble beginning of the Gideons about 53 years ago when two Christians accidentally met in a rowdy Eastern hotel. He recounted how a Gideon Bible he found in a hotel room saved him from a wrecked life and turned him to Christianity. Indicating the broad scope of the Gideon Bible program, Reher said that a total of 23 million Bibles and testaments have been distributed in hotels, schoolrooms and in service camps.

Smith said that 82 state Gideons and auxiliary members from Medford to Portland attended the Saturday banquet.

The local work of the Gideons, he explained, is to place Bibles in the hands of all school students as well as school rooms. The Douglas County program was started about five years ago. They started by distributing Bibles among high school seniors and gradually worked down to the fifth grade. Smith said almost every teacher cooperated with the Bible program.

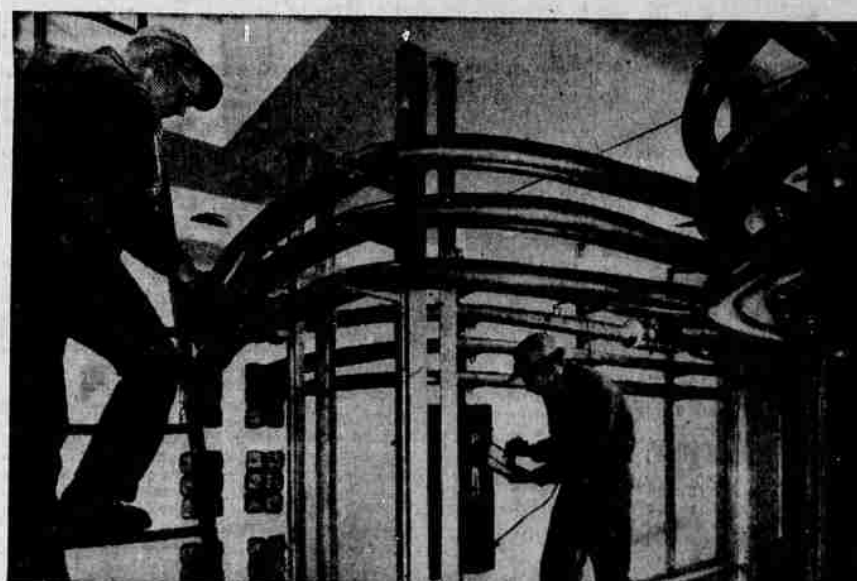
