

100 To Enter Roseburg Golf Meet

State's Best Golfers Due Here Friday

Somewhere between 70 and 100 of the state's best golfers will swarm onto the Roseburg Country Club course this weekend for the fifth annual Roseburg Invitational Golf Meet.

Starting Friday, the golfers will tour an 18-hole route in the qualifying rounds. Match play will get underway Saturday at 8 a. m. and the finals will be played off Sunday. Beside a trophy for the medalist, others will go to the winners and runners-up in each flight.

According to Meet Chairman Lee Wimberly, a host of top flight dividers will be on hand from Eugene, Portland, Medford, Coos Bay and Grants Pass.

Leading the list of tee artists will be Lou Stafford, who defends the invitational title he won at the last Roseburg meet. The ex-University of Oregon star now performs as a member of the Alderwood Country Club of Portland. He won the invitational when it was last held, in 1950, and age appears to have improved him. He is fresh from a one-stroke victory in the Rose City amateur championships at Portland. He posted a 212 over a 54-hole round Sunday. He will reign as favorite to pick up the Roseburg laurels again this year.

Stafford has plenty of competition, however. Back again this year is a two-time winner of the invitational named Eddie Simmons. The Medford ace won the meet in 1947 and 1948. He will be joined by Benny Hughes of Portland, who was a runner-up in the National Public Links tournament. The junior star of the meet will probably be Jerry Hval. He was a former pupil of Fred Hill, the Roseburg Country Club professional. While in Portland, Hill guided Hval to the boy's state championship.

Wimberly stated that the public is welcome to witness probably the best golf play this year, so a big gallery should be on hand.

Aiding Wimberly on the Meet committee are: Norm Sefarth, Dr. Ralph Huestis and Roger Gee.

1,651 Tee Artists Vie In U.S. Open

NEW YORK (U.S.) — Some 1,651 golfers will try to qualify for the U. S. Open golf championship next Monday, and when the close to 60,000 holes have been played, only two players in 15 will make the grade.

Nine hundred professionals, 795 amateurs and two applicants for reinstatement to amateur status made up the original record breaking field for the annual 72-hole grind, to be played this year at the Northwood Club, Dallas, Tex., June 12-14.

This group which topped the former record of 1,511 applications turned in last year, was cut by 17 in the Hawaiian qualification tests earlier this week, and 29 players are exempt from sectional qualifying.

Irish Murphy Knocks Out Reuben Jones In Fourth

TOLEDO, O. (U.S.) — Irish Bob Murphy of Denver felled Reuben Jones three times Tuesday night before knocking him out at two minutes and 45 seconds of the fourth round.

Murphy weighed 177 1/2 to 180 for the New York fighter in the scheduled 10-rounder before 4,000 fans.

Eight First-Year Drivers In Race

INDIANAPOLIS (U.S.) — Eight first-year men and 25 Indianapolis Motor Speedway veterans who will drive in the 500-mile auto race Friday had their last chance to practice Wednesday.

The two and one-half mile track will be closed Thursday for its pre-race cleaning.

The odds are against any one of the freshmen winning the race.

Only five first-year men — including Ray Harroun in the first race in 1911 — have done it. The last was George Souders, in 1927 — 25 years ago.

The odds also are against the pole position winner — this year Fred Agabashian in the Cummins Diesel Special. Only four winners

in 35 races have gone from the pole to victory — the last being the late Floyd Roberts in 1938.

Neither the driver nor the car of the 1951 winning combination will be back to defend the 500-mile record of 126.244 miles an hour. The driver, Lee Wallard, has not fully recovered from burns suffered in an accident at Reading, Pa., four days after the 500. Tony Bettenhausen cracked up the car in a qualification attempt last Saturday.

The only former champion in the lineup is Johnny Parsons, winner of the rain-shortened 1950. He will be in the Jim Robbins Special, the car in which he won two years ago.

The Scherner-Smith Motors was the thriller of the day as the Scherners dominated the first three innings and then spent the rest of the game fighting off the hopped-up losers. After a first-inning tie at 1-1, Scherner's went hit happy in the second to fashion the makings of a rout. Combining three walks with five hits including a triple by Les Winders, Scherner's moved off to a 9-2 lead. They added two more runs in the third on three hits, one of which was a booming triple by Don Hagedorn. This raised the score to 11-2, but the battle had just begun.

Ward walloped Ireland's S. B. Williamson, 6 and 4. McHale took a 4 and 3 decision from a young Scottish rival, Reid Jack.

Exhibition Ban For PCL Stays

LOS ANGELES (U.S.) — The Pacific Coast Baseball League's ban against all exhibitions in its parks for seven days prior to the opening of the 1953 season still stands, but it is anyone's guess as to whether the PCL ban against Major League teams playing each other in its parks will remain on the books.

PCL directors met all-day Tuesday and the main announcement was to "reiterate" the policy, adopted March 18, forbidding either majors or PCL teams from exhibitions in the PCL parks just before the season opens.

President Clarence Rowland said he will attend a meeting of Major League schedule makers in the east later this year. But he declined to elaborate on the "reiteration" announcement.

Maglie Does It Again To Nip Dodgers

If Brooklyn is distressed blame it on New York's Salvatore Maglie.

His dreaded curve ball, cutting the corner as sharp as a razor, Sal (The Barber) Maglie treated the Dodgers to one of his copyrighted clippings Tuesday night as he pitched the Giants to a 3-0 triumph.

The righthander was in an especially clip-happy mood. He not only strangled the Brooks with four meager hits but cut down six of them via strikeouts. Sal's earned run percentage is now 1.14.

Maglie's was not the only outstanding pitching performance Tuesday. Allie Reynolds of no-hit fame yielded only two safeties as he hurled the New York Yankees to a 7-2 victory over the Washington Senators. Both came in the fourth inning and accounted for the Nats' tallies.

Washington remained in a tie for second with Boston still two and a half games off the American League pace when both Cleveland and the Red Sox were beaten. Vic Wertz's three-run homer climaxed a six-run sixth inning outburst by Detroit to give the Tigers a 5-4 decision over the Indians.

Gus Zernial's two-run homer in the fifth and Eddie Joost's two-run double in the ninth gave rookie Harry Byrd his first win and the Philadelphia Athletics a 7-3 triumph over the Red Sox.

Saul Rogovin pitched the Chicago White Sox to a six-hit 3-0 victory over the St. Louis Browns.

Enos Slaughter rapped four hits including a home run and Stan Musial also came through with a four-bagger to lead the St. Louis Cardinals to an 8-5 win over the Chicago Cubs. Gerry Staley coasted to his eighth mound success.

Eddie Pellagrini, inserted at first base because of a recurrence of a shoulder injury to Hank Edwards, banged a 14th inning home run to give the Cincinnati Reds a 5-4 victory over Pittsburgh.

Boston's Braves and Philadelphia's Phils split a two-night doubleheader. Three singles and an infield out gave the Braves two runs in the 12th and a 4-2 opening game win. A triple by Del Ennis and Willie Jones fly gave the Phils a 5-4 second game triumph in the 10th.

Drain Coach To Resign Position

Another of Douglas County's fluid coaching population has announced his intentions of pulling up stakes this year.

He is Drain's Art Vermint, who took over the basketball and baseball reins at Drain Union High in 1951. The former all-state basketball player came to Douglas County in early 1951 to replace Bill Chatham, who quit to go into private business. Johnny Lindell, once a long ball hitter with the New York Yankees, now is a long ball hitter for the Hollywood Stars. But better than that, he's throwing a knuckle ball that makes him one of the Pacific Coast League's better pitchers.

Lindell racked up his seventh win of the season, against three losses, Tuesday night, beating Oakland 5-4. In other games Los Angeles downed San Francisco 6-4, Seattle nipped Sacramento 2-1, and San Diego squeezed by Portland 9-8.

Lindell gave up 10 hits but was responsible for only two scores. Actually, it was more a case of the Oaks losing than the Stars winning. The decider came with two out in the ninth inning when Ted Beard romped home from sec-

ond as infielder Hank Schenz beat e Mike Sandlock's bounce to the right side of the diamond.

Seattle hurler Al Widmar won his own game, restraining the Solons by yielding only seven hits and then batting in both the Rainier counters. The win boosted Seattle out of the cellar and dropped the Sacramento club into it.

It was sixth straight wins for San Diego. There was plenty of hitting in the game—24 all told, with winners slamming 10 and Portland 14.

The lead changed hands several times. The Padres pushed across the winning margin in the seventh. Whitey Wietelmann reached first when hit by the pitcher. He stole second, advanced to third on a fly and scored the winning tally on Frank Kerr's infield hit.

OSC Wins Pennant As Idaho Batter Knocks Out Huskies

MOSCOW, Idaho (U.S.) — An Idaho batter who had been to the plate only three times in the season cost Washington's Huskies the Northern Division baseball pennant Tuesday and sent Oregon State against Southern California for the Pacific Coast Conference crown.

Dick Merrill, sent in as a pinch-hitter with none out in the ninth, rapped out a double that scored the tying and winning runs as the cellar-dwelling Vandals edged Washington 9-8.

That made Washington and Oregon State Northern Division champions. However, the Beavers were named to play Southern California for the Coast champion-

ship on the basis of their three earlier wins over the Huskies.

The best-of-three playoff series will start at Corvallis Memorial Day. The winner will meet the winner of the Fresno State - Seattle University playoff in another series June 6-7, and that winner will represent District 8 in the NCAA championships.

CLARKSTON, Wash. (U.S.) — The scalp of Emery Zimmerman of Portland will be the chief goal of about 100 Northwest professional and amateur golfers June 8 - 10 in the annual Washington Open Golf Tournament, a \$2,000 event with \$400 more in lap prizes.

After Zimmerman defends his open title Bill Schaffer of Kelso, surprise winner in 1951, will put his state amateur crown on the firing line June 11-15.

There will be some \$750 worth of merchandise prizes for the amateur tourney and the two amateurs with low gross and low merchandise awards.

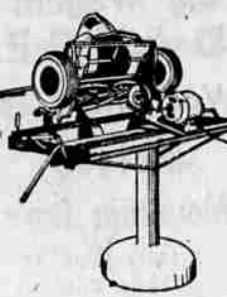
It was the fifth victory of this premier British three year old classic for the wealthy Moslem tying the winning record set by Lord Egremont between 1782 and 1828.

The course for this up and down mile and a half test was baked to concrete hardness by a blazing sun.

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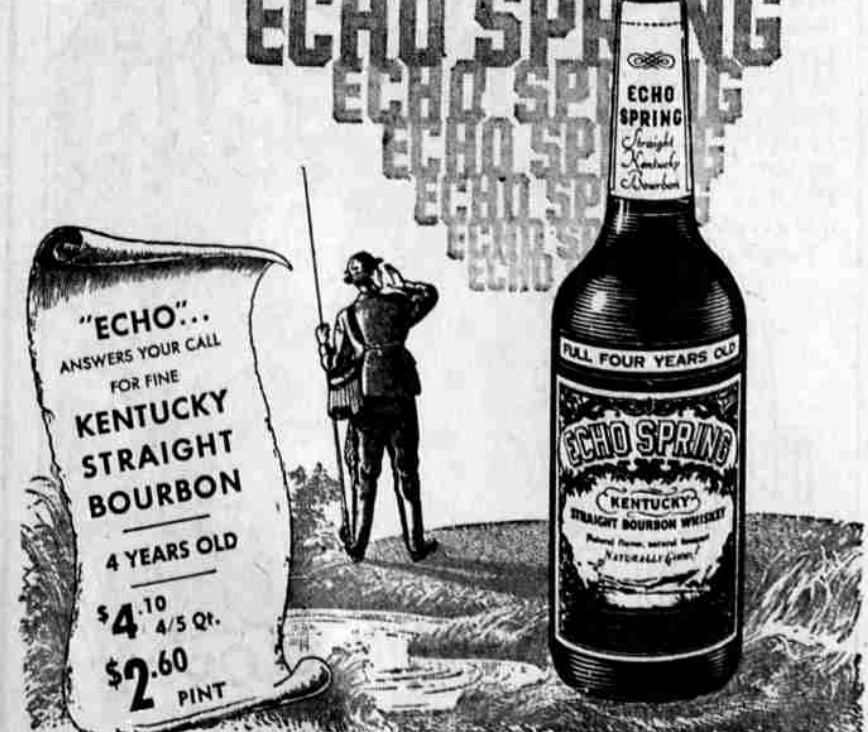
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
