2 Major Parties In Texas Split Over Delegates

Texas Republicans and Democrats alike seemed bent Tuesday on having two sets of delegates each to the presidential-nominating conventions.

In each camp—Republicans at Mineral Wells, Democrats at San Antonio—state conventions were split in two.

Backers of Gen. Eisenhower and Sen. Taft of Ohio were at loggerheads in Mineral Wells, where 38 delegates will be chosen. The San Antonio convention, to pick 52 Democratic delegates, was cleft along pro-Truman and anti-Truman lines.

Jack Porter of Houston, Eisenhower leader in Texas, scheduled a rally Tuesday. He announced that, unless delegates favorable to the General are seated at the state convention, Eisenhower forces will walk out and name their own national convention delegates.

Truman Scores Alleged Yielding To Medics' Assn.

WASHINGTON — President Truman in another speech lambasting Congress, says a lot of law-makers jump when the American Medical Association cracks the whip.

Then he added to an audience of 1,200 volunteer Veterans Administration hospital workers:

"And there are a lot of others who roll over and play dead when anybody yells socialism. After all, this is an election year."

The remarks were beamed at House rejection Monday of a bill to increase payments under old age and survivors insurance.

Sponsors said the measure sought among other things to protect social security rights of permanently disabled civilians and persons who left their jobs for military service.

The measure, at first apparently unopposed, was defeated after the American Medical Association attacked it as containing "socialized medicine" features.

Truman's speech, Wednesday night at a meeting of the National Advisory Committee of the VA Voluntary Services, continued his criticism of Congress.

He said he spoke as a veteran and for the welfare of all the people, adding:

"As I am not going to run for President any more because I want to get out and say some things and do some things that I can't say or do when I am President."

anti-Truman Democrats, held the reins at San Antonio. He favors an uninstructed delegation to the national convention.

Opposing Shivers' group is one favoring the administration, headed by Fagan Dickson, who has rented a hall for the expected walkout.

In Missouri it was all over but the ultimate balloting.

The Associated Press tabulation of nationwide delegate strength shows Taft ahead of Eisenhower 399 to 359.

Kefauver leads the field among Democrats.

Tabulation is based on concessions, instructions, pledges and avowed preferences.

Democratic nomination requires 616 votes, Republican 604.

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Ike Bids Adieu To NATO Aides

FONTAINEBLEAU, France — Gen. Eisenhower, his voice heavy with emotion, bade farewell Friday to the officers and men of NATO's central sector command, which he termed the "key field headquarters in the defense of Europe."

Some 300 officers and 700 enlisted men of six nations stood at attention in the courtyard of the one-time summer palace of French royalty, where the central sector headquarters is installed.

Eisenhower, speaking from a flag-draped platform, said in his farewell address: "It is most important that the viewpoint of every nationality should be expressed in a headquarters such as this."

He told the officers to "seek the truth — the convictions and the feelings and the emotions of your men."

Turning to the enlisted men, lined up on the greensward of the courtyard, he told them: "Do not be afraid to express your feelings, your convictions and your emotions to your officers."

He assured the headquarters personnel that "whatever I am doing and wherever I am in the coming years, the work you are doing will always be in my heart. Whatever I can do appropriately and properly to support your work I shall do."

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
