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Camas Valley To Vote On New School Levy

The local levy for the Camas Valley school budget will be voted upon on June 16, from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. standard time, at the Camas Valley School. The annual school meeting, at which a new school board member will be elected, will be held the same evening at 7:30 o'clock at the school.

The school board member election is to fill the vacancy left by Oran Standley, who is completing his three-year term in July.

The local levy is for \$13,790. This is higher than last year's budget, explains Superintendent Marlen Yoder, because three additional teachers are being hired, so there will be a teacher per grade, and also the cost of a cook and cafeteria are additional. Some repair on the old building and increase in cost of operation, also has raised the budget figures, he said.

Church Sets Ground Break; D. A. Gibbs Will Be Ordained

Highlighting a day of special services Sunday the First Christian Church will hold a special ground-breaking ceremony for its new educational building at 3 p.m. Other specials for the day include observance of Pentecost Sunday at the morning service, potluck dinner at noon, followed by a brief workers' conference, and ordination of Donald A. Gibbs in the evening worship hour at 8 o'clock.

The new education building will be constructed on the parking lot adjoining the present structure, with numerous classrooms. It will be a two-story building. Included in the program of the outdoor service is an anthem by the church choir, "Surely God Is In This Place," by Edith Lang. Jessie Crenshaw will sing, "Bless This House," with electric organ accompaniment.

Committees participating in the building program will be introduced. Clifford Baxter, Bible on the urgent need for such a structure. Archie Currier, chairman of the Elders, will speak on architectural and construction plans, and Don Reed, finance committee chairman, will speak concerning financial status and procedure.

The service will conclude with the actual turning of the sod by designated leaders of the church the singing of "Bless Be the Tie," and the benediction.

Pentecost Sunday is a special day known historically as the anniversary of the founding of the church in 30 A.D. in Jerusalem, commented Rev. R. V. Kleinfield, pastor. On that day there were 3000 charter members as a result of the sermon preached by the Apostle Peter, he said.

The morning worship service at 10:50 will feature a special number by the choir, "The Lord's Day," by Kurtz; sermon by the pastor will be on the theme, "Our Faith Tested by Patient Preparation."

The noon potluck to be held in the church basement will be for all members and friends of the congregation. The workers' conference will be for officers and teachers of the Bible School.

Ordination of Gibbs into the Christian ministry will highlight the evening service. The son of Dr. and Mrs. Donald E. Gibbs, he received his public school education in Roseburg. Since then he has taken work at Oregon State College, the University of Oregon and Northwest Christian College. He will receive his bachelor of Theology degree from the latter institution in commencement exercises in Eugene June 10.
