MR. AND MRS. WELKER ENTERTAIN PINOCCHLE CLUB SATURDAY EVENING

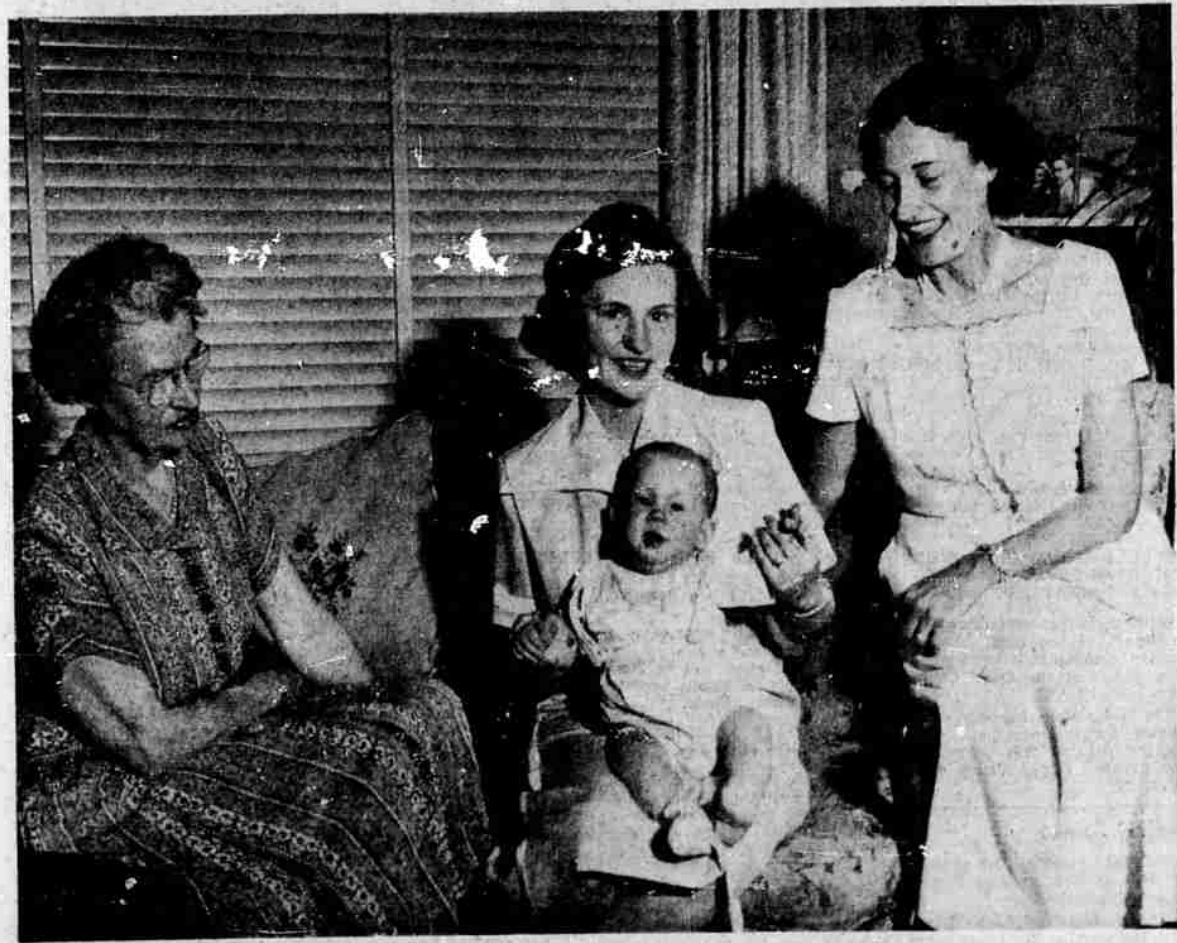
Mr. and Mrs. Walter Welker entertained their pinocchle club at their home Saturday evening. Roses formed the attractive decorations.
