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State College Slates 1952 Summer Session

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis—Courses in six different schools and divisions, including regular classes, workshops, seminars and tours, will be offered at the annual Oregon State College summer session from June 23 to August 15.

Approximately 1400 students and teachers from all sections of the United States are expected to attend the summer term, according to Dr. Franklin R. Zeran, dean of education and summer session director.

Workshops and seminars will be emphasized by several schools with concentrated two or three week sessions scheduled. These include workshops in guidance, physical education for women, business education, home economics, agricultural education, home economics and industrial arts.

The Forest Service at Tillier had a most interesting display made from a cross section of an old growth Douglas fir with the rings marked with events that happened in that year; the seedling having started in 1627 a couple of years after the huge forest fire had swept through the South Umpqua area.
