U.S. Canada Schedule

Air Defense Exercise

WASHINGTON — The first continent-wide air defense exercise for Canada and the U.S. will be held during the week of July 19, the Air Force announced Wednesday.

The exercise, designed to test all military and civilian agencies involved in air defense, will be carried out by about 250,000 persons, the Air Force said.

In addition to regular units of the Air Defense commands of Canada and the U.S., the exercise will involve civilian ground observers and the radar net which stretches across the northern perimeters of the two countries.

Deputy Warden Named For Oregon Penitentiary

SALEM — Lawrence T. O'Brien, captain of the guards at Folsom Prison in California, was appointed by the State Board of Control Thursday as deputy warden of the Oregon State Penitentiary.

He succeeds E. C. Halley, who is retiring. O'Brien has been in prison work for 16 years. He held supervisory jobs at Alcatraz Federal Prison, in San Quentin Prison, and in other federal prisons before he went to Folsom.

The warden, Virgil O'Malley, also came from California.

Hollywood took the opener 6-2 and the nightcap 11-2.

Elsewhere San Francisco copped two from Los Angeles, 8-2 and 5-4; Portland beat San Diego 4-1 then lost 3-2; Sacramento crept back into the basement, dropping two to Seattle, 7-5 and 6-3.

Fred Sanford's three-hit chugging helped Portland in the curtain raiser over the Padres. Joe Brovia homered for the Beavers in the fifth and Walt Tepton did the same in the sixth.

Jack Graham's four-bagger in the extra eighth gave San Diego the winning margin in the night cap.

San Diego took the series, 5-2. By winning both ends of a Sunday doubleheader, Seattle annexed its series with Sacramento 5-3. The Rainiers pounded Jack Pickart for five runs in the first two frames of the opener and added two more in the fourth.

The Rainiers trailed until the eighth inning of the nightcap, rallying for three runs on an error, a single, a double and a triple.

Portland Youth In Debut With Chiefs Sunday

A 17-year-old shortstop with a rifle arm made his debut before the home fans this weekend on Finlay Field.

He's John Keller, produce of Grant High School in Portland and newest protégé of Roseburg Chief Second Baseman Barney Koch. He played his first games with the Chiefs last weekend at Medford, but made his home debut against Bandon.

His success in prep baseball was sensational. He is an all-state shortstop and helped lead his Grant Generals to the state championship two years in a row. In 1950, the Generals were fourth in the regional playoffs and in 1951, they were runners-up.

Although he has collected only one hit in three games with the Chiefs, he has the potential at the plate as revealed in his .345 batting average last year. This year he has dropped off to an even .300.

His Generals were edged out in the Portland City loop this year by Roosevelt and Lincoln. Although it was a tough blow to the youngster and his teammates, it gave him a chance to get an early start with the Chiefs. He has played flawless games thus far.

Ball at the short inquis in the three 155-pound, 5-10 inch youngster doesn't limit his talents to baseball alone, however. He was both all-city and all-state in football last fall for the Generals.

Mathias Sets Two Records At Track Meet In Portland

PORTLAND — Three new records were set in the Northwest AAU Track and Field meet here Saturday and Bob Mathias of Stanford claimed two of them.

The decathlon champion in the 1948 Olympics set new marks in the discus throw and the 120-yard high hurdles. Chuck Missfeldt of Oregon set a new javelin record.

Mathias tossed the discus 161 feet 1 inch, bettering the old mark of 158 feet 8 inches set in 1946 by Bob Roiman of Oregon State. He was timed at 14.4 seconds in the high hurdles. The former record set 37 years ago was 15.2 seconds.

Mathias also won the 220-yard low hurdles in 24.3 seconds and was second in the shot put. Duane Eby was first in that event with a toss of 50 feet 2 inches.

Missfeldt broke his own javelin mark. He threw the spear 218 feet 2 inches.

Other winners were Emory Barnes, Oregon, high jump, 6 feet 2 inches; Don Pickens, unattached, broad jump 21 feet 3 inches; Bill Fell, Oregon, 100-yard dash; 9.8 seconds; Jack Hutchins, Oregon, 1:55 minutes; Pete Mundle, unattached, two-mile, 9:59.3 minutes.

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'Beat Ben Hogan' Duffers Do It

NEW YORK — Who said Ben Hogan can't be beaten?

More than 7,000 golfers, most of them just duffers or weekend golfers, can say, "I did."

Nearly all of them, however, did it with handicaps but there were a few that topped Hogan's score without a handicap. Last Saturday the national open champion turned in a par 71 at the Northwood Country Club course in Dallas, where he'll defend his title starting June 12.

A total of 7,511 of the 55,105, re-

porting in the "Beat Ben Hogan" National Golf Day Saturday, turned in better cards than the Mighty Mile from Texas.

All who participated paid an entry fee of \$1 in the event sponsored by the Professional Golfers Association and Life Magazine with all proceeds going to the national golf and USO funds.

John Haine, 79-year-old Tres Pinos, Calif., player, had the lowest. He shot a 74 and with a handicap of 14 turned in a 60. Eight-year-old Diane Wilson of Kansas City had a 117-48-60.

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SPOT ADVICE

MUSTARD & KETCHUP STAINS

There are just four things to remember about mustard and ketchup stains which will help you save the garment from unsightly brown spots.

1. If the mustard or ketchup has been spilled on a washable garment, sponge out with clear water. DO NOT USE SOAP. DO NOT ATTEMPT TO PRESS UNTIL THE STAIN HAS BEEN COMPLETELY REMOVED.

2. DO NOT, if at all possible, merely allow the stain to dry out and then let the garment hang in the closet for a long time. These stains become developed with age, and then they're harder than ever to get out. Sometimes they can't be removed at all, if the garment is not sent to the cleaner for a long time after staining.

3. If the mustard or ketchup stain has occurred on a "dry cleanable" garment, DO NOTHING. ABOVE ALL, DO NOT RUB OR WIPE IN ANY WAY. This only forces the stain into the fabric fibers and makes it more difficult to remove.

4. ALWAYS TELL US ABOUT THE STAIN. We can then employ special spotting and "spot-digesting" techniques prior to ordinary cleaning. Unless it's an extraordinarily complex procedure, there is no charge for this extra service. And you'll get your garment back in better condition.

Again, please—DON'T RUB—DON'T USE A HOT IRON—TELL US—and, if it's washable—SPONGE OUT WITH CLEAR WATER ONLY.

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
