A single, double and two walks added up to another Eagle tally in the third, but S and G tied it up again with a counter-runs in the fourth. Eagle's Fredrickson blasted a homer in the fifth to put his squad ahead for good.

That one-run margin wasn't enough, however. Two timely Eagle singles alternated with two walks added on four more runs in the sixth. Each team scored again in the final frame.

With Dillard's McLarty setting the batting pace, the Methodist squad jumped to five-run lead in the second inning and held the pace the rest of the way.

McLarty was credited with a triple, single and homer in his first trip to the plate. His triple set off the big second inning spurge that sank the Faith Lutherans.

In the third inning, he banged a two-run homer. Lutheran L. Olson also collected a homer, but it didn't count. He failed to touch second base.

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Walcott To Risk Crown On Thursday

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—Jersey Joe Walcott will battle it out to hold the world's heavyweight championship Thursday night with a much heavier — and therefore perhaps slower — Ezzard Charles than the one from whom he wrested the crown last summer.

Pre-fight optimism in Walcott's training quarters brightened a notch with the mildly flabbergasting news that Charles tipped the scales in a preliminary weigh-in and examination Monday at 196 1/2 pounds — over 14 pounds more than he carried in losing the title to Jersey Joe.

Dan Florio, Walcott's trainer, sized up the idea of a new and beefier Charles with the comment: "That's the best news we've had since we began training. Charles will be so heavy, he's sure to be slowed up."

Charles maintained the added weight is to his liking, and that he was too light and too fine against Walcott in the title go at Pittsburgh.

The former champion has two days in which to shed that five-plus poundage by official weighing in time for the battle in Philadelphia Thursday.

Walcott matched Charles' performance on the scales — But it looked better on the 38-year-old challenger, who is more than seven years Walcott's junior.

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L.A. Tabbed As Hottest PCL Team

The managers of second place Hollywood and third place Oakland agree that fourth place Los Angeles is the team to beat in the Pacific Coast League pennant race.

Fred Haney and Mel Ott aired their views after their teams came out all even at the end of an eight-game series Sunday.

"You can only judge a team off what it has showed you," said Ott. "And Los Angeles has shown the most power against us."

Haney tabbed the Angels, then added: "Oakland has a lot of power and a good bench and figures to finish right up there, as do we — if outfielders Tom Saffell and Ted Beard will hit. Don't overlook Seattle, either. They're not out of it yet."

Neither pilot mentioned San Diego, still comfortably on top of the PCL heap by a four-game margin.

The Angels and the Padres square off Tuesday night in a test of power that's bound to affect the pennant hopes of both. Hollywood hopes to fatten up on Portland, and Oakland is licking its chops over the prospect of meeting cellar-dwelling Sacramento.

Seattle entertains San Francisco in the other series.

Los Angeles, incidentally, is leading the loop in team batting at .271, followed by Hollywood and Seattle, tied at .262; San Francisco, .241; Oakland, .243; and Portland, .234.

The Angels have the top hitter among the PCL regulars, too — right hander Les Peden. His average is .321. To make it a clean sweep of the top spots, the Angels' Max West leads in the home run department with 13, even though he missed several games last week.

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Yankee Reynolds Blanks Cleveland

Apparently there is one way to overcome the jinx of pitching a no-hitter—just pitch two of them. That is the formula Allie Reynolds used last year and it has proven most successful.

Reynolds has been more effective than ever since his two masterpieces of 1951, although no-hitters seem to jinx other hurlers. The New York Yankee righthander turned in his best performance

of the season Monday, blanking the Cleveland Indians, 2-0. The victory moved the world champions into the first division.

Allie had eight strikeouts and surrendered only four hits for his ninth straight complete game. The 33-year-old righthander notched his fifth victory in a row and his sixth against three losses as he reduced his earned run percentage to a spectacular 1.35.

The defeat dropped the Indians out of the league lead as the Boston Red Sox whipped the Chicago White Sox, 6-2, to take over first place by four percentage points.

Another great righthander, Sal Maglie of the New York Giants, went down to his first defeat of the season. The St. Louis Cardinals nipped the National League titleholders, 5-4, to snap Maglie's nine-game winning streak.

The triumph, St. Louis' third straight over the Giants, boosted the Redbirds into the first division by a half game over the Cincinnati Reds, who bowed to Boston's Braves, 4-1. The defeat left the Giants still one game behind the pace — setting Brooklyn Dodgers, who were beaten, 6-1, by the surprising Chicago Cubs.

Philadelphia's rebounding Athletics landed Ned Garver his sixth straight loss. They shaded St. Louis, 2-1, to move past the Browns into sixth place.

Mickey Vernon and Frank Campos batted in two runs apiece as Washington defeated the Detroit Tigers, 5-2, to move within a game of first place in the American League.

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49th Inning Runs Give Win To Drain Sox

Roy Helsler started for the Sox, but gave the chore to his star pupil, Jerry Cade, in the seventh. Together, they allowed nine hits. Meanwhile, the Sox collected 13 off Dierickx. Storey headed the batting parade with four hits in five trips. Beard had three for four.

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
