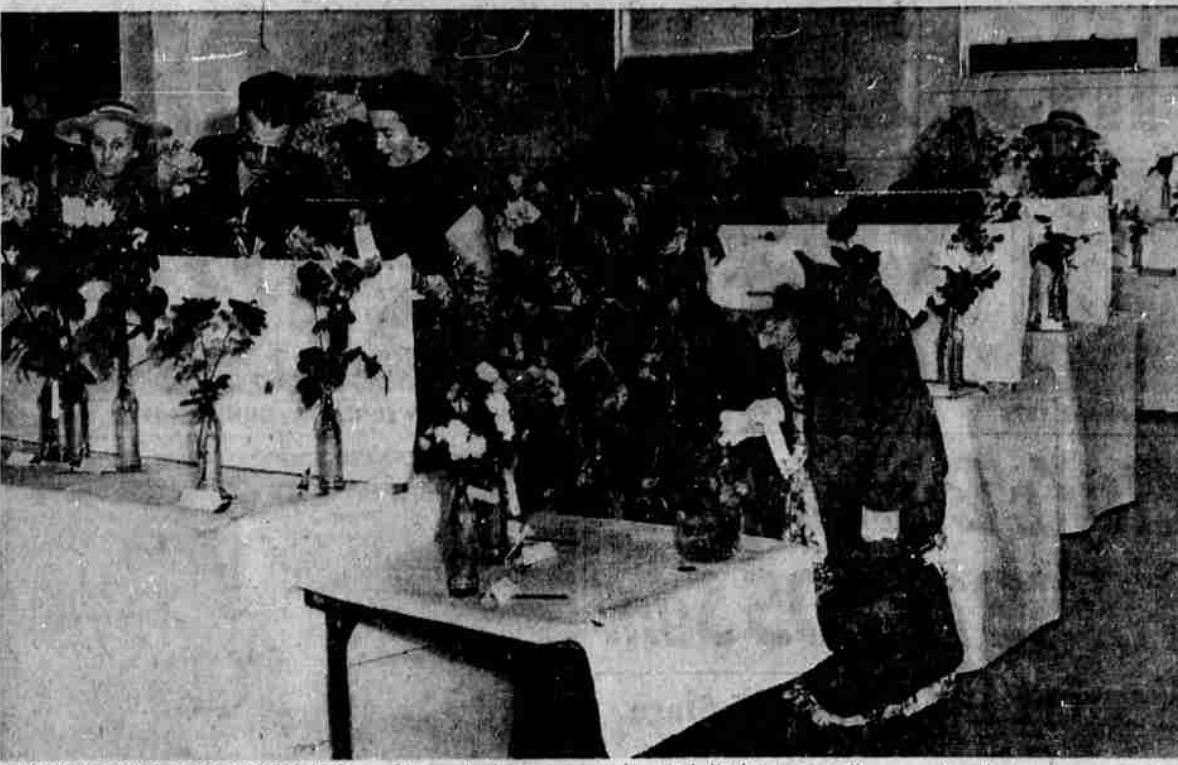
### YMCA Swim Classes Attract Youngsters

tional facilities, and it will not be used for general operating expenses. The hospital employ 71 persons, and annual expenses \$233,000 in the community, said Lyons.

**Urgent Need Stressed**  
Billard pointed out that the idea of building the Douglas Community Hospital originated with the Chamber of Commerce because the present facilities could not adequately handle the sick. That same situation is faced again today. That is why there is a plea for additional funds to build another wing.

During the 16 months the hospital has operated many people have been enabled to get far better medical treatment than if the hospital had not been built, he said. He stressed that additional beds will in effect lower the per bed operating cost, since the hospital's facilities, such as heating, general offices, cafeteria and such, are adequate to care for the proposed new wing.

McAlvin said the campaign is scheduled to start next Monday and that it will be brought to a hasty conclusion as possible. He said architects are already working on plans, and that construction should start soon after the money is available. Four to six additional employees would be needed to staff the new wing, he added.

It said the strawberry harvest will be one of Oregon's largest. Picking will get under way on a large scale Monday, with many school children starting their summer vacations by working in the fields.

Pears, cherries and other crops also will demand attention in many areas in the next few weeks.

Roseburg firemen extinguished a grass fire at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday in a vacant lot at 1818 Lane St.

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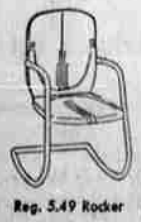
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
