

Holiday Fixing On Mondays Plan Of Motor Assn.

There'll be more long weekends, if a plan proposed by the National Association of Travel Organizations gets into effect.

A special committee of NATO is backing a plan to encourage observance of major holidays on Monday, reports Oregon State Motor Association.

According to information received at the motor club's headquarters in Portland, the committee is urging the introduction of legislation at forthcoming state legislatures to change some holidays to Monday.

Among the changes proposed by the group are these: President's Day — third Monday in February, combining the various dates observed for the birthdays of Washington, Lincoln and Jefferson; Memorial Day — last Monday in May; Independence Day — first Monday in July; Veterans Day — first Monday in August, combining V-J, V-V, and Armistice Days; Columbus Day — second Monday in October; and Thanksgiving Day — fourth Monday in November.

The committee stresses that it is not asking any change in observance of religious holidays.

In urging other changes, it points out that mid-week holidays do not allow time for activities of the type most desired by the public. In addition they may result in serious loss of efficiency and bring about absenteeism on days following in many industrial plants. The same is often true in schools, the NATO committee emphasizes.

OSC Graduation Is Due Monday

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis — An all-time record of doctor's degrees will be conferred at the 83rd annual commencement exercises at Oregon State college Monday, June 9.

Of the 35 doctor's degrees to be granted, 31 are doctor of philosophy degrees — the highest academic degree attainable — and four doctor of education degrees. A total of 1197 students are candidates for degrees. Of this number 993 are candidates for bachelor degrees and 204 for advanced degrees.

Both the graduation exercises and the baccalaureate services will be held again this year in the spacious OSC coliseum. The graduation exercises will be at 10 a. m. June 9 and the baccalaureate services at 11 a. m. Sunday, June 8.

Dr. Ralph C. Walker, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Portland, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon.

Following a long-standing custom at OSC, there will be no main commencement speaker, but Al. L. Grant of Baker, will speak briefly as representative of the state board of higher education, and President A. L. Strand, after conferring degrees, will extend a final word to the class of 1952.

Junior High Sets Summer Session

A special summer school on the seventh and eighth grade level will be held at Junior High School beginning Monday, June 9, and continuing six weeks through July 18, R. R. Brand, Junior High principal, announces.

Regular credit will be given students, who may enroll for one or possibly two, of the four courses to be offered. These include English, mathematics, social studies and science.

Miss Verlie Tracey, a regular teacher at the school, will conduct the courses. Although the public schools are co-opting in the summer session, it is being financed by \$20 tuition fee for one course and \$35 for two courses, if two are deemed feasible.

Classes will be held in room 203 from 9 a. m. to 12 noon, Monday through Friday.

Fire Destroys Historic Home On Rice Creek In Dillard Area

An early morning fire recently destroyed one of the earliest frame houses built on Rice Creek in Dillard. According to Mrs. Myrtle Rice, who moved on Rice Creek in 1894, and has lived there since, the house was standing at that date and was occupied by the O. J. Rand family. The Rands, a large family lived there several years.

The six-room, three bedroom dwelling was substantially built of lumber sawed from the mills on the premises. Some years later the property was bought by A. C. Goetsche who lived there a number of years. Residents of more recent years on the old place were the Jess Meredith family, who came out from North Dakota and purchased it in 1914. He was a grandfather of Mrs. Ivan Williams, now living in Dillard. In 1944 John Roberts purchased the place and owned it until about a year ago.

It is reported that with the aid of the neighbors some of the household belongings of the present occupants, the Robinette family, was saved from the burning building.

Army Calls For Draft Of 29,000 In August

WASHINGTON — The Army Thursday issued a draft call for 29,000 men in August.

The Marine Corps, Air Force and Navy do not plan any draft calls that month.

The August quota raises to 983,430 the total of men drafted by all services since September, 1950. The Army got 902,000 of these, the Marines 81,430.

A Defense Department announcement said the Army needs the draft to maintain authorized 29,000 in August for replacements strength.

'Courtesy Car' Evangelism Said To Be Paying Off

The Courtesy Car Crusade, a new, systematic and helpful program of personal evangelism, is paying off in increased attendance at North Roseburg Church, the Rev. Clark Robb, pastor, reports.

Started only last March, 1952, the continuing plan has already brought into the church services "conservatively, from 50 to 75 visitors."

The pastor said that the system has proved so successful that it will be continued indefinitely.

A courtesy car drive in the church's Sunday school classes will culminate Sunday, June 8. A Bible spell-down at the evening meeting will be a feature. Mrs. Ralph Arensmeyer has arranged 100 questions and answers for advanced study by the classes. The winner may get an expense-paid summer camp trip at Jennings Lodge in August.

The budget committee saw fit to boost the amount proposed for recreation, by increasing from \$2000 to \$3500 the allowance for purchase of park equipment and by adding \$300 for the July 4 fireworks display and \$1250 for lights for Umpqua Park. Also allowed is \$750 for Pee Wee baseball, \$1,000 for playground equipment and \$500 for lawns and walkways.

Most of the remaining budget items are fixed costs or remain in amounts approximately the same as for preceding years. Several shifts have been made in placement of items to better conform to the department to which they belong, City Manager Gilchrist points out.

New GI Bill Of Rights Given House Approval

WASHINGTON — The House voted overwhelmingly Thursday in favor of a new GI bill of rights for veterans discharged from the armed forces since fighting began in Korea on June 27, 1950.

The roll call vote was 361 to 1. The lone dissenter was Rep. Devereux (R-MD), onetime commander of the army garrison on Wake Island.

Dutch Jet Sinks British Minesweeper; 15 Die

DEN HELDER, The Netherlands, — A Dutch Thunderjet crashed into a British minesweeper Thursday and the 112-foot vessel sank in flames.

A report from the British embassy to London said 15 seamen lost their lives.

The accident occurred off the Dutch Naval base of Den Helder, between the mainland and the West Frisian island of Texel.

Gold Hoard Found

RANGOON, Burma — Police searching a Chinese shop here turned up 1,250 gold bars valued at \$600,000 Thursday. It was believed the hoard had been smuggled out of China.

fire truck as the principal fire department item.

Trade in allowance for a new street flusher to replace the present one is placed at \$5,000. Allowance of \$2,300 for a new dump truck and \$1,600 for a new pickup truck are provided in the street department. To purchase a pickup truck \$975 is also allowed for the sewage disposal plant department.

The building department's truck would be transferred to the engineering department, with the latter to share in the cost of a new truck for the building inspector. The total allowance for the truck would be \$1,600.

Purchase of a gas chlorinator at \$1,200 and replacement of an overflow trough, costing \$2,000, is provided for the swimming pool.

New Dept. Created
A new department setup is the state tax street department, which allows for expenditure of funds derived direct from the state as the city's share of gasoline tax revenue. Certain items, including equipment supplies and repairs and materials for streets are shifted to this department from the street department. Also included is a \$20,000 item for a participating street paving program, which will be dealt with in a later article on the budget.

The budget sets up an engineering department with an allowance of \$15,965, to provide salaries of an engineer at \$6,000, assistant engineer at \$4,200, and chairman at \$3,840. It is explained that much of the cost of the engineering department is charged against property owners in such projects as street and sidewalk paving and sanitary sewers.

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Elza Edward Gardner Of Gazley Route Dies

Elza Edward ("Buster") Gardner, 40, of Gazley Route, Myrtle Creek, died Wednesday evening, June 4 following a heart attack. Services will be announced later by Ganz Mortuary upon arrival of relatives.

Gardner was born on Aug. 26, 1911, in Perceel, Mo. He had lived in Myrtle Creek for three years, formerly living in Long Beach, Calif.

He was a member of the Elks and Eagles Lodges of Roseburg. Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Gardner of Myrtle Creek; a sister, Ruby Christian, of Memphis, Tenn., and a brother, Porter Gardner, of Springfield, Mo.
