

Charles Favored To Regain Crown

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The fourth and most lucrative episode in the Jersey Joe Walcott-Ezzard Charles road series will be unveiled Thursday night with Charles rated a 2-1 favorite to make boxing history and become the first former heavyweight king to win back his crown.

Forecasts of fair weather for the 15 - rounder in Municipal Stadium boosted promoter Herman Taylor's confidence that about 35,000 will pay \$250,000 to see the scrap. Taylor said he already had \$150,000 in the till and predicted a bumper last day sale.

With \$175,000 paid for the Radio-TV rights, this latest, and no doubt last, number in the three - year old rivalry appears a cinch to eclipse the financial take of the other three stops in Chicago, Detroit and Pittsburgh.

Ezzard expects to weight 192 pounds - heaviest of his career. Nearing 31, he has grown into a full - fledged heavyweight, is heavier around the face and on his legs, and undoubtedly has slowed up in the building - up process. He is sacrificing some of his speed for power.

Walcott's weight has not varied much. He expects to weight 194 or 195.

Seeded Players Leading Tourney

SEATTLE (AP)—Seeded players led the field entering the quarter-final round of the National Hard Court tennis championships Thursday with former national champion Art Larsen and Harry Likas of San Francisco paired in one of the day's feature matches.

Larsen, seeded No. 3, and Likas, No. 5, the first of the top-ranked players to collide head-on, advanced with ease in Wednesday's round.

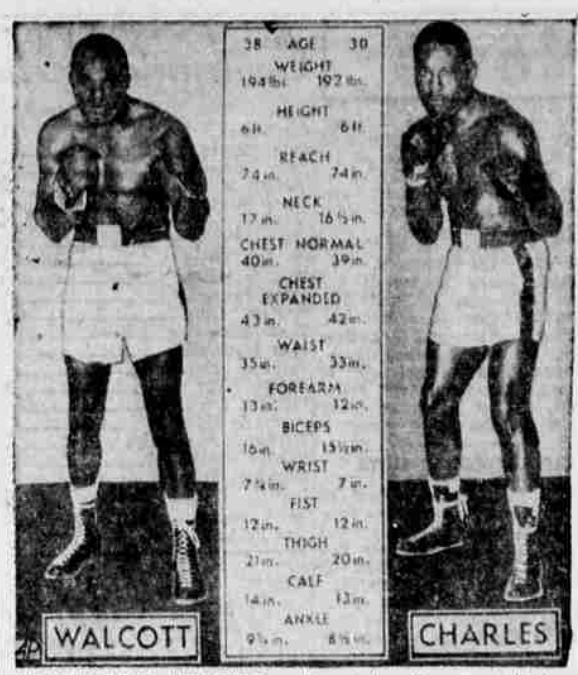

Bill Quillian, young Northern Division champion from the University of Washington who scored the tourney's second major upset Wednesday was down for a match with Jack Lowe of Seattle, and Jim Brink of Portland was paired against Hugh Stewart of Los Angeles.

Traded Players Give Red Sox 13-11 Victory Over Cleveland

This may be the year that Tom Yawkey is rewarded for his costly and unceasing efforts to bring an American League pennant to Boston.

The generous owner of the Red Sox found out painfully that pennants couldn't be bought. Yawkey then set up an expensive farm system. It produced a pennant in 1946 and heartaches ever since.

Yawkey, far from discouraged, tried another method. Tuesday he okayed a one - million - dollar deal that brought four veterans from Detroit in exchange for infielders Johnny Pesky, Walt Dropo, Fred Hatfield, Pitcher Bill Wright and outfielder Don Lenhardt.

The trade already has paid the Red Sox dividends. Three of the newcomers, third baseman George Kell, outfielder Hoot Evers, and pitcher Dizzy Trout teamed up Wednesday to lead the Sox to a 13-11 triumph over the Cleveland Indians. The victory enabled the Red Sox to take over the lead from the Indians.

The New York Yankees climbed into third place, 1 1/2 games behind Boston and five percentage points ahead of Washington, by beating the Chicago White Sox, 6-3.

Little Bobby Shantz turned in his eighth straight victory and his ninth of the season as the Athletics shaded Detroit, 4-3, in a night game at Philadelphia. Eddie Joost's two-run homer in the fourth decided the issue in a game delayed an hour and 21 minutes by rain.

In the National League, the Brooklyn Dodgers stretched their lead to two games, downing the lead to two games, downing the game while the runner-up New York Giants bowed, 6-2, to Chicago in the afternoon.

United Presbyterians Told Of Money Need

ALBANY, Ore. (AP)—Dr. George A. Long, president of the Pittsburgh-Xenia Theological Seminary told the United Presbyterian general assembly here Tuesday that the school's building fund had reached \$1,121,808.

Two million dollars are needed for new buildings on the 10-acre estate in East Liberty, Pittsburgh, which was donated by heirs of the late H. Lee Mason Jr., Long said.

The assembly approved architectural plans for the seminary which will accommodate 300 students.

Dr. Long said that the new seminary will be placed at the disposal of the unified churches when and if the United Presbyterian, Presbyterian U. S. A. and Presbyterian U. S. denominations are merged.
