

Roseburg Wins Jr. Legion Tilt

When Steve Danchock slammed a home run in the sixth inning Friday night, it scared the scorekeeper right off the bench.

It was the second hit of a giant pitcher's duel that inaugurated the 1952 Junior Legion baseball season at Finlay Field and in the district. While Chuck Verrell was pitching Roseburg to a no-hit 4-1 victory, Sutherland's Bob Galla gave up a second-inning single to Roger Ollar and Danchock's four-master.

It couldn't have been a more brilliant opener for the Roseburg Legionnaires. Chuck Verrell was firing his fastball from a cannon, and the Roseburg fielders were flawless. Meanwhile, big 6-4 Bob Galla had all but Danchock thoroughly handcuffed. His fielders, however, used a sieve to back him up and committed seven errors.

Verrell flogged the ball in for 14 strikeouts in his seven-inning stretch, while walking five. Galla had seven strikeouts and walked but three.

The Roseburg offense earned the first and last runs, but the two sandwiched between in the second inning were giveaways.

In the initial frame, Don Stumbo got one of Galla's three walks, stole second, went to third on a groundout and stole home. But Sutherland errors began to tell in the second. Roger Ollar picked up the first of the two hits off Galla in that canto. Duke Rickert walked to put men on first and second. Then, two consecutive overthrows at third pushed both men across.

Sutherland made it 3-1 in the fourth after Verrell had given up walks to Bud Beahm and Jerry Blacklock. A double steal put them on second and third and Nub Beamer's long fly to center field brought Beahm scampering home for Sutherland's only run.

Up to this point, the two teams one apiece, but Steven Danchock was even on earned runs with showed Roseburg didn't need any gifts to win the game as he poled his long homer in the sixth.

The caliber of the other half of the league will be tested Sunday at Myrtle Creek when Drain invades.

The score was tied for the last time when Melrose collected a walk and three singles for two runs which set the stage for Reece's mighty round tripper. The Vets outlived Melrose eight to seven.

On the other field, scores were crossing the plate almost faster than they could be tabulated. After Umpqua Plywood had taken a two-run lead in the first inning, Barcus lashed back with seven to walk into an easy pace. But Umpqua kept chipping away until it had tied the score at 10-10 in the bottom of the fifth.

Barcus still had a reserve surge left, however, and pushed around one in the sixth and a big five in the seventh to wrap up the win.

Powell beat John Buell of Southwest Missouri State, 6-2, 6-0, in the first round and then took out William Mead of College of Puget Sound, 6-0, 6-1, in the quarter-finals. Krikorian reached the semi-finals with a 6-1, 6-1 victory over Kenneth Lewis of South east Oklahoma State and a 6-2, 6-2 triumph over Don Coleman of Lamar Tech.

Walcott Wants 45 Pct. Share In Title Fight

NEW YORK — A demand for a 45 per cent share of a title fight by Jersey Joe Walcott and a sound due showdown on the proposed Harry Matthews-Rocky Marciano bout kept things hopping on the boxing mat Saturday.

Felix Boechicchio, manager of the heavy-weight champion, said Friday that his 38-year old gladiator won't do any title performing for the International Boxing Club this September unless the champ collects "45 per cent of everything, gate, television and movies."

Promoter Jim Norris of the IBC is very much interested in exhibiting the champ against either Matthews, the sensational Seattle socker, or the hard-hitting, unbeaten Marciano.

At the same time Norris is eager to have Matthews and Marciano have it out in an elimination bout in New York late next month.

Matchmaker Al Weil of the IBC said "we are earnestly trying to make it."

Either Matthews or Marciano would be acceptable to Boechicchio.

N. Y. Giants Go Into Bad Slump

The New York Giants can hardly wait until Willie Mays comes marching home. But of course that won't be this year.

Since Mays switched from flannels to khaki May 29 the Giants have lost eight out of ten games and nosedived from 2 1/2 games in front to four games astern of the Brooklyn Dodgers in the National League pennant scrap.

Observers knew that Mays would be missed but few expected the Giants to fall apart as badly as they have.

The Giants reached the depth of their slump Friday night. The polo grounders invaded Pittsburgh, usually a tonic for slumping teams, but the Pirates refused to roll over and play dead.

Little Murry Dickson stifled the Giants, 8-1, on seven hits, beating pirate killer Sal Maglie in the process. Maglie had a string of 13 straight victories over the Pirates before his encounter with Dickson.

Brooklyn turned back the Reds, 6-4, in a night game at Cincinnati with Preacher Roe picking up his fifth straight victory. The Preach almost blew the decision in the ninth when the Reds rallied for all of their runs. Joe Black suppressed the uprising.

The St. Louis Cardinals edged the Philadelphia Phils, 5-4, and the Chicago Cubs trounced the Boston Braves, 7-2, in other National League games.

The Cleveland Indians increased their American League lead to two games by trouncing the Philadelphia Athletics, 11-4, while the Runner up Boston Red Sox bowed, 4-2, to Detroit.

The Red Sox were beaten by two players who they shipped to Detroit earlier in the week in the astounding one million dollar trade. Walt Drope and Don Lenhardt haunted their old mates by driving in all of Detroit's runs.

Former teammates also beat the Washington Senators and New York Yankees. Ex-Senator Ed Stewart clouted a three-run two-out double in the eighth inning to give the Chicago White Sox a 4-3 victory over Washington.

Jim Dyck and Clint Courtney, ex-Yankee farm hands, batted in seven runs to lead St. Louis to a 9-3 victory over the New Yorkers.

OSC In Finals After Winning 2-1 Game Over Fresno State

CORVALLIS, Ore. — Oregon State goes into the finals of the District 8 NCAA baseball playoffs Saturday with a one-game edge after Friday's tightly-pitched 2-1 decision over Fresno State.

If OSC, Coast Conference champs takes the opening contest (1 p.m. PDT), the teams head east. If Fresno State wins, a third and final game will follow immediately.

Oregon State chalked up its winning tally in the seventh after the score was tied at one-all. And they did it without a hit.

Catcher John Thomas walked, advanced to third on a bunt and a fielder's choice and galloped home after a short flyout by Pete Goodbrod.

Don White pitched the win for the Oregon club and Larry Bolger went the route for Fresno. Each allowed only six hits.

Oregon State led off the scoring in the second on three consecutive singles.

Boxing Ban Asked On Billy Smith

PORTLAND — The Portland Boxing Commission has called for a general ban against Oakland Billy Smith, who fought in Philadelphia Thursday night in a preliminary to the Charles - Walcott title bout.

Smith was suspended at Portland more than a year ago after leaving the ring during a fight with Archie Moore.

The suspension should apply in Pennsylvania since both states are affiliated with the National Boxing Association. A suspension in one NBA-affiliated state is mandatory in all.

Howard Bobbitt, chairman of the Portland commission, said Friday the group voted less than a month ago to keep Smith's suspension in force and notified the Pennsylvania commission of its action.

He denied the contention by John "Ox" DeGross, Pennsylvania commission member, that the decision had been left up to Pennsylvania.

Bobbitt said Portland had agreed only to consider the case further if new evidence in Smith's favor should be presented.

Top Seeded Four In Semi-Finals

SEATTLE — The four men seeded in the four top spots of the National Hard Court tennis championships were in the semi-finals here Saturday.
