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Helen Casey Make Around World Trip

Friends of Miss Helen Casey are welcoming her home, following a two months vacation trip around the world. Miss Casey left Roseburg March 15 by plane from Los Angeles, where she joined the party of 21 making the around-the-world trip.

The first stop made by the Pan American World Airways double deck Clipper was Honolulu. The flight was made by night and this was Miss Casey's first trip by air in a berth. The group stopped over at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel and the following day was spent in touring the island. In Honolulu, Miss Casey received leis from Florence Wharton Wickland and Eleanor Micelli. She had dinner with Mrs. Wickland that evening. March 22 the group arrived in Tokyo, Japan, where Miss Casey was met by Mrs. Robert Snoddy, nee Charlotte Dillard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Dillard of this city, who took her to her home. In Tokyo, the vacationers enjoyed a sightseeing trip to the Imperial Palace Plaza, the Diet Building, the Teiji Shrine and Tokyo University.

A motor trip was arranged the following day, which took the group to Yokohama and Kamakura. A visit was made to the great bronze Buddha, on to Lake Hakone and the seaside resort of Atami, where they stayed overnight. From Atami, the group went by rail to Kyoto. Visits to the Royal Palaces, great temples and shrines were enjoyed. The entire group donned native costumes to have their pictures taken. The group toured some of the great commercial cities of Japan including Osaka, after which they went to Deer Park, Kasuga Shrine and the Big Bell. Following a trip to Nikko, the famous sacred city, the group visited the Toshogu Shrines and the treasure museum in the afternoon. An excursion by motor was made to Lake Chuzengi with a visit to the Kegon Waterfall and nearby places of interest.

From Japan, the travelers went to Hong Kong by plane, which was the first foreign country visited by the group where they saw thousands of refugees. The following day was spent in sight-seeing around the island, a trip to the fishing village of Aberdeen, luncheon at Repulse Bay Hotel and a visit to the Peak for a view of the harbor. April 1, the group was taken by ferry to visit Kowloon and environs.

The next three days were spent in Manila, where Miss Casey met Louis Panillo, a close friend of Lowell Rhoden of Roseburg. Mr. Panillo took her as his guest to a Jaijai game. Mr. Panillo is making preparations to leave for Oregon to visit in Hood River to spend his vacation.

Leaving Manila, the plane took the visitors to Labuan, North Borneo and Djakarta, Java. A side trip to the inland town of Bandung was enjoyed, after which the group went to the famous island of Bali. Reports of the trip claim the dancers of Bali are superb. Five days were spent on the island.

Malaya was the next stop and at Singapore, Miss Casey was met by the United States Vice Consul, and Mrs. Stanley R. Kidder, son and daughter-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Kidder of Roseburg. She was their houseguest during her stay in Singapore.

At Bangkok, the entire group was entertained at a party given by Mr. and Mrs. Austin Flegel, brother and sister-in-law of May or Albert Flegel of Roseburg. The Flegels entertained the group royally and their stay in Bangkok proved most enjoyable.

Also in Bangkok, Miss Casey met Col. and Mrs. R. D. Palmer, cousin of Mrs. Harry A. Winston of Roseburg. Two full weeks were spent in India and Calcutta was the first city to be visited. Burning Ghats, temples and public buildings were visited. A trip was made to Benares, the Holy City of the Hindus, and places along the Ganges River were visited. New Delhi, a beautiful city built by the British, was of special interest. The Taj Mahal, Jasime Tower and Fatehpur Sikri (now a dead city) were visited. A special side trip took the group to Jaipur, the rose-colored city, where the visitors rode elephants. Wild peacocks, monkeys and sacred cows roamed the streets.

A particularly interesting feature of the trip was the visit to Kashmir, where three days were spent, after which the group went back to Delhi, where three days were enjoyed sight-seeing. The next stop was Lebanon and Syria with stops at Karachi, Pakistan, Basra, Iraq, and Beirut, Lebanon. A special trip was taken by boat to Petra, which is a community of tents and caves. Some of the group stayed overnight in caves, while others were given tents. It was at Petra, that merchants visited the tourists to take orders for tailored and embroidered coats. Orders were taken in the evening, fittings were made by midnight and the orders were delivered complete in the morning. The men of Petra do all of the tailoring and embroidery work. Visits were made to Temples of Venus, Bacchus and Jupiter and to Damascus, where the visitors enjoyed the great mosques, the covered souks and the Tomb of Saladin.

Three days were spent in Jerusalem and Jordan. The group went to Jerusalem via Amman, the Jordan River, Jericho and the Dead Sea. The second day was spent visiting the Via Dolorosa, the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, the Walling Wall, the Mosque of Omar (the site of Solomon's temple) and the crowded bazaars of the old walled city. The third day the group went to the Mount of Olives, the Garden of Gethsemane and Bethlehem.

The next four days were spent in Egypt. The group stopped in Cairo and visited the Pyramids and the Sphinx. The visitors enjoyed a ride by canal in Egypt. The second day, the group went to the Mosque of Mohammed Ali and the famous Cairo market. A trip was made through the Egyptian museum with its priceless treasures taken from Egypt's ancient tombs. At Luxor, Egypt, the group took carriages to visit the amazing columns, obelisks and temples of Karnak. The afternoon was spent in visiting the temple of Luxor. The third morning, a trip across the Nile on a sailing felucca and a visit to the valley of the tombs of the Kings was enjoyed. A visit at the Moslem Temple of Ramses, the Colossi of Memnon was followed by the visitors getting on the plane for dinner and leaving for Turkey.

In Turkey, the group landed in Beirut and that afternoon went to Istanbul. The group visited the great mosque of Sultan Ahmed, the world famed Third Mosque, and the Seraglio. A visit was made to Robert College and the Sultan's Palace. From Turkey, the next stop was Athens, Greece, where Miss Casey became ill and was taken by ambulance to the hospital. She was still ill in Italy and on the trip back to New York. In Rome, she was visited by Mrs. Larkin of St. Louis, Mo., who was on the European trip last year with Miss Casey and who was enjoying another trip through Europe this spring. Mrs. Larkin visited in Roseburg at the Casey home last summer en route to Los Angeles. Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy of Los Angeles accompanied Miss Casey from Rome to New York, where they placed her on a plane for Portland, where she was met by Miss Naomi Scott, who makes her home with her. Since returning home, Miss Casey has been improving in health, however, she is unable to get out as yet on account of her illness.

She reports the trip was exceptionally enjoyable and that until she became ill, she had enjoyed the trip thoroughly. The colorful costumes worn by the people in the lands visited were most interesting and the shopping expeditions proved to be of special enjoyment and pleasure. Miss Casey brought back numerous articles from the lands she visited.
