Douglas County is celebrating Centennial year and in keeping with the atmosphere permeating Roseburg during the past months, the Woman's Club had their presentation of "A Century of Roses," at the clubhouse on Mosher Street, June 3 and 4. Oregonians and especially natives of Roseburg have always had just reason to be proud of the roses grown in this area. Profoundly enough, the man who founded Roseburg had a rose in his name, and the evidence was displayed at the showing of roses from gardens of local residents. The all-amateur show proved to the viewing public the beauty that can be nurtured, with a little effort. The colors were panoramic in display against white backgrounds. Even the junior division had breathtaking displays. Mrs. Otho Gosnell was chairman for the affair and co-chairman was Mrs. Dan O'Bannon. The staging was arranged by Mrs. Earl Belle and Mrs. W. D. Myers. Mrs. H. F. Beauchamp and Mrs. Frank Ashley had charge of the schedule. Classification was arranged by Mrs. H. F. Hatfield. Mrs. Earl Plummer, president of the club, was judge. Mrs. Kenneth Ford was acting contact chairman and publicity was handled by Mrs. J. D. Boyles and Mrs. Bruce Elliott. Hospitality chairman was Mrs. Horace Berg; junior division, Mrs. E. L. Tauscher; registration, Mrs. Mabel Wilson; trophies, Mrs. Harrie Booth and candy sale, Mrs. George W. Burt. The only commercial exhibit

was displayed by the Commercial Rose Growers of Douglas County. S. H. Friday, with his display of a single Peace rose was awarded the grand sweepstakes award of an engraved silver bread tray, presented by the Garden Valley Nursery and Landscaping. Mrs. Harrie Booth, for her single Mme. Guillot rose was awarded the runner-up prize. For the best three roses, Mrs. J. M. Boyles received first prize. She displayed Sweet Sixteen Roses. For the best Old-Fashioned arrangement, Mrs. S. A. Warg won a gift certificate. Another gift certificate was awarded to Carmen Ford for the best rose in the junior division. Remainder of the awards were in ribbon classifications. The exhibition was open to all amateur rose growers. All roses had to be from plants grown out of doors and owned by the exhibitor. Arrangements were the work of the exhibitor. Judging was based on a comparison of the approach to perfection of the individual variety. Cut blooms of all classes were judged for form, substance, color, stem and foliage and size. Arrangements were based on color combinations, relation to the container, proportion and balance, distinction and originality, quality of bloom and foliage. Winners for Hybrid Teas were Section A, (a special section for the "Peace Rose" the 1951 Rose Show choice) class 1, one Peace rose, awards went to C. H.
