Lightning Strikes Scout Camp; 1 Dead, 2 Hurt

DENVER (AP) — A bolt of lightning Friday night crashed into a Boy Scout camping party that was scurrying for cover in a mountain thunderstorm. One father was killed, two boys were injured and the other 21 persons in the group were knocked to the ground.

William Habenicht, 35, was killed. His son, Billy, 12, and Teddy Conti, 12, were injured seriously.

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
