IF THE GARMENT IS DRY CLEANABLE — leave it alone. Don't rub or wipe, as this will cause it to penetrate deeper into the fibers of the fabric. Just let it dry and bring it in to be cleaned... the sooner the better.

Fruit juices, being acid in content, require quick action because of their effect on dyes. If allowed to stay too long, not only will they affect the dye, but — through aging — they will become permanently fixed. And when that happens, another garment for which you paid good money can be consigned to the "around the house" category.

And, if you're like everybody we know, including ourselves, we have too many of those "around the house" garments already and not enough of the "Sunday Best."

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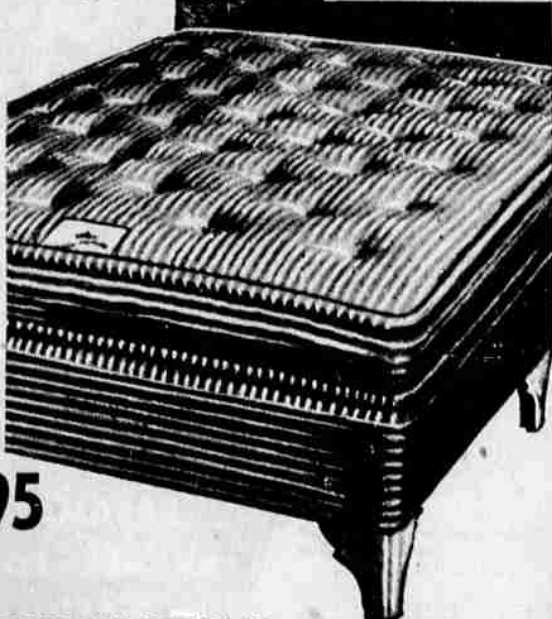
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
