The E. A. Shannon Company of Roseburg has the contract to build the Curtin School house.

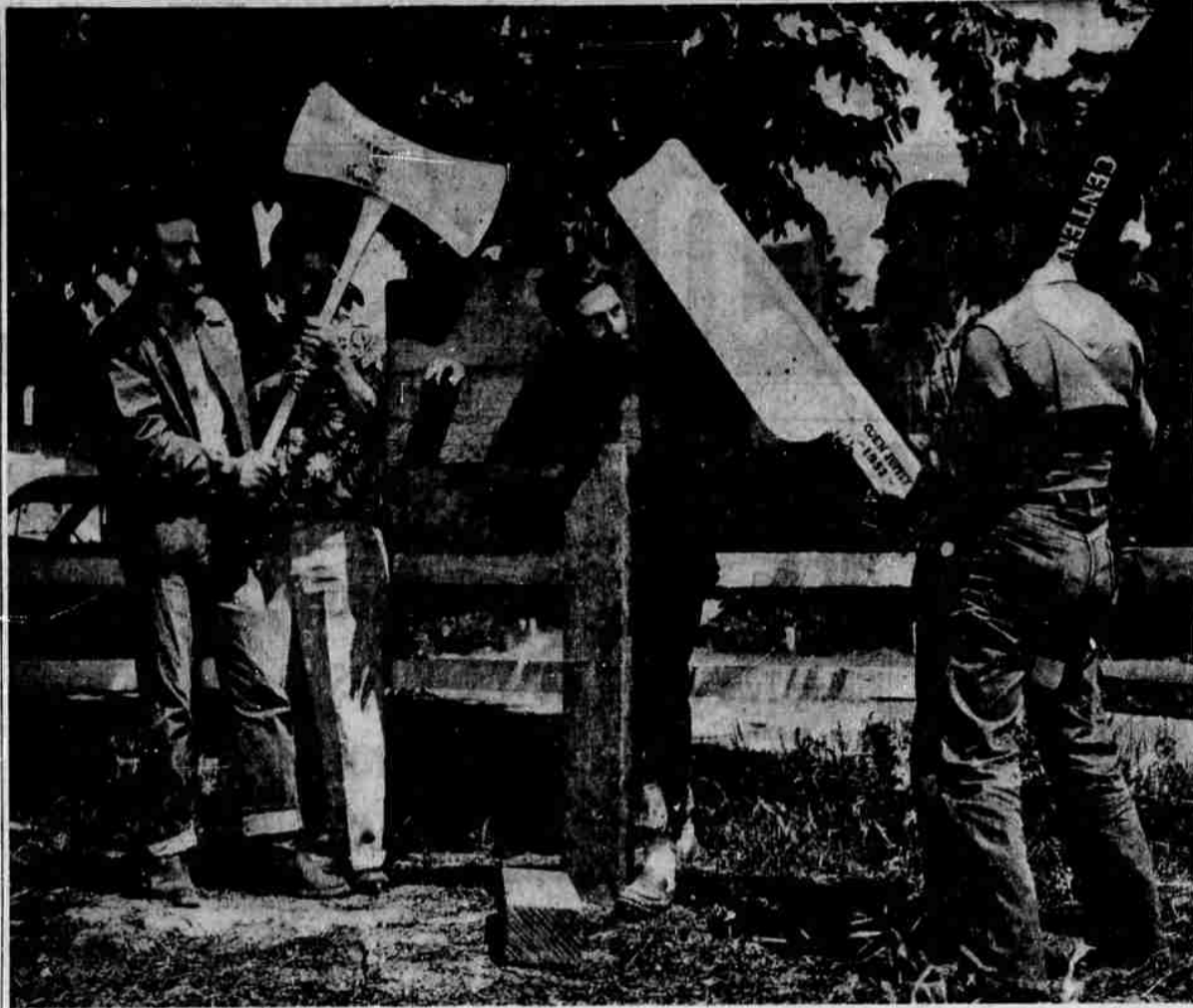

Whiskalantes Invade Tiller For Paul Bunyan Festivities

Whiskalantes from Roseburg invaded Tiller's Paul Bunyan Days event Saturday. Under leadership of Pat Patrick of Roseburg Lumber Co., they took off from Roseburg about 10:30 a.m. in a 1922 Chevrolet, originally owned by John Landers of Winston and now owned and "herded" by Ray Solnicka.

With them were Neil Meyers, Clint Wall and Steve Stephens, the latter chairman of Douglas County Centennial's beard contest. Arriving in Tiller about 12:30 p.m., they were met by Edmond Huntley of Tiller, who advised them they didn't have a chance to compete in the whiskerino contest.

Patrick and the Whiskalantes overpowered Huntley, locked him in Tiller's own "stock," and threatened to either cut off his beard or at least to shorten it to where the Whiskalantes could compete with him. The alternative was that he leave Tiller until the next day, when the contest would be over. He reportedly took the latter choice, rather than permit the removal of his facial foliage.

Second GI Convicted Of Slaying 2 Germans

NUERNBERG, Germany — A U. S. Army Courtmartial Wednesday found Pvt. Richard A. Hagelberger, 19, of Chula Vista, Calif., guilty of murder in the carbine slaying of two German civilians last April.

The court recessed and will pass sentence Thursday morning.

Hagelberger is the second soldier to be convicted of the slaying of the two Germans on a lonely road near Neustadt.

His companion, Pvt. John F. Vigneault of Goffs Falls, N. H., who fired the actual shots, was convicted and sentenced to death on May 22. The case had aroused widespread anger among Germans, but said Hagelberger had pleaded to do it. Hagelberger had pleaded innocent.

Tornado Does \$100,000 Damage To Eastern Town

GORDONSVILLE, Va. — A tornado that came busting down out of the Blue Ridge Mountains did helter-skelter damage totaling more than \$100,000 in this Orange County town Tuesday.

The twister toppled scores of trees, many of them huge oaks, shattered windows, knocked over power lines and left the community without lights most of the night.

The blow pulled loose a large drive in theater movie screen and buried it all the way across the State Route 221.

Despite the damage no one was hurt.

Deaths In Oregon Traffic Show

Twenty-eight persons died in Oregon street and highway accidents last month, according to a preliminary count of May fatalities reported by Secretary of State Newberry.

The May toll brings the death count for the year thus far to 135, as compared with 147 at the same time in 1951. Fatalities in May a year ago totaled 39.

Officials claim last month's death count may climb if delayed reports are received or if persons listed as injured later die as a result of their injuries.

Nineteen may fatalities took place in rural roadways and the remaining nine within the limits of incorporated cities and towns. Two fatal accidents, one involving a collision with a train at a grade crossing and one in which a two-year-old pedestrian was killed, took place on private property.

Private property mishaps, while listed as "motor vehicle" deaths, are not officially charged to the state's traffic accident record.

In the only other case on the docket, \$20 bail of Gerald Van Horn, 329 Mill St., was ordered forfeited on a charge of being drunk, according to Municipal Court records.

Iona Sparks, Life-Long Roseburg Resident, Dies

Iona Maye Sparks, 81, resident of 1021 Harvard Ave., died early today after a lingering illness. She was born Dec. 4, 1870, in Baker County, and had lived in Oregon her entire life, residing in Roseburg for the past two years. She was a member of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Creed Cranfill Estate Admitted To Probate

The \$30,000 estate of the late Creed Cranfill will be administered by his widow, Lina Cranfill of Rt. 4, Box 1415, according to a probate order.

Cranfill died at Lookingglass last May 31. The estate consists of an estimated \$16,400 in personal property in Douglas County and some \$14,000 in real property in Multnomah County, a probate petition discloses.

Named appraisers of the estate are Clarence E. Miller, Don Oliviant, and C. W. Heard.

New Law Said To Cut Child Welfare Costs

"Enforcement of the Social Security Administration's new policy of referral of criminal abandonment cases to state law agencies will result in substantial reductions in the expense of the aid to dependent children program."

"This is the opinion of John Brugman, deputy state attorney general, who spoke to welfare workers at a special meeting of staffs of six Southwest Oregon county welfare commissions at St. George's Episcopal Church on Tuesday.

Mrs. Esther F. Watson, assistant supervisor for the State Public Welfare Commission, was the second speaker.

Brugman notes that almost half of the aid to dependent children cases in Douglas County and in Oregon involves parental absence of one or both parents. He emphasizes, however, that not all of these cases involve criminal negligence.

"Willful abandonment or desertion of children is not a misdemeanor but a felony, and those convicted go not to a city or county jail but to the state penitentiary." He says that district attorneys in each county handles prosecution. Douglas County welfare office reports that 48 cases of desertion are on its files.

The new federal policy, which becomes effective July 1, was authorized by Congress in 1950. It applies to all welfare commissions receiving matching funds under the Social Security Act. The new regulation marks the first time that welfare cases have been opened to criminal prosecution, Brugman states.

The regional meeting, one of six being held in Oregon, was designed to acquaint social workers with the technical aspects of the new regulation.
