

British Colony Site Of Rich Uranium Find

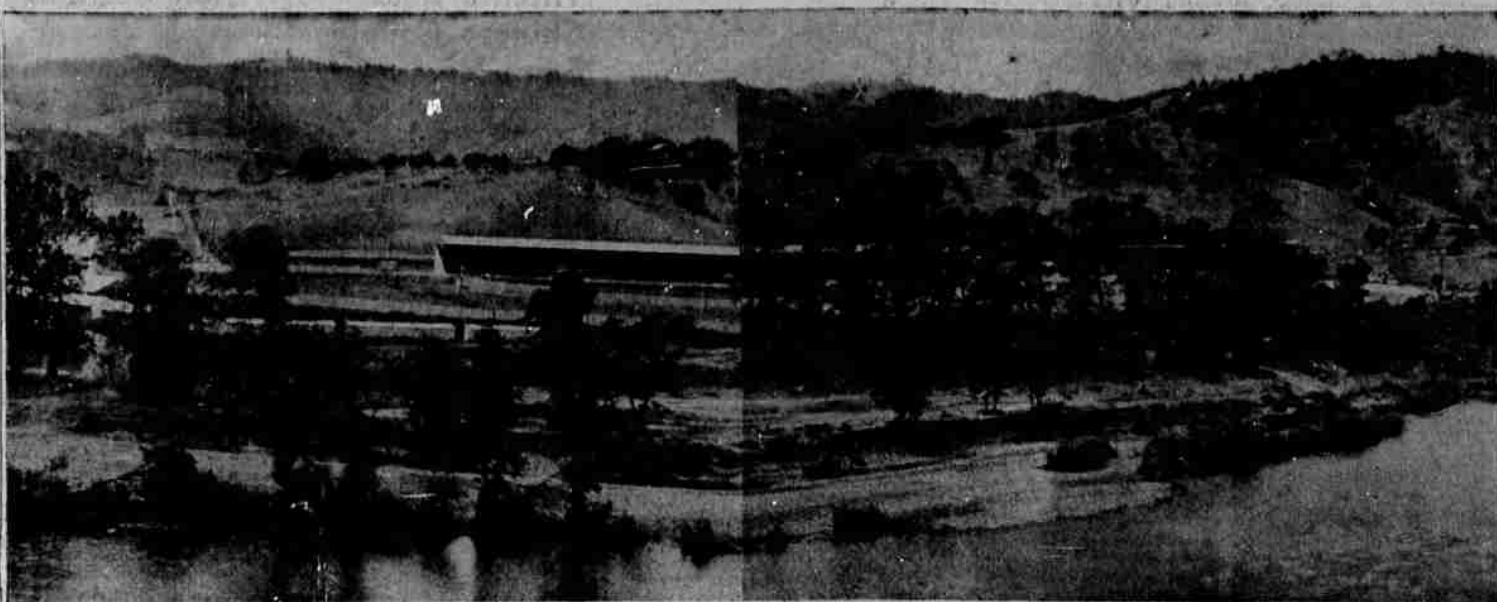
LONDON (AP) — The British government disclosed Tuesday that one of the world's biggest deposits of uranium — the raw material of the atom bomb — has been found in Nigeria.

The field lies in the north central part of the British West African colony, 20 miles from the nearest railway.

Geologists who reported the find estimated that each ton of ore contains \$14 worth of uranium and niobium, a scarce metal used in heat-resistant alloys for jet engines.

That would make the ore more valuable than many high-grade gold deposits.

The report said the field covers about 200 acres and that there are 700,000 tons of ore to the vertical foot. The depth of the deposit is so far unknown.
