

Satchemo Stars As Browns Win

Tip to Casey Stengel, who will manage the American League's 1952 all-star team in the inter-league classic in Philadelphia next month:

Want to know how to snap the Nationals' two-game winning streak? Just select Leroy (Satchel) Paige as one of your eight pitchers. The defending champion Yankees are in the top position for the first time this season. That came about when Eddie Lopat pitched over a 4-0 four-hit victory over Detroit while the St. Louis Browns were turning back the Boston Red Sox, 7-4.

And who was the Brownie star? Old Satchemo Paige. Long and lean Leroy came to the rescue of starter Ned Garver in the sixth inning after the Red Sox had clubbed the Brownie ace for two runs which left them trailing, 5-4. Paige found two men on base with only one out but got the side out without further scoring.

The loss dropped the Red Sox into third place behind the Cleveland Indians who edged Washington, 4-3. The Chicago White Sox moved past the Senators into fourth place with a 15-4 slugfest triumph over the Philadelphia Athletics.

The surprising Chicago Cubs picked up a full game on the National League leaders, thrashing

the Philadelphia Phillies, 10-5, while the front-running Brooklyn Dodgers and second-place New York Giants were losing. Sophomore Joe Presko pitched the St. Louis Cardinals to a 10-inning 1-0 triumph over the Dodgers' Chris Van Cuyk and the Cincinnati Reds outlasted the Giants, 6-5, in 14 innings. Pittsburgh's cellar-dwellers climbed within 25 games of the top with a 7-5 win over the Boston Braves.

In preserving Garver's third victory, Paige extended his scoreless streak to 24 1/3 innings. He has won five straight and sports a 5-1 record, all in relief.

The victory marked the debut as manager of Marty Marion, who succeeded Rogers Hornsby at the helm only a few hours before the game. St. Louis owner Bill Veeck, who fired Hornsby, was an interested spectator.

Hamner In Lead For Shortstop

CHICAGO (AP) — Granny Hamner of the Philadelphia Phillies has taken a lead on Al Dark of the New York Giants for the starting National League shortstop assignment in latest tabulations of the All-Star baseball poll.

Hamner had registered 10,163 votes from the nation's fans Wednesday while Dark, the 1951 starting choice, had polled 9,952. Hank Sauer, the Chicago Cubs left fielder who tops all major batting marks, continued as the poll's most popular vote-getter with a total of 13,422. Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals was second with 12,945.

The balloting for starting lineups ended with 12,945.

In the All-Star classic at Philadelphia July 8 began last Friday and will end at midnight June 27.

Turpin Gets KO Over Cockell

LONDON (AP) — Belting Randy Turpin, who now owns four boxing titles in two weight divisions, rested on his laurels Wednesday waiting to see who will fight him for a world championship.

Turpin crashed into the light heavyweight ranks Tuesday night with a brilliantly executed 11-round knockout of Don Cockell. The well-earned victory gave him Cockell's British national and British Empire 175-pound crowns to go with the English and European middleweight titles he already owns.

Turpin at 162 1/2, was outweighed almost 12 pounds, but was never in trouble against the hard-hitting Cockell. He floored his man for eight in the third round and for counts of six and nine in the eleventh before referee Tommy Little decided it was enough for the dazed Cockell.

Rainiers Make It 11 Victories In Row, Defeat Portland, 5-1

Bill Sweeney's Seattle Rainiers made it 11 wins in a row in the Pacific Coast League Tuesday night.

The Portland Beavers, Sweeney's team last season, were the 5-1 victors.

The win streak, started against Sacramento two weeks ago and continued in the San Francisco series last week, is the longest of the season in the PCL, but far short of the loop record of 19 set by Los Angeles in 1939.

The Reds scored four runs in the first inning and one in the third. Al Wilson started it off with a single. Came three more singles and two runs and Portland hurler Lyman Linde was jerked. Roy Welmaker's first pitch was wild, allowing another score. An

error by Frank Austin permitted the fourth tally and the fifth came on two singles and a double by Al Lyons. Portland's lone marker came in the fifth on successive doubles by Austin and Jim Russell.

Last place Sacramento dumped first place San Diego 4-2. A home run by Richie Myers in the first frame gave the Sacs a lead they never lost. The win snapped a five-game Sacramento losing streak.

San Francisco lost its eighth straight, 6-2, as Hollywood scored four runs in the eighth. A squeeze play opened the gate for the Stars. Oakland edged Los Angeles 5-4 on Leon Brinkopf's error in the 10th. He dropped Hank Schenz's sizzling grounder permitting Johnny Beroto sprint home with the decider. Brinkopf's ninth inning homer had tied the game 4-4.

Conference Votes Crackdown On Universities Hiring Players

PORTLAND (AP) — The Pacific Coast Conference is off on another big crackdown on sports commercialism.

This one may be the toughest ever. H. P. Everest said in announcing that conference officials had voted to hire investigators and tell them to go get erring colleges and athletes.

Any college athlete found to have accepted gifts or money will be suspended from conference sports, said Everest, vice president of the University of Washington and spokesman for conference officials in their annual meeting.

The schools themselves—in pledges from college presidents—have promised to punish anyone involved in giving undue aid to athletes. If caught in severe violations, college staff members may be discharged, Everest said.

All this stems from an increasing uneasiness over rumors—on the West Coast as well as the rest of the nation—that a lively

market exists for high school athletes, and that the athletes are cashing in on it, Everest added.

Conference Commissioner Victor Schmidt reported that he did not have the staff necessary to run down the rumors. So athletic directors and faculty representatives from the nine conference schools voted Tuesday to increase his staff. No limit was placed on the number he may hire.

The officials also took tentative action on basketball and football systems. Basketball coaches voted for a conference-wide schedule to replace the present Northern and Southern Divisions. This would call for each team to play all others twice.

Final action was set back at least until December, for athletic directors said they would have to study the plan. The committee will report in December.

Wrestler Out For Month As Knee Wrenched

A host of inquiries was answered Tuesday when Wrestling Promoter Elton Owen reported that Frankie Stojack did not suffer a broken knee Saturday.

The rush which carried both him and Leo Wallick out of the ring in the highly publicized "rubber" match at the Roseburg Armory Saturday resulted in a badly wrenched knee, however, and put the young Tacoma battler on the shelf for a month at least.

This defeat win was good enough to give boasting Leo Wallick a shot at Pacific Coast Junior Heavyweight Champion Rogers Mackay in spite of the fact Stojack was ahead at the mishap.

Mackay will be unable to defend his title in Roseburg until the last part of June because of other contracts in the Seattle area, but Owen has booked a thriller for the weekend to fill the gap. Some of the top names in current Roseburg wrestling have been signed with Georges Dusette for a powerful Australian Tag team match. At stake will be the Northwest Tag Team championship trophy.

Dusette and Buck Weaver are the present champions. They have been pitted with challengers Leo Wallick and Seaside's Bob Cummings, who won the battle royal two weeks ago.

Wallick is still grumbling from a roughing up he received from local fans following last week's match with Stojack. Stroking his bruises, he said, "They'll have to protect those loggers from me if they insist on mixing it up." In spite of his demand for more police protection, Wallick with Cummings will form the most formidable challenging team thus far for Dusette and Weaver.

In the semi-final, Gordon Hessel will tangle with Frenchy Roy in a one-hour two-out-of-three fall bout. Hessel is out to work his way into main-event billing and Roy wants a rematch with Billy Melby to regain his light heavyweight title.

Marion To Shift Browns' Lineup

BOSTON (AP) — With such a loquacious boss as Bill Veeck demanding complete attention, mild Marty Marion has had but little opportunity to outline his plans as veteran Rogers Hornsby's successor as manager of the St. Louis Browns.

But Marty, who served one term as the St. Louis Cardinals' pilot, did manage to get in a few words between Veeck's long explanation of Tuesday's Hornsby firing.

"I don't plan any drastic changes in personnel," Marion said. "I'm going to try to pick my nine best players and use them every game. There'll not be any two platoon system for me."

Veeck, naturally, is enthusiastic about his Marion appointment. And so are most of the Browns' players.

"I made up my mind to get rid of Hornsby about 10 days ago and just waited for an opportune time to do so," Veeck explained. "It seems that he, as an employer, forgot that employees are people, too."

Congdon Wins Open With 2 Subpar Rounds

CLARKSTON, Wash. (AP) — Tacoma pro Charley Congdon put together two subpar rounds in the final 36 holes of the Washington State Open Golf Tournament Tuesday and pocketed first money with a 72-hole total of 271.

The Tacoma veteran fired a 65 on the par-71 Clarkston Golf and Country Club, best score of the tourney, on his first round Tuesday and closed with a 70. His 72-hole total, 13 under par for the course, netted Congdon \$500 first prize money.

But Ward, Great Falls, Mont., professional, was second with a 277 worth \$300.

Portland U. Elected Member Of NCAA

PORTLAND (AP) — The University of Portland was notified Tuesday it has been elected a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

Athletic Director Ed Fiene said Portland will be part of District 8 which includes California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Nevada and Hawaii.

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WASHINGT. (AP) — Congress whipped an appropriation bill through both houses Thursday and President Truman signed it, putting meaning back into the pay days of half a million postal workers.

About half the money in the bill was for Post Office work done in May. The postal employees did not get their usual checks June 1 because the Post Office had run out of salary funds.

This fiscal year's regular payroll appropriation was used up early, due to a general pay raise. Congress had not voted money to cover the additional pay. This is the last month of the fiscal year. Thursday contained funds to mt the postal payroll. It also provided the \$971,342,641 appropriated Thursday contained funds to meet funds for controlling illegal immigration from Mexico.

Postmaster General Donaldson immediately authorized postmasters to resume salary payments.

On Wednesday, July 16, the Cuban All-Stars move into town. Then, on August 3, a Sunday, the Harlem Globetrotters make their appearance. Sandwiched in on July 23 and 24 is a road series to Coos Bay-North Bend and Eugene for exhibition tilts.
