

His Advice Ignored At Yalta, Potsdam, Ike Says

Tentative Work Schedule
Fixed For Roseburg School
District's Building Agenda

Expansion Outlay Of \$1½ Million
Lists Projects At All Present
Units, Probable Additional One

A tentative working schedule for the Roseburg School District's 1½ million dollar building program was set up by the School Board Wednesday night.

The schedule calls for completion of the large project by fall, 1953, with many of the buildings and additions expected to be ready sooner.

The tentative schedule was worked out by the board meeting last night in special session with newly-appointed, Supt. M. C. Deller and Stewart Tuft, architect for the Portland firm of Freeman, Hayslip and Tuft.

Deller, in announcing the plans, emphasized they were on a tentative basis. Much depends on changes that may be made on architects' preliminary drawings, he explained.

Work is already under way on the Fullerton School addition and on construction of auditorium, lunch and physical education facilities at Riverside School.

Work is expected to start by Aug. 4 on a \$200,000 High School shop building which the board decided would be located on the northwest corner of a parking lot south of the Library Arts Building.

Preliminary plans, redrawn because of the state fire marshal's office rejected the first plans, are to be submitted to the School Board for approval July 15 and bids will be opened July 20. Completion date has been set at Dec. 1.

Other Jobs Sited

Work on the contemplated high school gymnasium and classroom structures is still in the drawing board stage. The School Board is expected to receive preliminary architects drawings Aug. 18 and hopes to accept working drawings Nov. 17. Advertising for bids will begin Dec. 22 and these bids will be opened next Jan. 19, according to the tentative schedule, Deller said.

Plans call for completion of the building by the fall of 1953. Estimated cost is about \$450,000.

Repairs on Wilbur and Melrose schools are expected to be done this summer by the school maintenance crew.

No definite dates were set for construction of a \$25,000 multi-purpose room at Winchester School. Plans are being prepared as rapidly as possible and the structure may be finished by next fall, Deller said.

A survey is contemplated to determine requirements for a new school to serve the North Roseburg district. The new school will be located north of the Drive-In Theater and a budget allotment of some \$45,000 has been made for it. Bids will be opened by the School Board Feb. 15 and the building is scheduled to be completed by August, 1953.

The same completion date has been set in the tentative schedule for the new addition to Rose School. The Rose addition, a building to be constructed adjacent to the present school building, is estimated to cost some \$110,000.

County School Districts
Going To Polls MondayLocal Boards,
Levies Slated
For Decisions

Special \$71,500 Budget,
Filling Of Rural Board
Jobs Listed On Ballot

The annual school elections in districts throughout the county will be held Monday in individual districts.

At that time, local measures, including election of school board members and local levies, as well as special district voting will be considered items of business.

Polls in school districts comprising the non-high school district will be open from 2 to 8 p.m.

PST, in the elementary school of each district. During that time the 11 districts will vote on a special levy budget of \$71,500 and on members of the non-high school board where vacancies exist in the following three of the five zones.

Zone 3 (Green and Looking-glass) candidates for the two-year term are James C. Williams, Looking-glass, and Clyde Fullerton, Green.

In Zone 2 (Garden Valley), Mrs. Opal Munson is a candidate for a five-year term. There are no candidates for board member from Zone 1 (Ash Valley) and voters will write in a choice.

Districts in the non-high district are Ash Valley (Loon Lake), Garden Valley, Umpqua, Green, Looking-glass, Tenmile, Roberts Creek, Dillard, Anchor, Tiller and Galesville.

The \$71,500 non-high district levy provides for depreciation on buildings, additional teacher salaries not provided in the county scale.

COLD RECORD BROKEN

35 Degrees In Roseburg
This Morning Sets New
Low For Month Of June

A sudden rush of cold air swooping down from the Gulf of Alaska moved inland into Southwest Oregon this morning, sending the temperature at Roseburg to an all-time June low of 35 degrees.

The all-time mark, breaking a previous record of 36 degrees, set on June 19, 1893, was recorded by the Roseburg office of the U.S. Weather Bureau at 6 a.m., DST, this morning.

Snow fell in Douglas County at two lookout points, Mt. Scott and Yellow Butte during the night. About one inch of snow was reported, and is sticking, according to the Douglas Forest Protective Association.

Another mark was almost shattered as the Wednesday, June 11, maximum temperature missed by one degree the all-time low of 53 degrees, set on June 10, 1894. The maximum here was 54.

A total of 47 inches of rain has fallen during the past 48 hours, 30 inches between 8 a.m., standard time, June 11 and June 12. Showers to diminish.

Fugitive Slays
Child Hostage
Before Giving Up

CARMEL, N. Y. (AP)—An escaped convict, making a desperate effort to seize a getaway car, stabbed a 9-year-old girl hostage to death Wednesday as police closed in on him.

Hit by three police bullets, the convict surrendered and was taken to a hospital.

His little victim, stabbed with a butcher knife as her mother looked on helplessly, died an hour later. The slayer, Donald Snyder, 25, of Canastota, N. Y., gave warning of his desperation and cried:

"If you come near me, I'll stab the child."

Alex Williams, 45, school bus driver and a special policeman, tried to persuade Snyder to release the child, Betty Lou Arnold. As he talked, he sidled up closer and fired, hitting Snyder. The ex-convict then plunged the knife into the little girl's abdomen.

Williams fired two more shots, and Snyder gave up the fight.

Snyder, who was serving a 2½ year term in Green Haven State prison for auto theft, had escaped Tuesday.

Putnam County District Attorney Fred A. Dickinson said a murder charge against Snyder would be presented to a grand jury Friday.

Anti-Red POWs
Run Away During
Transfer March

KOJE ISLAND, Korea (AP)—U.S. troops hunted Thursday for missing comrades of 399 frightened anti-Communist prisoners of war who broke away from 4,800 marching Reds.

The breakaway came during an otherwise orderly evacuation of the fourth trouble-ridden POW enclosure at this United Nations prison camp.

The anti-Red POWs said the missing prisoners had been held before Communist kangaroo courts before the transfer. They didn't report the number.

Death at the hands of their diabolical leaders was the fate of 16 POWs missing from an enclosure emptied Wednesday.

The camp commander, Brig. Gen. Haydon L. Boatner, is expected to order evacuation of a fifth compound, No. 66, Friday. Some of the 2,700 ugly-tempered North Korean officers and 650 non-coms there are reported fashioning knives and spears.

Boatner met Thursday with their leaders, some of whom were shown the smoldering wreckage of Compound 76, the first to be emptied. Thirty-nine prisoners died and at least 150 were injured there in a Tuesday battle with U.S. paratroopers. The 39th death was reported Thursday. Many of the 39 were spared to death by fellow Reds.

MAIL HITS GLIDE

LA GRANDE, Ore. (AP)—The Oregon Grange, holding its annual convention here, was to take action Thursday on the controversial loyalty oath resolution.

The resolution calls for a law to deny teachers and state officers salaries unless they sign anti-Communist oaths.

In Wednesday action the Grange approved resolutions calling for creation of a federal foot and mouth disease laboratory, uniform traffic laws among states and a state ground-water code.

Disapproved were resolutions opposing cloud seeding to increase rainfall and making the State Game Commission liable for damage to farms by hunters and game animals. A proposed \$200 bounty on cougars also was rejected.

WASHINGTON (AP)—John J. McCloy told the Senate Thursday Russia is waging a mighty campaign of "terror and conquest" to try to keep West Germany from joining the free world's alliance against Communism.

The U.S. high commissioner in Germany said so in appealing to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to give swift approval to the peace contract with West Germany and to a pact granting the new nation full guarantees in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

"There is one massive threat to this peaceful, progressive development in Germany," McCloy said. "It comes from the Kremlin," he said, adding:

"The Communists are now engaged in a mighty campaign to prevent German ratification of the agreements and German participation in the growing European unity."

McCloy, who has been directing American policy in West Germany for two years, predicted the Bonn parliament will ratify the peace contract and join an all-European army despite Russia's violent threats.

He foresaw the first German troop contingents in uniform by 1953 — if all countries ratify the present agreements speedily.

BERLIN (AP)—The Soviet Zone government decreed Thursday an extension of its shoot-to-kill security measures to include the border around Berlin as well as the frontier with West Germany.

An order signed by Communist boss Walter Ulbricht, deputy prime minister, directed the state security police to "extend generally" the measures begun at first on the interzonal frontier to "hinder the entrance of diversions, spies and terrorists in the territory of the German Democratic Republic."

Queen Votes Will Leave
Seven Girls In Contest

Seven Douglas County girls will remain in the running for Centennial queen, after the counting of votes late Saturday night.

Opposition
To Germany
Split-up Told

Allied Army Withdrew
150 Miles To Location
'Picked By Politicians'

NEW YORK (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower said Thursday he opposed the division of Germany into separate zones at the end of the war and also was against isolating Berlin.

He made the statement in answer to questions put to him by members of the New Jersey Republican delegation.

Eisenhower also said he did not participate in either the Yalta or Potsdam conferences and that his advice was not accepted on the decisions taken there.

A delegate asked directly whether the establishment of the line of demarcation between the Allied and Russian armies in Germany was Eisenhower's decision.

"I was opposed to the division of Germany into separate parts," he said, "that was one of the pieces of advice that was not accepted."

The delegate then asked who did establish the zones, and the isolation of Berlin as a partially Allied city within the Soviet Zone.

"The European advisory commission took these actions. Later I understood they were approved at Yalta."

Politicians Prevailed

"As soon as the armistice was signed, we were directed to get back into our own areas as rapidly as possible. We were forced to retreat 150 miles after the war—we had been attacking as far down as Leipzig—and we had to go back to the line picked by the politicians."

Earlier Gov. Frederick G. Payne of Maine conferred with the candidate for the Republican presidential nomination. Payne said he thinks Eisenhower "can swamp the convention and swamp the election."

The governor was one of a steady stream of Republican supporters and convention delegates who have been calling on Eisenhower at his Columbia University home this week.

4 Charges Faced
At Myrtle Creek

Hearings before a jury on four charges against a Myrtle Creek man are slated to start today in Myrtle Creek Recorder G. D. Mylneback's court.

Myrtle Creek police identified the defendant as John Smith and said the charges grew out of a "cops and robbers" chase several weeks ago at Myrtle Creek.

Smith is accused of operating a vehicle with expired license plates, no driver's license, failure to stop at an accident and resisting arrest. He pleaded innocent to all of them.

It all started, police said, when Myrtle Creek Chief Orville Corbett spotted a car reportedly with expired license plates.

He chased the car and in stopping it scraped fenders with the vehicle. Corbett backed his police car away and Smith sped out again, police said.

Corbett stopped him again and pulled him out of his car and into the patrol car. Smith tried to get out, officers said, but Corbett subdued him with a tear gas pen.

Smith is presently in the county jail on another charge involving violation of a Myrtle Creek nuisance ordinance. He had been granted probation on a 30-day jail sentence but was later re-jailed on a charge of violating terms of the probation.

Money For County Fair
Allotted To Douglas

Douglas County will receive \$2,779.69 this week as its share of the county fair apportionments from the state, it was announced today.

A total of \$65,808.44 is being distributed among Oregon's 36 counties. The amount is based on a tax levy of one-twentieth of a mill upon taxable property in the state.

In addition to the fair fund, each county gets \$259.85 for the county road fund. This is the surplus divided beyond the \$16,500 fair money to which each county is limited by law.

Value of taxable property in Douglas County was set at \$62,812,150.92 for the fair levy.
