

Obsolete Ordinances Still Clutter City's Code, Awaiting Tardy Repeal

In Roseburg it's against the law to operate a laundry on almost all of the city's major streets.

It's provided in a city ordinance that there shall be no laundries on Douglas, Washington, Oak, Maple, Cass, Lane, Stephens, Rose, Jackson, Main, Kane, Chadwick or Spruce streets.

And that makes some of Roseburg's finest laundries, including that managed by City Councilman Jack Hart on South Stephens, liable for fines of \$10 to \$40 provided in one of the city's first or-

remain in effect, while others, even stranger to present day citizens, have been repealed.

If, for instance, your youngster has measles, it is provided in the law that a blue flag at least 10 by 12 inches must hang from the side of your house facing the street.

The color of the flag must be red for scarlet fever or diphtheria and yellow for smallpox.

This city measure, too, has not been repealed and if you don't comply, a \$25 to \$50 fine is provided. The ordinance was passed in 1902.

No Hitching To Lamp Posts Back in the summer of '87, the



ordinances, passed May 25, 1882.

The ordinance though includes a "provided however," it says, "it shall be lawful for any woman who has been lawfully married and has legitimate child or children to support" to operate such an establishment on the streets.

The ordinance has not yet been repealed, and therefore — theoretically — is still in effect. The City Council is in the process of repealing the laundry measure and is expected to pass an amend-

Furthermore it was unlawful in "the good old days" to drive at speeds greater than six miles per hour and those who did break this limit were subject to fines up to \$50.



Russia Rejects Plan For Military Ceilings

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. — Russia Tuesday rejected a Western plan for voluntary ceilings on the armed forces of the big powers.

Soviet Delegate Jakob A. Malik told the U.N. Disarmament Commission the proposal of the United States, Britain and France was designed to prevent a real reduction of arms and to avoid prohibition of atomic weapons.

The plan had been offered as a one-third reduction of armed forces of the big powers.

The Western countries proposed that the Soviet Union, the United States and China limit their forces to 11 million men each and that Britain and France agree to ceilings of 800,000 men each.

American Samoa is about 900 miles south of the Equator and just east of the international date line.

Price Limit Ban On Fresh Fruits, Vegetables Asked

WASHINGTON — The National Potato Council Monday asked the House Banking Committee to approve an amendment exempting fresh fruits and vegetables from price controls.

Whitney Tharin, the council executive secretary, called the committee's attention to such an amendment which had been adopted by the Senate. He urged that the terms of the amendment be written into a new Defense Production Act now being considered.

In a letter to committee chairman Spencer D. Kelly, Tharin said the recent "decontrolling of white fresh potatoes by the Office of Price Stabilization in no way lessens the need for exempting fresh fruits and fresh vegetables from price ceilings."

OPS took its decontrol action on potato ceilings the day after the Senate decided by voice vote to exempt fresh fruits and vegetables.

Tharin said the industry "is fearful that some future expediency might prompt OPS to again put potatoes under price ceilings."

MUNSAN, Korea — The Korean armistice talks resumed Wednesday with the Communists protesting new bloodshed on Kojedo Island and repeating old accusations that brought about a three-day walkout by the United Nations delegation.

Gen. Mark Clark, U. N. Far East commander, told the top Red commanders he fully approved the walkout which obviously caught the Reds off balance and brought a stream of protests from them.

In a letter delivered to North Korean Gen. Kim Il Sung and Chinese Gen. Peng Teh-Huai, Clark wrote:

"Delegates of the United Nations command have endured for many days your maliciously false charges based on distortions and half truths presented in plenary sessions only for propaganda purposes. Their patience at all times has been commendable. The manner in which they have conducted negotiations meets with my full approval."
