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Motive In Killing Of Aged Salem Woman Sought

SALEM (AP)—Police Tuesday still had not found a motive for the ax-slaying here over the week end of 81-year-old Mrs. Susan A. Litchfield.

A roomer, Harold Shell, 30, found her body in a woodshed near her modest Salem rooming house Sunday. She had been struck 12 times with a sharp instrument, apparently an ax or hatchet.

Police said they had found blood specks and a bone sliver in the bathroom of the Litchfield home. They speculated that the killer had washed up after slaying the woman.

Brutus Ashcroft, accused of the gunshot slaying of a Silverton constable in "nother week-end tragedy, Monday was given 10 days to enter his plea.

The constable, Emory J. Jackson, was shot and killed in the Ashcroft home at Silverton Sunday. Mrs. Ashcroft, wife of the accused man, said Monday that earlier reports that she had called the constable because her husband was quarreling with their son-in-law were not true.

She declined to say who called Jackson to the Ashcroft home or why.

Presbyterians To Retain Church Affiliations

ALBANY, Ore. (AP)—The United Presbyterian Church will remain affiliated with the National and World Councils of Churches, commissioners decided Wednesday.

The action was taken at the final session of the denomination's 94th annual assembly here.

Opposition to affiliation was expressed in pamphlets circulated before the vote on the issue.

The assembly also approved a revised report on social welfare. Much of the original report was rejected—including a portion which criticized the Chicago Presbytery for "doing nothing" about the race riots at Cicero, Ill., last year.

"Dangers of marriages between persons of sharply differing religious backgrounds," was cited in the report and ministers were urged to discuss the matter with young couples planning marriage.

A proposal for liberalizing the Church's stand on remarriage of divorced persons was turned down. A committee reported a church membership of 217,644 last Dec. 31. The Church owns property valued at more than \$6 million dollars and indebtedness for church buildings is a little more than \$3 million, the committee reported.

Carlisle, Pa., was selected as the site of next year's assembly, to open June 4.

GOP Governors Jab Taft Backers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Ten Republican governors — all Eisenhower-for-president men — accused backers of Sen. Robert Taft Tuesday of trying to put party control under a small clique.

The governors' statement did not name Taft, but the targets of their attack were clearly identified as they challenged that a wing of the party jeopardized chances of a Republican victory in November by overriding majority wishes in Texas, Louisiana and Georgia.

The statement, put out by Rep. Cotton of New Hampshire, said that by naming rump delegates from the three states to the GOP convention, the party wing was driving away potential Republican votes.

Listed as signers of the statement were Govs. Sherman Adams of New Hampshire, C. Elmer Anderson of Minnesota, Edward F. Arn of Kansas, Alfred E. Driscoll of New Jersey, Walter J. Kohler Jr. of Wisconsin, John Davis Lodge of Connecticut, Douglas McKay of Oregon, Frederick G. Payne of Maine, Val Peterson of Nebraska and Dan Thornton of Colorado.

Halt Political Squabble, U.N. Asks South Koreans

PUSAN, Korea (AP)—The United Nations has urged the South Korean government to halt its political squabbles for 10 days to ease tension the U.N. said is threatening the republic with chaos.

The U.N. proposal was handed the government Sunday night. It also suggested that President Syngman Rhee lift martial law from this temporary capital and release 11 national assemblymen held on charges of conspiracy against the government.
