

College Booster Will Be Probed

PORTLAND (AP)—College booster clubs will come under scrutiny of the Pacific Coast Conference in the coming year.

A conference spokesman said the clubs — which annually contribute thousands of dollars to help athletes in school — would be asked to open their records to examination.

Colleges also will be asked to report on all direct and indirect aid contributed by the clubs.

If any club does not co-operate, the college will be told to divorce itself from all activities of the club and its members, said the spokesman, H. P. (Dick) Everest, acting president of the University of Washington.

All this is part of the conference's attempt to run professional football out of college sports.

In a previous session of the annual conference meeting here, officials also directed Conference Commissioner Victor Schmidt to hire as many investigators as he needs to run down all rumors of illegal recruiting or subsidization.

The spokesman, who announced these matters after closed sessions of conference officials, also said the conference was disciplining its own transgressors.

He refused to say who or what these were, adding that a year ago, when the conference quit fining erring schools, the decision was made to keep all such matters secret.

Everest said only that three

schools at a request made by the conference a year ago, had punished coaching staff members for violations of the conference code.

He also said two new cases since had arisen and these were being referred for action to the presidents of the colleges involved.

He termed all these flagrant cases and said he would not report on the handling of minor violations.

He announced two changes for basketball. One will limit varsity and junior varsity teams to 27 games a season, freshman teams to 18. These do not include playoff or tournament games.

The other re-establishes a spring basketball season, which had been ruled out last year. It will consist of 20 sessions in 24 calendar days.

Basketball coaches decided to delay until December a decision on whether to hold title playoffs on a neutral floor. At present the playoffs are on the campus of one of the participants, the site alternating yearly between Northern and Southern Divisions.

Pee Wee Baseball Registration Increasing Fast Despite Rain

Despite rain and a mucky diamond, the Pee Wee summer baseball turnout continues to grow by leaps and bounds.

At the latest tally, made Wednesday night, 129 youngsters between 6 and 14 had signed up. After a first-day registration of 81, (20 over the same day last year), the total was boosted with 34 Tuesday and 14 more Wednesday.

Coach Hal Zurcher points out that the three-day total exceeds the registrations for two weeks in 1951.

Operations have been hampered considerably by rain in the last two days, completely washing out practices Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons. However, practices continue between showers with primary emphasis on "loosening up." Zurcher is instructing the youngsters on the rudiments of fielding flies and ground balls.

Battling practice is getting only a light brush in this early stage of the season. Zurcher plans to give this phase of the game more emphasis later.

In the matter of competition, ideas are apparently in the works to form a league operation of sorts within the system. Details have not been studied thoroughly, but both Mayor Al Flegel and Coach Zurcher have intimated that the possibility is definitely being mulled.

Meanwhile, registrations will continue through the next couple of weeks. Zurcher pointed out that some mothers may be worried about youngsters being hurt by thrown or hit balls and may thus be reticent to allow their boys to register. He discounted the injury potential by reporting that only two boys were hurt last year during the entire program and those injuries were minor.

Padres Edge Sacramento, 1-0; Seals Lose 9th Game In Row

A glance at the Pacific Coast League standings, two and a half months after the season's start, indicates the race is narrowing down to the real contenders.

It may be a four or possibly five team battle right down to the wire. San Diego continues to give every indication that it is in the race to stay. Lefty O'Doul's club, on top for nearly two months, keeps right on winning games.

Wednesday night, held to three hits by the veteran Jess Flores, the Padres nevertheless beat Sacramento, 1-0.

Hollywood, despite a none too impressive offense, is tagging right behind San Diego, two games off the pace, and handed San Francisco its ninth loss in a row Wednesday night, 5-1.

Oakland, riding the crest of a seven-game winning streak, is only four and a half games behind the Padres. The A's defeated Los Angeles 3-1 in 12 innings. Seattle is nine behind, and will be shooting for its twelfth straight win Thursday night against Portland. Wednesday night's encounter was postponed because of wet grounds.

These four, San Diego, Hollywood, Oakland and Seattle, appear to be pennant contenders, based on what they have shown with the season almost half over.

The Angels' loss marked the tenth time in 13 overtime games this year they've come out on the short end. The contest was knotted in the seventh and ended in the twelfth when Jay Ragni's single scored Sam Chapman and Al Gettel — who pitched a seven-inning shutout for Johnny Bero.

San Diego, whose lefty 40-ounce bat is carving into baseball's hitting records, calls himself "just a team man who only hits to win."

"What good is a bunch of home runs if you don't win?" Sauer remarked Wednesday after belting three in the Chicago Cubs 3-2 victory over the Philadelphia Phils.

After the game Sauer pointed to his teammates frolicking around in a gay mood in the shower room. "Do you think if my three homers hadn't won the game they would be acting like that?" he asked. Sauer Knocks 3 To Give Cubs Victory

No one will dare ask Hank Sauer to sit out the 1952 all-star game. The big fellow from Chicago stands out as the leading slugger in all baseball.

From the trend of the early '52 balloting, Sauer may wind up with the most votes of any player in either league. At least he will if he has many more days like Tuesday.

Sauer hammered three of "cousin" Curt Simmons' pitches into the left field bleacher area for a 3-2 Cub win over the Phillies. Sauer's slugging was the big news of the day, although there was much fussing and fuming Tuesday night at St. Louis where both Manager Chuck Dressen and Captain Peeewe Reese of Brooklyn were tossed out of the game with the St. Louis Cardinals. Del Rice's single in the 10th gave the Cards a 3-2 win, slicing the Dodgers' National League lead to four games.

Jim Hearn pitched the New York Giants past Cincinnati, 3-2, with a four hitter and little Murry Dickson of Pittsburgh blanked Boston, 5-0.

The New York Yankees strengthened their American League lead with a 7-2 win over Detroit on Johnny Sain's pitching and home runs by Joe Collins and Yogi Berra.

Washington's Bob Porterfield shut out Cleveland's Bob Lemon, 1-0, to let the Boston Red Sox take over second place with a come-from-behind win over St. Louis, 11-9. The Red Sox blasted Satchel Paige for six in the ninth, including a game winning grand slam homer by catcher Sammy White, ex-University of Washington star.

The Philadelphia A's knocked off Chicago, 5-3, on a four-run rally in the sixth that included a two-run homer by Al Clark, filling in for injured Gus Zernial.

The Red Sox explosion was the most dramatic event in the American as it came against Paige, who has been showing fine relief form. He hadn't allowed a run for 27 innings.

Coasting into the ninth with a comfortable 9-5 lead for Marty Marion's new charges, old Satch loaded the bases on two infield singles and a walk. Vern Stephens popped out but Paige walked Billy Goodman to force in a run. Ted Lepcio's single scored another run and White cleaned the bases — the first homer off Paige this season.

DALLAS (AP)—Two intruders, heat and Ben Hogan, threatened to complicate matters Thursday as the familiar figures of golf's tournament trail began their annual quest for the biggest prize of all, the United States Open Championship.

Hogan, of course, was regarded as the most serious threat as the vanguard of the field of 162 players began to stream down the bottlenecked fairways of the Northwood Course at 9 a. m. (Est).
