The regular meeting of the Roseburg Camp Fire Board was held Monday, June 9 in the Chamber of Commerce Building. Mrs. B. J. Howser, representative from the Camp Fire Leader's Association, reported on the last meeting of the board which was an all day session with demonstrations of outdoor cooking.

Vets' Bonus Payments
Begin Next Wednesday

SALEM (AP) — Payment of Oregon's bonus for World War II veterans will begin next Wednesday, William F. Gaarenstroom, state veterans director, announced yesterday.

He said 31 million dollars will be paid to 75,000 veterans by the end of July.

State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson now is in New York signing the 46 million dollars worth of bonus bonds. The money from the sale of these bonds is expected by Friday.

The average bonus will be \$415, Gaarenstroom said. More than 90,000 veterans have applied for the bonus. Another 40,000 applications are expected by the December 1 deadline.

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Truck-Car Crash Fatal To Woman

KLAMATH FALLS (AP) — A car-truck collision 54 miles north of here Tuesday morning brought death to a Portland Negro woman. Her husband and four children riding in the car were injured.

The victim was Mrs. James Mason. Her husband, suffering from shock, was able to give only a few details. His occupation was not learned immediately but he was carrying a treasurer's book for the All Nations Church of God in Christ, a Portland Negro congregation.

He said Mrs. Mason was driving when the northbound car and a southbound freight truck and trailer sideswiped.

The car overturned into the ditch and Mrs. Mason was killed outright. Most seriously hurt of the children was Glen, 4, with a severe and possibly critical head cut. Fred Mason, 2; Linda Darrell Mason, 3; and Charnett Easley, 15, the last of San Francisco, had lesser cuts and bruises.

The truck, the wheels of its trailer knocked loose, overturned 15 feet

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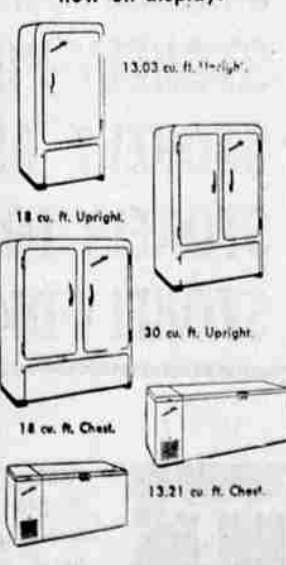


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
