

Roseburg Jrs. Taking League Lead

Drain Beaten 10-6 In 2nd Loop Victory

Hal Zurcher's Roseburg Junior Legion baseball team took at least a temporary lead in the western Douglas County League Friday night at Drain by winning its second victory, 10-6.

Chuck Verrell pitched seven-hit ball while his teammates backed him with 12 hits off two Drain hurlers. The win pinched the Roseburg crew a half a game ahead of Myrtle Creek, which plays at Sutherlin today at 2.

Roseburg Catcher Roger Oilar was the big man with the stick, collecting three singles in four times at the plate. But Jerry Parmeter picked up two singles in four trips to drive in three runs. Don Stumbo and Steve Danchock each collected two for four, also.

Roseburg took the lead in the second inning on a three-run burst and never lost it. A pair of walks set the stage for Oilar's infield single that turned into a run on a bad throw to first. It put men on second and third for Don Stumbo's timely two-run single.

Drain countered with two in the bottom of that frame on Jim Swearingen's double and Don Stoop's single. But Dennis Brundage doubled for Roseburg's only extra base in the top of the third and Parmeter doubled the score to 4-2 with a single.

Drain counter-punched again with a brace of runs to tie the score in the bottom of the third. Dick Joslyn singled and was brought home by Matten's triple. Matten, in turn, scored on a squeeze play.

Roseburg drove Jim Swearingen to the showers in the fourth with another three-run rally that was good for the win. Fred Hargis' single and two walks loaded the bases. Danchock singled to bring in one run and still keep the bases packed for Parmeter's two-run single. For good measure, Roseburg added two runs in the fifth and one more in the sixth.

Verrell struck out seven while giving up only one walk. Swearingen was the loser in four innings, giving up nine hits, seven runs and five walks. He struck out five. His relief, Paul Miller gave up three hits and three runs.

Indians Beat N.Y. 7-1; Tigers Lose

Husky Mike Garcia of the Cleveland Indians, gunning for his second straight 20-victory harvest, is way ahead of his time table.

The powerful 28-year-old right-hander just made the charmed circle last year but at the rate he's going now he'll breeze in with plenty to spare.

Garcia recorded his ninth and most impressive victory of the season Friday night, beating the world champion New York Yankees, 7-1, in the only American League game. Last year at this time Garcia possessed a mediocre 5-4 record.

The "Bear," as he's called by his teammates, stifled the Yanks on four hits, walked only two, struck out ten, batted in two runs and scored two in topping the Yanks' best, Alie Reynolds.

Garcia's near airtight performance, his only slip came in the seventh when he served a home run ball to Yogi Berra, knocked the New Yorkers out of first place. Berra's homer was the first yielded

by Garcia this season. The Bombers slipped to second with the Boston Red Sox taking over the lead by .0004 of a percentage point. The Indians are a close third.

Garcia, who boasts a nifty 1.20 earned-run average, has defeated every team in the league with the exception of Detroit's tail-end Tigers. The Tigers have knocked the Cleveland ace off twice.

Bob Rush, another big right-hander, came up with a brilliant 5-0 three-hit victory for the Chicago Cubs over the Boston Braves in the National League's only game.

Rush walked four and fanned 11 in posting his ninth triumph and fourth shutout. The Cubs tucked the game away in the first inning, pouncing on Vern Borkford for four runs on three singles, a pair of walks and a fly ball.

Bob Addis, a former Brave, led Chicago's nine hit attack with three singles and a double. Hank Sauer, the majors top home run hitter, was held hitless by three Boston pitchers.

Longhorns Eliminate Oregon State 10-1 From NCAA Finals

OMAHA — Penn State and Missouri were the only undefeated teams Saturday as the NCAA baseball tournament entered the second round.

The leaders, each with a 2-0 mark, clash Saturday night (9:30 est.).

Preceding that top attraction, Texas and Holy Cross were matched at 3:35 p.m. (est) and Duke and Western Michigan at 7 p.m. (est). Each of the trailing quartet has a 1-1 record and two are due for departure from the double elimination tournament.

Penn State turned in the top surprise Friday, whipping Duke, the tournament favorite 24 hours ago, 12-7, by out-slugging the Blue Devils at their own game. At the finish Duke was a bit groggy and certainly a trifle off poise.

Jackie Lonergan, a little Holy Cross southpaw who had pitched only 24 innings all season, lost a 1-0 heartbreaker to Missouri. Jackie didn't allow a hit for seven and one-third innings and the deciding run was unearned in the seventh. Junior Wren scored it from third on Shortstop Jack Conannon's error, his first in 83 changes.

Revoking Man's Probation Asked

Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly Friday ordered Walter Lincoln Tooe Jr., 38, of San Francisco, brought before him to show cause why probation on a jail sentence should not be revoked.

Tooe pleaded guilty last May 23 to a charge of taking and using an automobile without consent of its owner and was sentenced to six months in the county jail and was granted probation.

District Attorney Robert M. Stults said Tooe was in the county jail, accused of violating terms of his probation. The violation involved the alleged use of liquor. Stults said, and Tooe was arrested after being involved in a disturbance in Polk County.

Date for the hearing had not been set yet, but it is expected to be held after the first degree murder trial of Daniel Webster Smith, scheduled for next week.

Hogan Takes Lead In U.S. Open Meet

DALLAS, — The Hawk had his claws in another national open championship Saturday.

The Hawk — given the name by Jimmy Demaret because "once he gets his claws in you, he never lets up" is wiry, little Ben Hogan.

Hogan shot his second straight 69 Friday to equal the record of 138 for the first 36 holes of the open.

The field was reduced to the low 50 and ties — those who shot 151 or better for 36 holes.

George Fazio of Clementon, N. J. was at even par 140 after matching Hogan's second - round 69. Johnny Bulla, Pittsburgh, had 141. Bulla shot the tournament's second 68 Friday only to find himself in third place.

Husky Julius Boros of Southern Pines, N. C., the only comparatively young golfer to crash the ranks of the leaders, had his second 71 for 142 and three fortyish veterans were tied at 143. They were 44 year old Horton Smith, the PGA president, Round Ed Oliver, and Lew Worsham of Oakmont, Pa.

Their scores so far: Worsham 72-71; Smith 70-73 and Oliver 71-72.

Hollywood missed a golden opportunity to gain a tie for the Pacific Coast League leadership Friday night by bowing to San Francisco, 1 to 0, but the kind of pitching it faced is the very kind that reduces the most potent hitters to mere swingers.

Bert Elmer (Smokey) Singleton, a native of Ogden, Utah, hurled his best game of the year—a one-hitter, and the victory-hungry Seals ended a 10-game losing streak. Hollywood's Mel Queen pitched creditably, allowing only five hits, but one of them was Will Hafe's fourth-inning homerun, and that was all that was necessary.

San Diego, the Pacific Coast pace-setter for weeks, is showing signs of wear, and Lefty O'Doul's club dropped another Friday night to Sacramento, 6 to 2. The Padres made four errors and only two of Sacramento's runs were earned.

San Diego managed to hold its precarious one-game lead over Hollywood.

Calvin Coolidge McLish hurled a 3 to 0 win for Los Angeles over Oakland as the Angels squared the series at two games each. Leon Brinkopf, Angel third baseman, continued his home run streak, socking his third of the series, as he came out of a protracted batting slump. Brinkopf's blow, in the seventh, won the game.

The game in Los Angeles produced the season's biggest rhabarb. Max West, Angel outfielder, was banished in the fourth for protesting a third strike, and in the sixth, pitcher Jack Powell chased eight other Angels, including Manager Stan Hack, when a towel came sailing out of the Los Angeles dugout.

The Angel banishment was short of the team record, however, for in 1924 Manager Marty Krug and 10 Angels got the umpirical hook.

The Seattle-Portland game was rained out.

4 New Records At NCAA Meet

BERKELEY, Calif. — Four new meet records were already in the books as an Olympic year crop of the nation's top collegiate track and field athletes went into the finals of the National Collegiate Athletic Association championships Saturday.

One other meet standard was equalled.

Yesterday's trials—
1. Gave positive evidence that the United States will send a potent Olympic team to Helsinki, Finland, for the international games next month, especially in the field event; and
2. Made the University of Southern California's role as favorite to win its 16th NCAA team title even more solid. It had nine men qualified for the finals.

The new record holders are George Roseme, University of California, 228 feet 8 3/4 inches in the javelin throw; Parry O'Brien, USC, 57 feet 1/2 inch in the shot put; George Shaw, Columbia, 49 feet 1 1/2 inches in the hop, step and jump; and Gilbert Borjeson, Brown 176 feet 4 1/2 inches in the hammer throw.

Albin Rauch of Princeton won his heat in the 400 meter hurdles in 52.4 seconds to equal the record set by George Walker of Illinois in 1948.
