TWELVE AND WON CLUB MEET AT HARGIS HOME

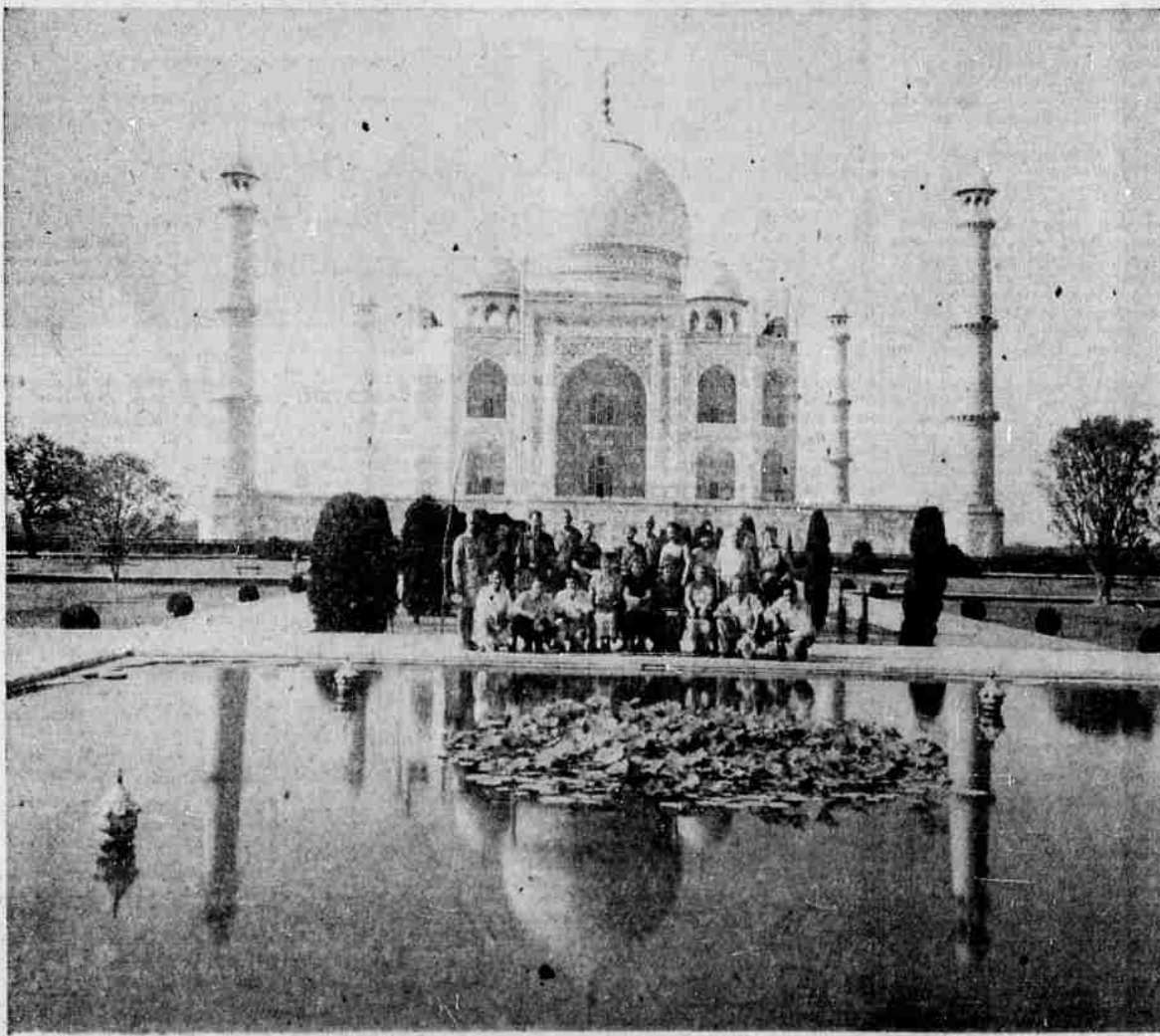
