

Russians Shoot Down Unarmed Swedish Plane

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Surface Ship Saves Crew; 2 Wounded

Attacked Craft Sought Missing One, Believed Also Blasted By Reds

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Soviet fighter planes shot down an unarmed Swedish military search plane off the coast of Estonia Monday, the government announced. The seven-man crew was picked up later by a German merchant ship. Two of the Swedish crew were reported wounded.

The plane was searching for another Swedish Air Force plane missing with eight men aboard in the same area, where the Russians are reported holding vast air and sea maneuvers.

The Swedish government, reflecting the anger of people in the streets, delivered a strong protest to the Russians.

Soviet Ambassador Constantine Rodionov was summoned to the foreign office to receive the protest personally from Prime Minister Tage Erlander, who is also foreign minister.

Crowds in front of the Soviet embassy jeered Rodionov as he left and spat into the embassy compound.

Sweden demanded an immediate investigation and prompt punishment of "those responsible for the outrage."

Spying Halt Demanded

Erlander also delivered a second request to the Russians that they halt further espionage activity by their diplomats in Sweden. This note referred specifically to the trial, which opened here Monday of seven Swedes charged with selling out this nation's entire vital northern defense system to the Russians.

The Swedish military plane, an unarmed Catalina, was searching for a Swedish Air Force transport missing since Friday. It is feared that plane also was shot down by the Russians during their maneuvers.

This would be a fate similar to one met by a U. S. Navy Privateer aircraft which disappeared in the same area two years ago with 10 men aboard.

12-Mile Limit Claimed

The Catalina was attacked about 60 miles off the Soviet-held Estonian coast. Swedish planes searching for the missing craft had been instructed to keep 15 miles off the Russian-held coast. The Russians claim 12 miles out as their own special territory.

Johan Fritiof Enbom, 33, Communist agitator and editor described as the master mind of the seven-man spy ring, pleaded guilty as the trial opened. He faces a life sentence.

The state disclosed existence of the spy ring last February. Secrets of the vast underground Boden Fortress, bastion against any Soviet invasion across Finland, were involved.

4 Oregon Convicts Attempt To Escape Segregation Unit

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — Four desperate convicts, including a murderer awaiting execution, were blocked early Monday in their attempt to escape from the penitentiary's segregation unit, where the worst prisoners are kept, Warden Virgil O'Malley said.

Two of them saved their way out of their cells and were caught trying to get into a tunnel when prison guards caught them at 1:15 a.m.

These two men are Wayne Long, 28, awaiting execution for a murder committed in Multnomah County; and Albert Dugan, 40, serving 30 years as an habitual criminal.

Two other convicts succeeded in spreading the bars of their cells, but they were still locked up when the plot was discovered.

They are Dupree Poe, serving life for killing a Silverton policeman, and Walter J. Sampson, doing 10 years for assault and robbery.

Long, Sampson and Poe have been involved in numerous attempted escapes.

Sampson was shot while attempting to scale the prison wall last September.

Rural School Districts Vote On Levies, Boards

Daniel W. Smith Placed On Trial On Murder Count

Selection Of Jury Takes Up First Day

Case Follows Shotgun Killing At Camas Valley Of J. H. Jenkins, Logger

The first degree murder trial of Daniel Webster Smith, 70, accused shotgun slayer, began this morning before Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

The trial opened with questioning of prospective jurors by District Attorney Robert M. Stults and Defense Attorney Paul Geddes.

Smith is accused of blasting a 37-year-old logger John Henry Jenkins with a 16-gauge shotgun as the younger man sat in a pickup truck in front of the Smith residence on upper Camas Road.

The shooting took place last May 12 after both men had been drinking during the day and reportedly after an argument, according to police reports.

Jenkins' blood-smeared body was found beneath the pickup that evening by several youths who live in the vicinity.

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Super Market Will Rise For Drive-In At \$150,000 Cost

Plans for building a new super market on North Stephens street (Pacific Highway) at an estimated cost of \$150,000 were disclosed today by the operators of the City Drive-In Market.

A site for the new store has been purchased across the street and slightly north of the present establishment.

Construction on the new building containing 21,000 feet of floor space, is expected to start early in July.

Owners and operators of City Drive-In, who announced the expansion plans, are Harold Tidwell, Charles Tidwell, Harold Davidson and Henry Crowdis. The four Roseburg men have been operating the present City Drive-In Market for three years.

Bids for the 140 by 160-foot building will be opened June 30. Parking space around the store will be provided for more than 100 cars. The parking area will be lighted by eight flood lights on steel poles.

The store will be of laminated arch and beam construction so that no pillars or posts will be needed to support the roof. Floors and walls will be of poured concrete.

The spacious new store will use glass extensively. Fifty-five feet of the front section will be of glass with two sets of double glass doors.

For convenience of shoppers during bad weather a canopy will overhang the front area which also has parking space for loading of groceries.

The two candidates leading the delegate races for the presidential nominations have made it clear in face-to-face debate they are poles apart on both domestic and foreign issues.

Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee and Robert A. Taft of Ohio voiced agreement on only one thing—that corruption in government will be a major campaign issue.

They clashed on a television program (NBC) after Republican Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, also on a NBC-TV show, strongly indicated he will "take a walk" from the party—or at least will remain silent in the campaign—if Taft is nominated.

"It's very doubtful that with intellectual honesty I could possibly make a speech in behalf of Robert Taft," said Morse, a supporter of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower. "but I won't go out and campaign against him."

Asked if he might vote for the opposition candidate in the event of Taft's nomination, Morse—frequently at odds with his own party in the Senate—replied: "That all

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Rodeo's Parade Route Mapped; More Entry Time

Jackson, Mosher and Main streets will be used as the route for the Douglas County Sheriff's posse rodeo parade, scheduled for Saturday at 10:30 a.m.

The parade, which will be conducted by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, will be a prelude to the two-day rodeo, scheduled for Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

Dr. Verner J. Anderson, chairman of the parade committee, said the formation will take place north of the triangle on Jackson, and on Winchester St. and E. 2nd Ave. So. The procession will go south on Jackson to Mosher St., turn east to Main, and proceed north to the Courthouse, where it will disperse.

Commercial and non-commercial entries, as well as marching units and horsemen will take part in the parade, which last year was nearly a mile in length.

Dr. Anderson said the Jaycees are hopeful the parade will be at least equal or better last year's event, and urged early filing of entry blanks. The deadline of last Saturday for float entries has been set back to permit as many possible to take place.

Grandsweep award for the outstanding entry will be \$25. In addition, first, second and third place prizes in non-commercial and commercial entries will be \$75, \$50 and \$10, respectively.

An entry will consist of one vehicle or float, and a separate entry blank must be used for each and every entry. Commercial entries must pay \$15 fee. There is no fee for other participants.

The other day President Truman asked the congress (at a joint session of the house and senate assembled in the house chamber) for power to seize and operate the struck steel industry.

The senate listened to his plan, then:

1. It rejected, by a vote of 68 to 12, a plan by Senator Maybank to ban strikes in essential industries for 120 days and permit seizure if either side rejected settlement terms proposed by a government board.

2. It turned down, 58 to 28, a proposal by Senator Monroney to seize after seven days notice to the disputants and two days notice to congress, which would then have 15 days to veto the seizure.

3. It defeated, 47 to 32, a move by Senator Humphrey to empower
