BLM To Crack Down On 40-Acre Leases

WASHINGTON — The Bureau of Land Management announced Friday it is working on regulations aimed to "curb the activity of speculators" in oil and gas leases on federal lands.

Director Marion Clawson said that meantime all land offices have been ordered to stop processing applications for 40-acre leases, effective as of June 11.

"The stop order was issued pending regulations which will permit the leasing of small acreages by legitimate drillers and prospectors," the announcement said.

The OPS spokesman, reporting this Friday, said the new regulation probably will be issued early next week, to become effective July 1.
