

Chiefs Blanked Twice By Coos Bay Pitching Power Beats Roseburg

The Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks began to loom over the Southwestern Oregon baseball horizon like an impending scourge, at the completion of five weeks of play.

Turning loose a murderous crew of batsmen, the 'Jacks notched their fifth and sixth consecutive wins Saturday and Sunday. Two hurlers from the almost bottomless bag of pitching talent paired to whitewash the Chiefs, 3-0, and, 9-0. The Chiefs could match neither the batting power nor the pitching performances.

Big Spur held the defense at short, but his bad form check Saturday night, but made the mistake of pitching to Dick Wenner in the first inning. With two men on bases, Spurr was going to give him a free pass and set up a double-play situation, but changed his mind. Wenner repaid the kindness by slashing a two-run single. It was good enough for the win.

Meanwhile, former Coast Leaguer and Wil Spokane Indian, Al Trichel allowed only four hits in spite of his tantalizing deliveries. But this wasn't the darkest half of the weekend. With Ward Rocky completely handcuffing the Chiefs with five hits, the blasting 'Jacks rattled three Roseburg hurlers for 14 hits Sunday afternoon.

Eight of these came off starter Stan Aune, who made his debut in Chiefs uniform and lasted 2-3 innings. He walked Lou Scrivens, gave up a single to Darryl Nelson, and then saw Glenn Stetter hammer out a 335-foot homer over the left field fence. These were the first three men to face him, and they started the scoring parade. Three more singles that inning scored one more.

He gave up another three singles before being relieved by Mickey Coen in the third, who put out another Lumberjack rally. The host slugging got to Coen, however, in the next four innings. A walk and a pair of singles scored two in the fourth. A trio of one-baggers brought in two more in the fifth, and Dick Wenner's triple in the sixth set up another run. After retiring the 'Jacks without mishap in the seventh, Coen was relieved by Ken Ayres, who looked as good as his predecessors on the mound.

Drain Black Sox Blast 2 Wins Off Brookings Team

Like a reeling hulk on a rock-bound coast, the Brookings Beavers baseball ship is being shattered by every team in the Southwestern Oregon League shoals.

Sunday, the Drain Black Sox pounded the Beavers to pieces in a doubleheader at the Drain park. The Sox put together 17 hits in the nine-inning first game to win, 13-2; the added 16 hits in the seven-inning nightcap for a 12-0 victory. The fourth double loss by the Beavers gave them a record of 0-8 and dropped them six games behind the leaders.

Playing both games with a total roster of nine men, including pitching staff, the Beavers were no match for the masterful pitching of Gene Peterson and Roy Helser, nor could they cope with the Sox hitting parade. Peterson gave up only four hits in his nine-inning stint, and Helser white-washed the Beavers with two.

Meanwhile, the Black Sox batters began writing on the wall early in the first game. In the second inning, every hit was an extra-baser. Pat Wohlers opened with a double, Ron Phillips added a double, Pitcher Gene Peterson clipped his opponent Vic Lapiner for a triple and Don Kirsch ended the hitting spree with a double. It was still a close 4-3 battle going into the fifth, but Drain exploded with four singles and another double by Wohlers for five runs. Kirsch led the heavy hitters for the game with three singles and a double in five trips. It was the fourth inning of the

second game which turned it into a rout. Seve singles and Harvey Storey's double added up to six runs. The Sox stacked on five more tallies in the fifth, which Roy Helser led off with a booming homer over the right field fence. Storey had three for three in the slugfest. Former Roseburg Chief Norvall Ritchie hit three for five.

Hollywood narrowed the gap last week by winning its series with San Francisco, 4-3, while the Padres fell victim to Sacramento, 4-3. When the clubs clashed for the first time earlier in the season, Fred Haney's boys made off with four victories in six games. If the Stars can do better this time, Lefty O'Doul's gang will be out of the top spot for the first time since April 16.

In other encounters this week it's San Francisco at Sacramento, Seattle at Oakland and Portland at Los Angeles.

San Diego swept a doubleheader from the last place Solons Sunday 8-6 and 3-1.

Sacramento's only run in the nightcap came on three singles off Ken Flowers, who made it his fourth victory against no losses.

At Portland Seattle shut out the Beavers 2-0 and took the seven inning second game 3-2. Al Lyons' tenth home run of the year provided the winning run in the curtain raiser.

In the finale Walt Judnich clouted a four-bagger to put the Rainiers in the lead. Portland tied it up but Seattle made it 3-1 in the fifth on a single, a sacrifice, two more singles.
