Four Projects Get U.S. Okey

SEATTLE, Wash. — Four additional Northwest civil works projects have been certified by the President, it was announced by the Army Corps of Engineers. The four were among the 15 certified for a total of \$1,129,300.

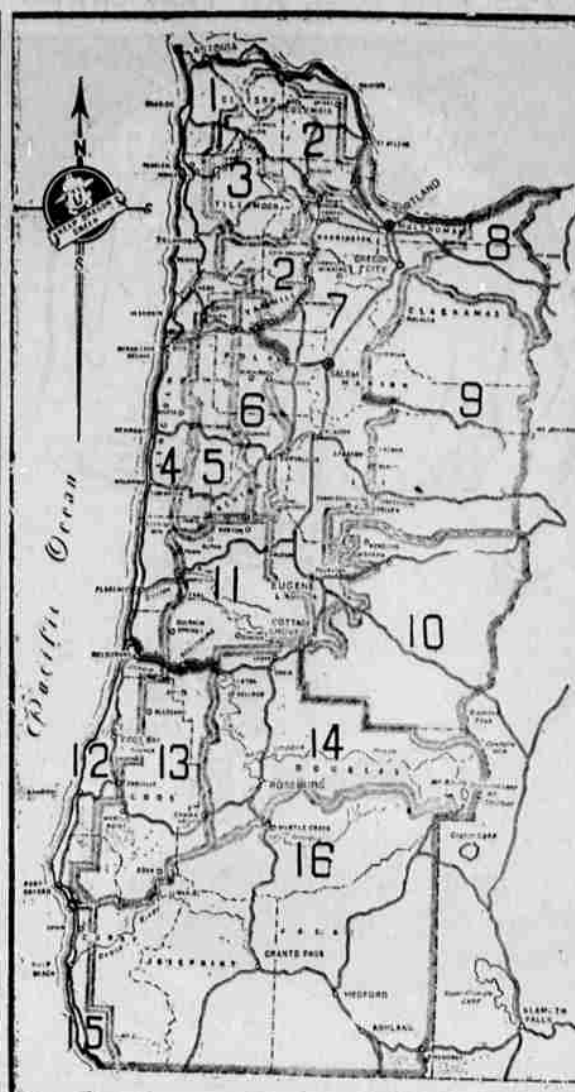
Newly certified among the projects provided approved for planning work this fiscal year are the Libby reservoir, Montana, \$150,000 and Hills Creek reservoir, Oregon, \$115,000. Projects on which planning work will be started are Sandy Drainage district, Oregon, \$50,000, and Eagle Gorge reservoir, Washington, \$75,000.

Travis Base Key To Armed Forces Airmail

TRAVIS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. — Some 10 to 15 tons of military air mail destined for men in Korea, as well as those who serve at other Pacific Theater bases, goes through this base every day.

First stop for overseas mail, after leaving a local post-office, is the Ferry Annex in San Francisco. Here the outbound mail is sorted by Army Post Office (APO) or Fleet Post Office (FPO) number and by particular units and pouched for shipment. It is then trucked to Travis AFB, Military Air Transport Service's center of operations for the Pacific Coast and loaded for air transport to either Hickam AFB in Hawaii or Hamed AFB, Japan. Those are the two main Pacific area distribution points from which the mail goes to the different military post offices for distribution.

FOREST ZONE CLOSURE SYSTEM STARTED — The map pictured above indicates the forest zones established by the Oregon State Board of Forestry in connection with Operation Close-Down. When hazardous weather requires the state forester to issue close-down orders to the timber industry, only those zones will be affected where conditions force such action. Douglas County timber lies in six zones. Zone 14 includes the major part of the operation between the summit of the Cascade and Coast ranges of mountains, except for Zone 16, which includes that part of the county drained by the South Umpqua River above the town of Myrtle Creek, and Zone 11, which takes in part of the county north of the Umpqua River. The coastal area is divided between zones 4, north of the Umpqua; Zone 12, south of the Umpqua, and Zone 13, the west slope of the Coast Range.
