

Education Board Approves Higher Schools' Work

PORTLAND — The State Board of Higher Education Building Committee Monday approved spending funds for building work at Oregon State College, the University of Oregon Medical School and Oregon College of Education.

Included was \$94,330 for field construction, planting and other preliminary work on the Oregon State College stadium project. The stadium, when completed, would seat some 22,000.

The committee also authorized \$111,000 for converting a pavilion structure at the OSC men's gymnasium for use in a new filter system for men's and women's swimming pools.

Approved spending \$84,500 for remodeling laboratories at the medical school.

Approved spending \$29,000 for rehabilitating physical education and athletic facilities at Oregon College of Education at Monmouth.

An offer of the Fairmount Church of Christ, Eugene, to sell two buildings and two lots for \$45,000 was accepted. The property is within the boundaries of the University of Oregon campus.

A gas will fill any vacant space in which it is placed.

Water Safety Urged Here By YMCA Swimming Expert

"Reckless use of out-of-bounds exhibitionism, and failure of poor swimmers to recognize their own limitations, will be among the major factors contributing to drownings here this summer."

This was the opinion voiced today by Merlin Donaldson, aquatic expert of the Roseburg YMCA, as he listed basic rules for water safety at the beaches, rivers, lakes and ponds near Roseburg.

Pointing out that approximately 100 million persons in this country can't swim, the "Y" official says that the surest way to avert summer tragedy is to learn to swim competently.

He urges parents to encourage their offspring to acquire swimming skills at the supervised pool in Roseburg as the first step toward safe holidays.

"There is no reason why virtually every child in this city should not be a competent swimmer. Skill in water sports not only builds a child physically but develops in him or her a healthy attitude of self reliance. The ability to swim may also mean the difference between life and death at some time in the future."

"Since children are the most likely candidates for waterfront mishaps, parents should be aware at all times as to the whereabouts of their children when the family group is vacationing at the waterside."

Equally lax, he added, were those mothers and fathers who en-

trust their children to wren-out inner tubes and water wings of doubtful buoyancy. If a child cannot swim, he warned, he or she should not be placed in a situation where chance can be a deciding factor.

QUITS FEDERAL POST

PORTLAND — E. Harvey Miller, chairman of the Oregon Production and Marketing Committee, said Monday he will resign July 1.

Miller joined the federal farm program in 1946. He said he is leaving to devote more time to his wheat and livestock ranch in Eastern Oregon near Heppner.

Farm Price Peg At 90 Per Cent Parity Okayed

WASHINGTON — The House Agriculture Committee Tuesday approved a bill to peg farm price supports at 90 per cent of parity for cotton, wheat, corn, peanuts, rice and tobacco.

The bill fixes a floor under price supports on these basic commodities through 1955.

Present legislation permits a sliding scale under which supports for these crops can range between 75 and 90 per cent of parity. The Agriculture Department has announced it will support 1952 crops at 80 per cent.

As it goes to the House, the new bill also would require that the 1953 parity price for these

crops be the higher parity price computed under either the original parity formula or the modernized formula adopted three years ago.

The 90 per cent price support would apply except where producers have disapproved marketing quotas.

Parity is the price for crops the government determines is fair to the farmer in relation to the things he buys.

Two Year Extension

Since 1950 farmers have been allowed parity prices for the basic crops computed on the old formula, which afforded higher prices this legislation extends this permission for another two years.

However, this actually would not affect rice and tobacco, which are not covered by the new formula.

The American Farm Bureau Federation and the National Federation of Agriculture have testified before the committee while Secretary of Agriculture Brannan and the National Farmers Union supported it.
