CHICAGO — A title showdown between medalist Betty Rawls and defending champion Patty Berg loomed Wednesday although the Women's Western Open golf tournament entered only its second round.

Miss Rawls, feminine golfer's top 1952 money-winner with almost \$10,000 moved against an unheralded amateur as the queen bee of five upper bracket pros.

In the lower bracket, Miss Berg — seeking an unprecedented fifth open crown — matched strokes with a capable, but underdog amateur, Carol Dyringer of Tiffin, Ohio.

Miss Rawls' foe was Mrs. Dwight Anneaux of Hinsdale, Ill. The three other upper bracket matches feature four pros, Peggy Kirk, Louise Suggs, Marilyn Smith and Bett MacKinnon.

Miss Kirk, a 22-hole survivor in Tuesday's first round, faces amateur Pat Leith of Elgin, Ill., the winner to face the Rawls-Anneaux victor Thursday.

'Old Timers' Signing For Benefit Tilt

Was poker-faced Paul Richards talking with tongue in cheek the other day when he praised the New York Yankees to the skies and moaned "How can you beat 'em?"

Those who know the clever Chicago pilot believe he was trying to lull the world champions into a false sense of security and at the same time present a challenge to his own White Sox.

In any event, from a listless bunch of second divisioners, Chicago has again become the "Go-Go Sox" of the early 1951 campaign.

Giving every evidence that they have pennant designs of their own, the White Sox Tuesday night swept a doubleheader from the Philadelphia Athletics, 13-1 and 2-1, to roll up their eighth and ninth wins in the last 11 games.

The double win moved them to within a half game of the faltering Cleveland Indians and boosted them to within only three games of the front-running Yankees.

Chicago picked up ground on all the leaders as Detroit nipped the Yankees, 7-6, the St. Louis Browns beat Boston's Red Sox, 3-1 and Washington whipped the Indians, 4-3.

Brooklyn increased its National League lead to four games, wallowing the Chicago Cubs, 9-1 as Pittsburgh upset the second place New York Giants, 6-2.

Boston moved into a sixth place tie with Philadelphia, crushing Cincinnati, 5-1 while the Phils were held to a split in their doubleheader with the St. Louis Cardinals.

After Curt Simmons had pitched the Phils to a 2-1 triumph in the opener, Al Brazle and Ed Yuhas teamed up to shut them out 4-0 in the nightcap.

Lefty Blyler and right-hander Marvin Grissom turned in fine performances in the White Sox double win. Pierce hurled a six-hitter for his seventh win and Grissom gave up seven hits for his fourth triumph.

Eddie Robinson and Minnie Mingo were the big guns as Chicago ripped off 25 hits in the twin bill.

Congdon Leading For Pro Berth

OLYMPIA, Wash. — Chuck Congdon of Tacoma leads Pacific Northwest professional golfers competing for berths in this year's Hudson Cup matches, Olympia pro Dave Killen said Tuesday.

Killen, secretary of the Northwest section of the Professional Golfers Association, said Congdon has rolled up 475 points in five tournaments. He has three tournaments to go.

The Northwest's ten top professionals will meet the ten best amateurs in the Hudson Cup matches at Pendleton, Ore., in October. The pros are chosen on their performances in eight tournaments. Robert Hudson, sponsor of the tourney, names the amateurs.

Killen said Ray Honsberger of Clarkston, Wash., follows Congdon with 220 points. Others on the list are Frank Newell, Tacoma, 180 points; Emory Zimmerman, Portland, 150; Eddie Hogan, Portland, 115; John Langford, Portland 88 1-3 Bud Ward, Great Falls, Mont., 75; Killen, 72 1-3; Harold West, Pendleton, 70; Larry Lamberger, Portland, 55; Jim Christie, Seattle, 50; and Bob McKendrick, Portland 38 1-3.

Layne-Walcott Match Planned

NEW YORK — International Boxing Club officials are scheduled to meet again Wednesday with Marvin Jensen, manager of Rex Layne, on a proposed heavyweight boxing title match with champion Jersey Joe Walcott.

Jensen met with Walcott's manager Tuesday and said things looked "very favorable" for the bout at Ogden, Utah, Stadium, either July 30 or 31. The Stadium can accommodate 30,000. Jensen said after conferring with Felix Boocchiechio, Walcott's manager, in the IBC offices.

Layne was awarded a 10-round decision over Walcott in November, 1950, about eight months before he took the heavyweight title from Charles.
