BALTIMORE (W) — A natty, knotty-pine club cellar is no place to deliver a tank full of oil, the Murray P. Smiths complained Tuesday in a \$15,000 suit against the Esso Standard Oil Co.

They alleged in their Superior Court suit that last December a Standard Oil man drew up to their home, hooked up his hose to their fuel pipe outside the house and pumped away—without any warning.

The fuel line had been disconnected inside the house the Smiths explained. The flow of slick oil ruined their asphalt-tile floor, walls, rafters, furniture, appliances, heating plant and library, they alleged. And furthermore—they hadn't even ordered any oil.

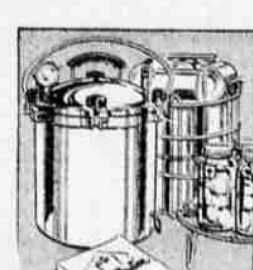
