Forest Products Report Notes Price Weakness

CORVALLIS — Douglas fir sawlogs showed signs of weakness in some areas of the Willamette Valley during the week ending June 14.
 Price cuts of \$2 to \$4 a thousand were reported in some localities, as the lumber market remained unsettled. Pulpwood also dropped \$1 a cord along the Columbia River. Other forest products were unchanged, according to the weekly farm forest products market report prepared from data supplied by the State Board of Forestry to the OSC Extension Service.
 Several mills in Clackamas County dropped second-growth prices \$2 to \$4 a thousand for No. 2 sawlogs. Prices at mills in this area range from \$40 to \$47.50 for No. 2's and \$36 to \$37.50 for No. 3's. Ceiling prices at river points are \$50 for No. 2's and \$40 for No. 3's. 8-foot logs continued in good demand at \$15 to \$18 a cord or \$35 to \$40 a thousand, with some foothills mills paying down to \$32.
 Old-growth ceiling prices in the northern and central valley were

\$42.50 for No. 3 sawlogs, \$52.50 for No. 2's and \$65 for No. 1's. Peeler logs were \$80 for No. 3's, \$100 for No. 2's, and \$110 for No. 1's.
 Pulpwood dropped to \$14 a cord for unpeeled Douglas fir, spruce, hemlock, and true fir at St. Helens and Longview last week, and the market was limited. Split and peeled Douglas fir, true fir, and hemlock were \$19 a cord and unpeeled hemlock and true fir were \$17 in a limited market at Oregon City. Unpeeled Douglas fir was \$15 a cord.
 Short poles and piling were in limited demand. Douglas fir barkie poles 50 feet and over ranged from 20% to 45 cents a lineal foot, depending on length and grade. 50-foot lengths were 20% to 28 cents a foot.
 Alder and ash ranged from \$34.50 to \$40 a thousand in the northern valley. Maple was \$40 and cottonwood was \$28 to \$30, with peeler logs at \$40. One mill at Salem paid \$35 for alder and maple.
 Dry cascara bark was 12 to 15 cents a pound.

 The bull, owned by Canine S. Dapin, a stock farmer, was killed.

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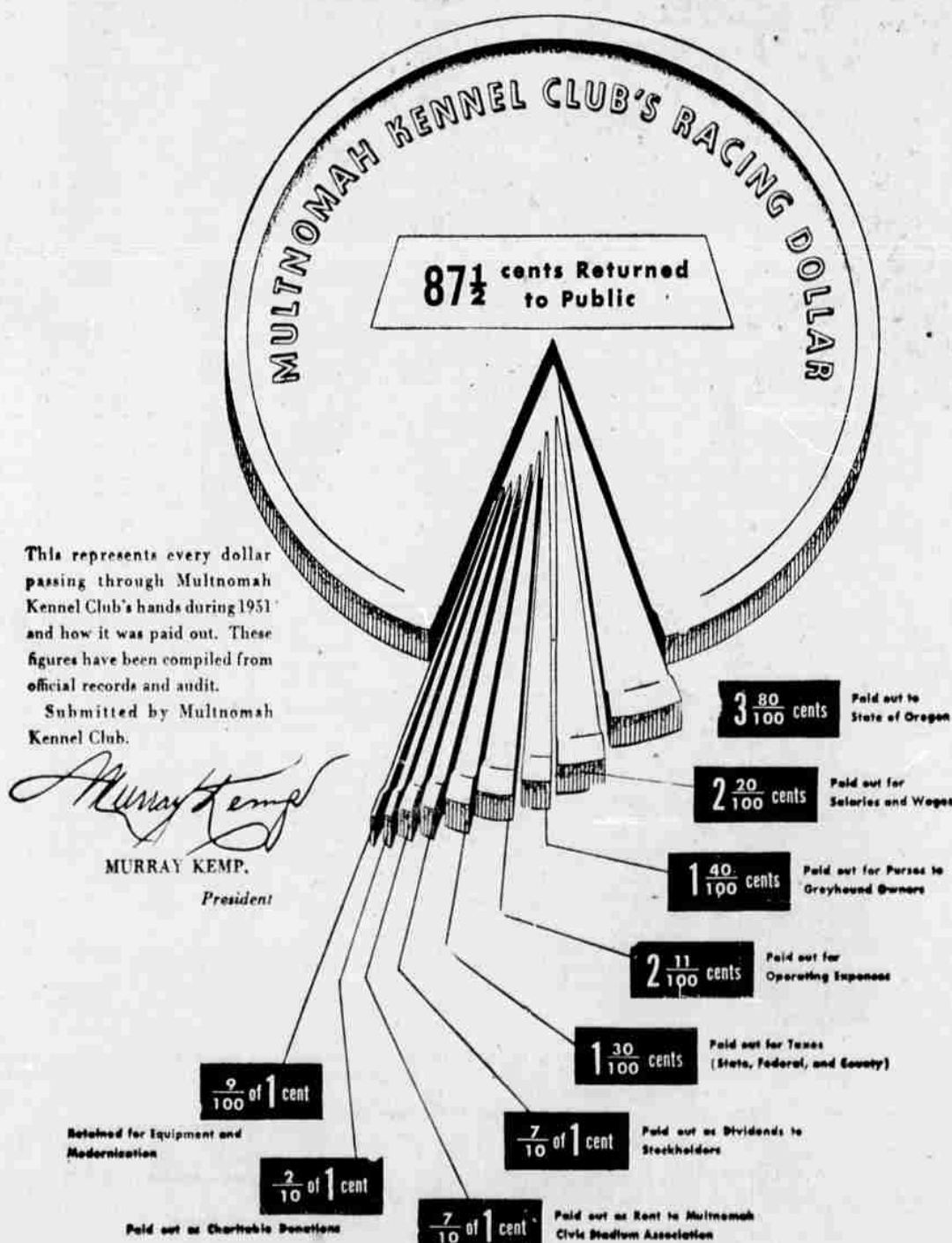
