Variable fishing prospects are on tap for anglers in Southwest Oregon, the Oregon State Game Commission reports in its weekly prospect summary.

Trout fishing is reported to be poor on central coastal streams. Some trout catches are being made with flies on central coastal lakes. Salmon fishing at Winchester Bay is also poor, with few fishermen out. Fair trout angling is being reported on southern coastal streams. But it is good on Floras Lake and on Lower Floras Creek.

Salmon angling is fair on the lower Rogue River. Trout angling is good in all major streams of the river. Best bites come from lures in the day and flies in the evening. Water is dropping and clear in all streams. Salmon fishing is good from Bybee bridge to McLeod.

The faded \$100,000 price tag that Portland's Freddy Sanford treasures among his major league souvenirs acquired a bit more midweek Wednesday night.

The one-time Yankee flinger was hit hard and jerked after three innings as Los Angeles notched a 4-3 Pacific Coast League win. Sanford was tagged for homers by Leon Brinkopf and Bobby Usher, plus a triple by Gene

Baker. A two-run four-bagger by Don Eggers was Portland's big blow.

The left-on-base department told the story. Portland had 11 runners stranded, Los Angeles only one.

Lefty Steve Nagy's two hitter gave Seattle a 2-1 victory over Oakland. The only blows off Nagy were Dave Mann's triple and Tookie Gilbert's homer, his eleventh of the season. Seattle's first score came when Bill Ayers

singled, then went all the way around on a hit-run blow by Nanny Fernandez that was bobbled in the outfield. A single and Rocky Krich's double in the seventh provided the winning run.
