Annual Fire School Dated By Foresters

Training In Suppression Methods Will Be Given At Wolf Creek Camp

The Forest Service will hold its annual fire school next week for lookouts, firemen and suppression crew members.

The school will start Wednesday at Wolf Creek camp, according to Ray B. Hampton, Forest Service fire assistant.

District rangers, district assistants, timber management personnel and road locators will meet at the camp earlier to outline procedures and discuss other matters.

The fire protection crew scheduled for this season in the Umpqua National Forest consists of 15 primary lookouts—five of them women—18 lookout—firemen, 11 firemen and 30 suppression crew men.

Four From Florida

Many of those signed up for the fire protection work are college students attending forestry schools throughout the nation. Four are from the University of Florida.

In addition to the week's school will consist of map reading, communications, spotting fire, fighting fires, and other matters.

Following the school, which lasts three days, the personnel will be placed in camps and lookouts throughout the forest, Hampton said. By June 28 the organization will be complete.

Some firemen have been placed in camp already.

Duties of the 15 primary lookouts will be to spot fires and report them by a high frequency radio network. In critical weather—either at times of hot and dry conditions or after a lightning storm—the primary lookouts will

Sale Of Shalimar Said Impending

Sale of a Roseburg night club, The Shalimar Room at 122 S. Stephens St., contingent upon state approval of license transfer, was disclosed today when articles of incorporation were filed with the county clerk and at Salem.

Incorporators for Shalimar, Inc., were listed on the papers as Sidney Leiken, president; Paul B. Hult, secretary-treasurer, and E. W. Paul, vice president.

The corporation was capitalized at \$40,000, divided into 400 shares of stock at \$100 each, according to papers filed with the county clerk.

Spokesmen for the group of Roseburg businessmen said they have purchased the interests of Eugene Krewson and Julius Benham. Only remaining formality is obtaining approval of the Oregon Liquor Commission for transfer of the license.

The sale also includes the adjoining cafe, spokesmen said.

3 AUTOS SET AFIRE

R. J. Henwood, manager for The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company in Roseburg since 1946, and J. S. McGuire, manager of the Grants Pass exchange, will trade jobs on July 1.

Announcement of the change was made today by R. B. Bacon, district manager for the company in southern Oregon.

McGuire started his telephone career as an outside representative at Klamath Falls in 1944. He was advanced to a supervisory position at Eugene in 1946, and placed in charge of the Grants Pass office the following year. With Mrs. McGuire and their two children, the new manager will take up residence here immediately.

Henwood, who joined Pacific Telephone as a salesman at Portland in 1936, has had a varied experience in telephone sales and service, including an assignment as manager of the communications center at Camp Adair prior to taking over the Roseburg post. He plans to move to Grants Pass as soon as he can be relieved of his responsibilities here.

Motorist Slain By Shot Intended For Another Man

GOLD BEACH, Ore. — A 27-year-old mill worker was shot dead Wednesday in a quarrel between two other men in northern Curry County.

A bullet struck Marius Christian Sorenson, 27, in the heart as he sat at the wheel of an automobile on the Sixes River road, 40 miles north of here.

A. D. Niemann, Port Orford justice of the peace, said a 64-year-old dairy rancher, James Kay Nodine, admitted the fatal bullet came from his carbine. Nodine is being held here.

Also involved was Clifford A. Shields, 29, lumber mill operator and employer of Sorenson. Shields said Nodine was trying to shoot him when Sorenson was struck. He said Nodine did not even know Sorenson. He gave this version:

Nodine was irate because Nodine's 14-year-old daughter had come to live with Shields, his wife and their four children. Sorenson was driving Shields to the mill when Nodine stopped them on the road 7 1/2 miles from the Coast Highway.

Nodine walked over to the car, cursed Shields and fired. Shields talked Nodine out of further shooting, then drove Sorenson to a Bandon hospital. Sorenson was dead by the time they got there.

Govt. Attorney Fired For Taking Fee In Tax Case

WASHINGTON — Attorney General McGranery says the firing of the U. S. district attorney for Kansas is just one step in a methodical housecleaning the Justice Department is conducting "in our own quiet little way."

McGranery, in office only three weeks, announced Thursday that federal Prosecutor Lester Luther, 63, had been dismissed by President Truman at his request because of evidence the Kansas accepted a \$2,000 out of a \$5,000 fee in a pending tax dispute case.

McGranery said a special grand jury will be called promptly at Topeka, Kan., to study evidence Luther shared in fees paid to another federal employee, Nicholas Lopez, for representing the Dolomite Company of Toledo in a tax case.

Luther told reporters at his Topeka home that he and Lopez shared in fees from the firm, but denied he had taken any money illegally. He said his dismissal came as a complete surprise.

Lopez, who resigned his job as a trial attorney in the Justice Department's criminal division May 9, would make no comment.

2-Day Rodeo Ready To Bow

Parade Will Mark Debut Of Big Show

Cowboys Of National Fame On Hand To Vie For \$5,000 In Prizes

Roseburg's two-day western celebration, featuring a big parade and rodeo, opens tomorrow.

Queen Bobette Huff and her court will reign over the parade, starting at 10:30 a.m., DST, Saturday, and the rodeo at 1:30 p.m., DST, Saturday and Sunday.

Rodeo princesses will be Rita Kruse of Yoncalla, Billie Jean Moss of Myrtle Creek, Pat Weber of Happy Valley and Donna Bashford of Garden Valley.

Sheriff O. T. Carter will crown the queen during grand entry ceremonies Saturday.

The Douglas County Sheriff's posse, sponsors of the rodeo, announced an additional feature of the grand entry parade.

Two descendants of the Umpqua Indian tribe will take part. Jasper Palouse, a relative of the late Chief Mace, and Jimmy Estabrook will ride in the parade in Indian regalia. Estabrook will wear one of the actual ceremonial costumes of Mace, last chief of the Umpqua.

Also taking part in the grand entry each day will be the sheriff's posse of Josephine and Lane Counties and members of several riding clubs in the area.

The parade downtown, sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, will form at the triangle on N. Jackson Street and go south on Jackson to Mosher, east on Mosher to Main and north on Main Street to the Courthouse, where it will disband.

Top Riders On Hand

Most of the top cowboys in the nation were already at the Fairgrounds today preparing to compete for \$5,000 in cash prizes offered in the six main rodeo events—bareback riding, saddle bronc riding, bull riding, bull dogging, calf roping and steer roping.

Novel entertainment to be featured will include the Roman fire jumping act by Louis and Bernadette Cabral and "Cy's Dilapidated Tailsin Wreck," a car that bucks and rears, throws flame and does a spin.

Famed rodeo clowns in the arena will include Bill Markley from the Sunshine Ranch and "Fearless" Felix Cooper.

There will be a lamb scramble Saturday for 4-H girls and a calf scramble Sunday for 4-H boys. The scrambles will be the concluding event on each day's program.

Champion riders due to take part in the rodeo include Casey Tibbs, Bud Linderman, Sonny Tureman, Eddy Akridge, Dave Mason, Ross Dollard, Dave Stout, Phil Rawlins, Dan Poore and Clay Carr.

Portland Bakers Settle Strike, Seattle Workers Still Hold Out

Portland's AFL bakers voted to end their 48-day strike, Thursday leaving Seattle alone in the Pacific Northwest without a regular supply of bread and other baked goods.

Portland bakers approved a contract providing a \$5 weekly wage increase, an employer-paid health and welfare plan, a cost-of-living escalator clause, and fringe benefits.

At the same time, Seattle bakers turned down an employers' offer which included some of the proposals accepted in Portland.

In another development, the AFL Teamsters Union announced it is withdrawing support of the strike. An editorial in the Washington Teamster, the union's official newspaper, called the strike "unreasonable" and charged the bakers have "reaped a harvest in fat overtime wages turning out products in small plants" while Teamster drivers were out of work.

The Portland agreement did not include Saturdays and Sundays off—the demand that touched off the strike against major wholesale bakers in Portland, Seattle, Tacoma and Spokane early in May.

Seattle bakers, however, continued to regard Sundays off as the main issue and voted 300-83 to stay on strike. The latest employer offer included \$2.80 premium pay for Sunday work, a company-paid health and welfare program, increased vacation benefits and Thanksgiving holiday off.

The Washington Teamster editorial said the demand for Sundays off was unreasonable and economically unfeasible. It said the Teamsters would "take whatever steps may be found necessary in the future to prevent a recurrence of this impossible dispute."

State Prison Fight Kills Convict, 17

Claude Worley Knifed To Death By Lifer Whom He Allegedly Attacked

SALEM, Ore. — A 17-year-old convict from Klamath Falls was knifed to death in a prison fight here Thursday. A lifer confessed but said it was self-defense.

The dead convict was Claude Worley who had been in trouble off and on since he was 12.

George E. Harwood, 58, serving life for murder, told State Police Lieut. Farley Mogan he slashed young Worley in self-defense. Harwood signed his statement of the fight and was taken to the city jail to await filing of charges by Marion County District Attorney E. O. Stadler Jr.

Worley entered prison last December accompanied by widespread comment on his offense and the punishment: He and five other Klamath Falls young men had been robbed and left for dead Gilbert Wick, 72, Wick recovered, though.

At the time Worley was on "Christmas leave" from the state training school. He and his companions got 10-year terms in a swift courtroom scene.

Worley suffered two knife wounds in the fight with Harwood. Dr. Homer Harris of the State

Adoption Of New Charter Voted On At Sutherlin

Sutherlin residents are voting today on a new city charter to replace the obsolete 41-year-old charter the city is now operating under.

Polls opened this morning at the city hall in Sutherlin at 8 a.m., standard time, and will remain open until 8 this evening.

Among provisions of the new charter is formation of the council-city manager form of city government. The new document, which voters are accepting or turning down at the polls today, is based on a model charter prepared by the League of Oregon Cities, according to City Supt. W. D. Bollman.

The present Sutherlin charter was adopted in 1911 and has since become obsolete because of conflicts with state laws, Bollman said. Such conflicts have resulted in difficulty holding elections and in handling street and sewer improvements, the city superintendent explained.

"It has made the procedures more cumbersome than they should be," he added.

Under the new charter, all city officers would be appointed by the city manager except the city attorney and the municipal judge. These would be appointed by the council.

Bollman estimated that about half of the provisions in the present charter are obsolete.

Superintendent M. C. Deller's hope for a bulky popular vote on the forthcoming District 4 school budget may be so wanting if the showing of last Monday's school board election is any indication.

This Monday, June 23, voters will go to the polls to pass or reject the \$494,303.78 by which the 1952 District 4 school budget exceeds the six-percent limitation. But the school board election, which covers the same area, drew out a total of only 338 voters to elect four members.

Deller has expressed a hope of a big turnout at the polls for the budget issue and has marveled the District's Parent-Teacher Association and the Citizens committee behind him in an effort to assure it.

The success of the organizations' efforts will be revealed Monday between 3 and 9 p.m., daylight saving time, when polls will be open in the five precincts.

The budget this year is a record million and a half dollars, but the voters will determine only the amount above the six percent tax limitation base.

The whopping size of the budget this year is the result of what Deller calls "unusual conditions" which have arisen since the last budget was passed. "He lists these conditions as (1) the addition of Wilbur, Melrose, Winchester and Riverside to the Roseburg district and (2) the 'up-awing in enrollment'."

He explains that supplies, teacher complements and redemption of bonds for the building program have followed on the heels of the increased student population. Also the cost of living for employees is reflected in salary raises.

He points out, however, that in spite of the hefty budget, the tax rate would increase only between one and two mills.

Timber Spraying Plane Crashes; Pilot Killed

PENDLETON, Ore. — A civilian pilot was killed Thursday in the crash of a timber-spraying plane in extreme northeastern Oregon.

A report to the Oregon state Board of Aeronautics identified the lone flier as Gust A. Hagberg, who came recently from California. His wife, who had been living in a trailer court at Wallula, Wash., was at Enterprise, Ore., when she learned her husband was killed. She collapsed and was under care of a physician Friday.

It was the first fatal crash this year of a spruce budworm spraying plane. Several spray plane pilots lost their lives in crashes in the past two years.
