Last Sermon Due Here Sunday For MacArthur

Rev. W. A. MacArthur, who assumed leadership of the First Methodist Church of Roseburg on July 3, 1945, will preach his last sermon Sunday, June 22, before being transferred to First Methodist Church, Twin Falls, Ida.

He announced his transfer to a stunned congregation on June 8. It was effected the previous week at the Idaho Conference of the Methodist Church.

"The Rim Of Your World" is the topic the pastor has selected for the morning service at 10:30 a.m. A potluck fellowship dinner and program, honoring the pastor and his wife, has been scheduled for 6 p.m. Sunday. There is to be no evening service, according to the church secretary.

The Rev. Mr. MacArthur has been in Portland this week attending the Oregon Conference of the Methodist Church. He plans to leave for his new pastorate on Monday, June 23.

This Year Was Climax

His seventh and final year as pastor was climaxed by a membership drive that passed the 1000 mark. During the Rev. Mr. MacArthur's ministry, membership has more than doubled. An intensified evangelism mission saw over 100 people unite with the church in five weeks. The budget increased \$79,000—from \$30,000 to \$109,000.

Coming to Roseburg from a two-year pastorate at Hermiston, Ore., he has also served at North Long Beach, Calif., Sherwood, Ore., and Lake Villa, Ill.

He was graduated from Linfield College in 1939 and the Garrett Biblical Institute in 1943. His experience included part-time instructor in art at Los Angeles Pacific College, assistant in the sociology department at Garrett Biblical Institute, part-time teacher at Hermiston High School and director of youth work and missionary secretaries for the Oregon Conference.

While in Roseburg he participated in numerous civic as well as religious activities. He served on the city planning commission from 1945 to 1948, was a member of the Kiwanis Club, is a Royal Arch Mason, served as president of the ministerial association and was selected as junior first citizen in 1950 by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Authored Three Books

The Rev. Mr. MacArthur was a member of a 15-man party that toured Europe for three months in 1948 in the interests of missions. He is reported to have made 110 speeches to various groups concerning his trip. He authored "A Youngster Goes To Europe," which describes his trip, and two works concerning the Bible.

Other highlights of his seven-year ministry include dedication of a new \$14,000 parsonage in April, 1947—which was designed by the pastor, continued enlargement of classroom facilities, rebuilding of the youth chapel, development of a program of craft work and social activities for young people, development of plans for a new educational building and possible new church edifice (plans of which were published in booklet form), purchase of a site near the new Fullerton School for possible future church development, and publication of two mimeographed books, in 1950 and 1951—"Come, Let Us Look At The Bible," and "The Development, Meaning And Purpose Of The New Testament." The first book helped in the training of church school teachers and others in the meaning of the Bible.

Swedes To Keep Neutral Status

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Traditionally neutral Sweden, irate over the shooting down of a Swedish plane by Soviet jet fighters, beefed up her already strong defenses against Russia Thursday but was expected to still fight shy of participation in such Western alliances as the Atlantic Pact.

The Swedish government already has ordered a step-up in air attack alertness throughout the country and instructed its Air Force and Navy to shoot back if fired on by Soviet planes. Neighboring Denmark also told its airmen to return fire if attacked.

Swedish Foreign Minister Oesten Unden, cut short his Italian vacation after the incident and was due here by air from Rome.

But political observers expressed doubt that Unden's return would result in any change in Sweden's long-held policy of "freedom from alliances." She has been a neutral in European wars for more than 100 years.

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
