Laboratory Site For Foot-Mouth Plague Is Poser

WASHINGTON (AP) — Communities usually clamor for 10-million-dollar federal projects but the Senate approved one Wednesday the government may have trouble finding a home for.

The sum was approved for a laboratory to investigate foot and mouth and other animal diseases. Some places already mentioned as sites have expressed downright hostility.

To prevent the laboratory from being located where it isn't wanted, the Senate bill provides the site must be approved by both Senate and House Agriculture Committees and by the governor of the state involved.

Sen. Mundt (R-S.D.), a sponsor of the project, said adequate safeguards will be taken to keep the laboratory from spreading the dread foot and mouth disease.

The last outbreak in this country occurred in California during the 1920's. But an outbreak in Mexico and another more recently in Canada have spread alarm among U. S. cattlemen.

Pigeon-Hole Parking Rapped By Architects

PORTLAND (AP) — The Oregon chapter of the American Institute of Architects has protested construction of pigeon-hole parking structures in downtown Portland.

In a letter to Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee, the architects called the structures made of exposed steel frames "blighting... ugly and ill-conceived." They added that the parking structures "immediately detract from the appearance of adjoining buildings and devalue the property."

One structure is now in operation here. Cars are driven into a frame at ground level and are carried to overhead stalls by elevators.

WAR EXPLOSIVES KILL KIDS

ROME (AP) — The Italian Society for the Prevention of Accidents estimates some 1,400 children, aged 5 to 12 are killed each year by aerial bombs, hand grenades, artillery and mortar shells, and mines left over from the last war. Another 7,000 annually are injured.

Vice-Presidency Offer Reported To Sen. Knowland

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The San Francisco Chronicle said Thursday Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) was personally offered the Republican vice presidential nomination by Sen. Robert A. Taft, if he would switch his support to the Ohioan for President at the GOP National Convention.

Vance Johnson and George de Carvalho, Chronicle Washington writers, quoted "excellent sources," otherwise unidentified.

Knowland would neither confirm nor deny a Taft offer, the Chronicle said, quoting him as saying: "Nobody can offer the vice presidency... In any case, the presidential nominee must be chosen first."

Knowland is a leader of the California GOP delegation pledged to support Gov. Earl Warren for President. He insisted "I am for Warren, period," the newspaper said.

"I will make no deal of any kind. I will not take part directly or indirectly in any effort to trade California's votes before the convention."
