This completes the first half play with Sutherland taking the first leg. If another team wins the second half, the two half winners will play off. If Sutherland wins again, it automatically takes the trophy.

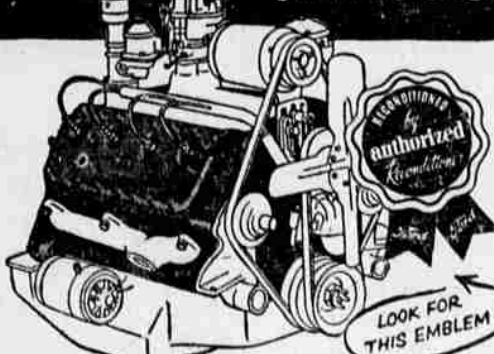
Rookie Medford Hurler Signs With Dodgers

Young Chuck Verrill again fast-batted the Sutherland Junior Legion team into submission Saturday afternoon at Sutherland to give Roseburg its third straight victory and a half-game lead in the local district baseball race.

Verrill held Sutherland to a miserable two hits, while his teammates were battering Bob Galla for 13 and an easy 6-1 victory. The well-played game saw each team commit only one error.

While giving up singles to Wayne Miller and Walt Moore, Verrill struck out 11 and walked only one. Only two men got to first in the first six innings. One of these reached the initial sack on Roseburg's only error.

Meanwhile, Steve Dancho, a former Sutherland, proved to be a handy teammate for Verrill. He put the Roseburg squad into the permanent lead in the second by powering a homer to right field. Dancho again figured in the two-run fourth when he doubled to score Jerry Parmeter after the latter had singled. Dancho scored seconds later on Sutherland's only error.

Two walks and a single by Fred Hargis added another in the sixth, but the Roseburg Legionnaires scored another brace in the seventh to virtually wrap it up. Again Dancho proved his worth. Jerry Parmeter tripled to bring in Dennis Brundage, who had singled. Parmeter came in on Dancho's long fly.

Sutherland's Jerry Blaylock was the only man to get past first. Verrill gave him the single walk on the Roseburg side in the seventh. He reached second on a wild pitch and came in on Wayne Miller's single.

For the first two innings, it ap-

peared that Verrill might repeat the no-hit performance he gave against Sutherland in their first meeting. He retired the first eight men to face him, but Moore ruined it in the third with his single. In the field, probably the most spectacular showing was made by Fred Hargis at second base. He made two magnificent catches to save Verrill from more hits.

Nests Approved By Wood Ducks

Wood ducks, the most colorful wildfowl inhabiting Oregon, have apparently shown great enthusiasm for a wood duck housing project sponsored by the game commission, and nearly 70 percent of the 250 nest boxes erected this spring in the Willamette Valley and Sauvie Island have been used.

Unlike other waterfowl, wood ducks nest in tree hollows. A shortage of these natural homes in wood duck haunts along lowland lakes and streams of western Oregon is believed to be limiting their population.

"Woody" houses are built of rough lumber 2 feet high and 10 inches wide. A 4 inch diameter hole serves as the entrance. A masterful flyer, the wood duck plummets into the entrance without ruffling a feather.

An incident illustrating the efforts of the wood duck to find housing is related by Al Hofmeister, biologist for the Sauvie Island game management area.

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Errors Give Victory Edge To Roseburg

The Roseburg Chiefs rolled to a 13-5 opening win at Brookings Sunday afternoon, but the squeaking 1-0 second half of the twin bill still has Manager Earl Sargent wiping away the cold sweat.

Bus Sporer gave up 10 hits, but a host of 6 Beaver errors allowed 7 unearned runs in the nine-inning opener. The Chiefs' 13-hit attack was led by newcomer Chuck Fisk, who blasted out a homer and a triple in four trips to the plate.

Ernie Velasquez, however, was the plate hero of the weekend. His monumental double in the first inning of the second game was the blow that defeated Jim Neiman, a Brookings import from Oregon State College. Young Neiman bowed into the Southwestern Oregon hurling loop by giving the Chiefs only three hits. Meanwhile, Mickey Cuen won the game after allowing eight singles. He scattered them through every inning but the last, but tight Roseburg fielding kept him out of the hole.

Threat Muffled

The big Roseburg run was set up harmlessly in the opening half of the game when Fisk walked with two outs. Brookings' Neiman wavered to give up two wild pitches and allow Fisk to reach third. That's when Clump Man Velasquez hammered a pitch to left center for the game's only run. Velasquez got the only other solid Roseburg blow when he singled in the sixth. George Sanders scratched a single in the seventh to wrap up his team's hitting.

Meanwhile, the Beavers were hitting consistently but not importantly. With the tight Chief infieling, only one host reached third base. He was First Baseman Vic Lapiner who singled off Cuen in the seventh. He was singled to third by Frank Burdell after two men were out. The threat died with the winning run on base when Bill Dranell lined out.

The errorless contest saw only Velasquez and Fisk get past first for the Chiefs. After the first inning, second base was the moon for the locals.

Koch Triples

The opening game was a breeze for the visitors, however. Although they capitalized on seven unearned runs, they earned the win with a six-run blaze in the fourth inning. It was that inning which saw Fisk reach his power peak at the plate. Hal Zuercher opened the frame with a single. Lovell Baker repeated the performance, and Bus Sporer scored Zuercher with a third single. Barney Koch kept the rally going with a triple and scored moments later on the sixth hit of the frame, a single.

Vic Lapiner was charged with the loss after allowing 11 hits. He was relieved in the sixth by Wally Maciel, who allowed three hits. The four runs off him in the seventh were all unearned, as were the first three in the opening inning of the game off Lapiner.

Brookings got in the scoring column in the fourth with a single tally. Frank Burdell highlighted the two-run sixth inning with a triple. Don Karns rapped a double in the ninth to bring in one of Brookings' two scores in that frame. Each man had three for four.

Wardens Saving Stranded Fish

Thousands of yearling steelhead migrating seaward down the Umatilla river are being salvaged near Echo in Umatilla county by a game commission crew and transported to safety now that low water conditions have cut off their escape.

A large rotary fish screen on Westland canal near Echo has been bypassing the game fish back to the Umatilla river, thus preventing their entrance to fields with irrigation water; but irrigation demands for water along the lower Umatilla river have practically dried the stream, and the fish are now being transported in fish tankers to the mouth of the Umatilla river.

A recent tally showed 10,800 yearling steelhead have entered the Westland canal by-pass. Also, 188 spawned-out adult steelhead journeying to the ocean have been counted in the by-pass. Large number of trash fish such as suckers and squawfish that enter the trap are removed and destroyed.

He blasted Bill Hanauska's second pitch for a mighty two-run homer over the center field 320 feet away. It was the third homer in the park this year. Others have been made by Beard and Roy Helsner.

Storey scored the third run in the third inning. He walked and scored a double by Drain's own Frank Jacobs. Bandon's only score in that first game came in the fourth on consecutive singles by Lee Shinn and Bill Burgher. It was unearned, however, since Earl Averill Jr., who scored, reached first on Don Kirsch's error. Roy Helsner gave up six hits in winning the contest.
