Lift Up Yanks

Larry (Yogi) Berra's ability to fill the departed Joe DiMaggio's shoes is the big reason why the New York Yankees are winging their way to their fourth successive American League pennant.

The slugging catcher, off to a ragged start due to a hand injury, has been hotter than a hundred degrees in the dugout during the past two weeks. As a result, the Yankees have swept both Cleveland and the Boston Red Sox into first place.

It was a four-bagger by Berra Sunday that snapped a six-inning scoreless duel between Billy Pierce of the Chicago White Sox and Bob Kuzay of the Yankees, and gave him the home run leadership of the league at 14.

Referee Gets Into Fight, Leo Loses For Roughness

But even Owen found a time that tried his soul. It wasn't so much the time as the person of unruly Leo Wallick. The Detroit devil lost the main event on unnecessary roughness as ruled by Referee Owen, but the story by which it hangs is a rip-story.

It began during the first fall when Owen brushed off one of Wallick's punches and let it go. Wallick won that fall from Toi Yamato with a back body press and cradle hold.

Wallick came back and sneeringly bowed to the Singapore Jap, before entering the ring to lose the second fall on one of Yamato's famous sleeper holds.

Wallick was able to do nothing but quiver as he lay on the canvas in his demoralizing trance. Owen tried to get Yamato to awaken Wallick, but the canny Oriental knew the Detroit wouldn't be about to shake hands after this one. He demurred. Finally, he used the magic touch to pull Wallick out and the fight was on.

Wallick roared to his feet, thumped Owen in the nose and hammered Yamato unmercifully before ending it with a piledriver. He left the ring with Owen dangling from the ropes and Yamato's prone figure stretched in the center of the ring.

Owen discussed the incident with the Wrestling Commission, which decided to give Wallick another chance. He immediately threw it away by surging into the ring and working over Yamato, still recovering from the piledriver. Owen stepped in and clinched the bout with a boxing match and free-for-all in which his shirt was torn off and Wallick was subdued by police reserves who swarmed into the ring. Owen peremptorily raised Yamato's hand as the winner of the match.

In the semi-final, time ran out before either Gordon Hessel or Jack Kiser could garner a clinching second fall. Hessel won the first with a head scissors and Kiser won the second with an Iron cross. Bullet Bob Cummings won the special event with a back flip and knee-action knee binder that finished Billy Melby just before the final bell.

Tooie Gilbert's two homers for Oakland in the first game provided more than the margin of victory and enabled hurler George Bamberger to win coasting.



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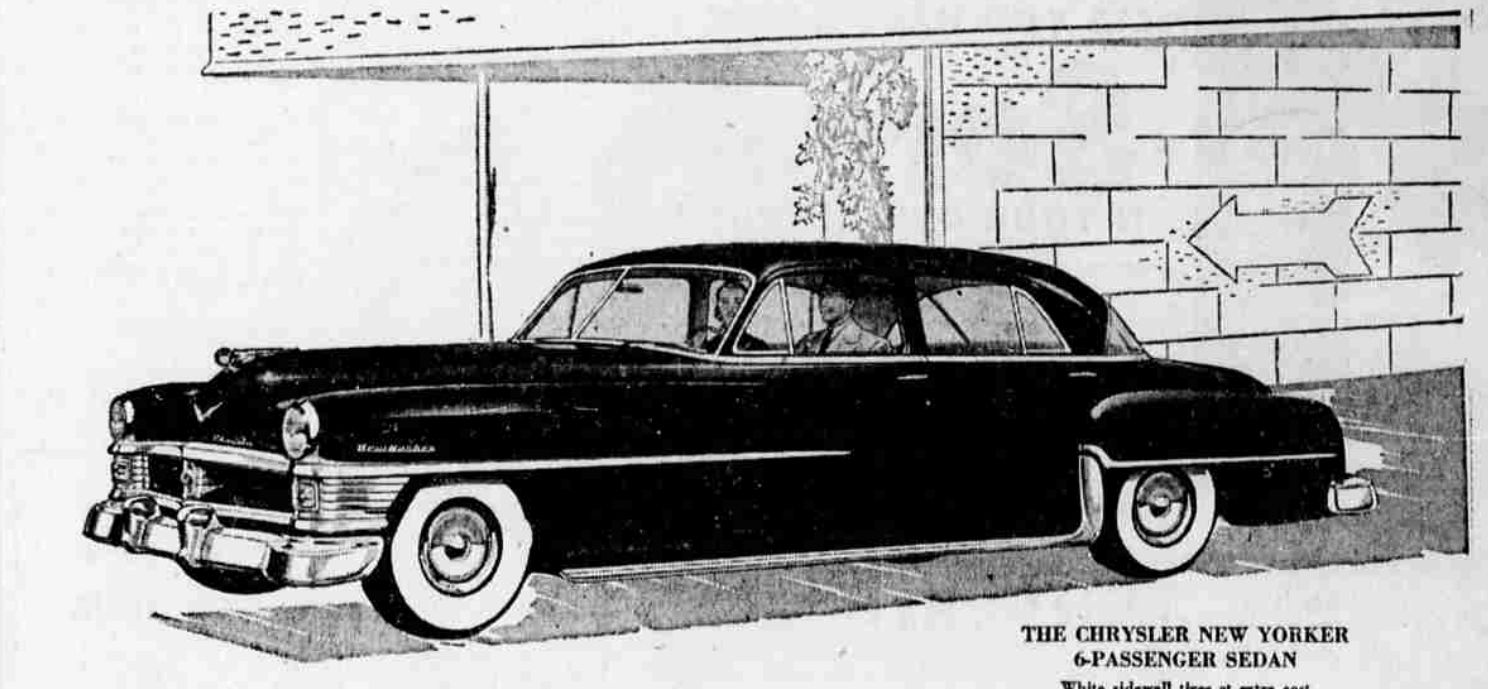
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
