The balloting was very light on the dist. 4 election for a school director in the Wilbur area bringing out only 13 voters.

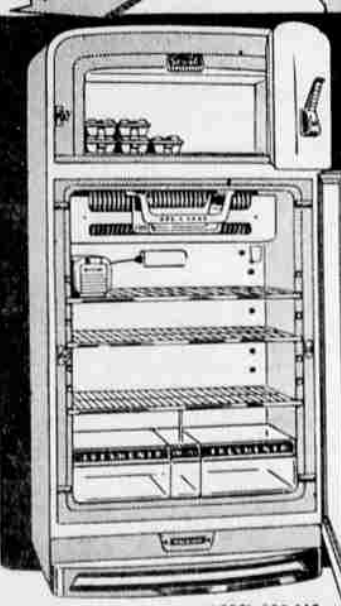


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SPOT ADVICE

WHAT TO DO ABOUT BLOOD STAINS

In the process of living, nearly all of us — man, woman, or child — at one time or another have "little" accidents. A scratch, a hasty or careless slip of the knife. Gardening, working around the house, or on the car, in the kitchen... whatever the circumstances of the place, accidents happen, and when they do, a blood stain on the garment worn at the moment is the result.

Blood, being albuminous and saline, requires digestion to remove its stain on a garment. A living substance, blood is perhaps as complex chemically as anything you might care to name.

Here are the suggested precautions:

As with nearly all stains, if the garment is washable, sponge or rinse out in CLEAR COOL WATER. Nothing else.

If the garment is a cleanable one, LEAVE IT COMPLETELY ALONE. And please tell us about the stains when you bring the garment in.

Above all try to bring a blood stained garment in as soon as possible after staining. The reason for this is that the sooner the garment is spotted and cleaned after the staining has occurred, the better the odds for getting the stain out completely.

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
