probably be a flat rate for homes and small businesses, and percentage of water use charge for large establishments, Gilchrist commented.

The total amount of the proposed budget now stands at \$448,370. This is an increase of \$93,023 over last year's figure of \$355,347.

Income Increase Noted

However, Gilchrist said, the proposed increase in taxes amounts to \$28,568 over last year, due to higher income from sources other than taxation.

Such income amounts to \$230,453 this year, while last year the figure was \$157,500.

The amount raised by taxes last year was \$197,347, while the proposal this year is \$226,415.

Based on an estimated 10 and one-half million dollar valuation, the tax rate would be 21.6 mills. Last year's rate was 19.9 mills.

The proposed budget provides for increased salaries in all departments. Part of the increase has already been made, while the budget provides for additional raises amounting to about \$35 monthly for most employees.

Frank Berks, 72, Former Roseburg Resident, Dies

Frank Berks, 72, died in Albany Monday after an extended illness. He had made his home there with his sister-in-law, Mrs. Hattie Berks.

Born Dec. 9, 1879, at Elkport, Iowa, Berks came to Roseburg in 1889, where he lived until 20 years ago. He moved then to Albany.

He was a retired Alaska Railroad employee. A Spanish War veteran, he was a private in Co. B, Second Oregon Volunteer Infantry.

Surviving are two sisters, Mrs. Anna Rainwater and Mrs. Laura Winniford, both of Roseburg; his sister-in-law, Mrs. Berks, and Nephew, George K. Berks Jr., Albany.

Funeral services will be held at Fisher Funeral Home, Albany, Wednesday at 2 p.m. with the Rev. Lester Jones officiating. Cremation will follow at Salem.

Other budget questions concerned the salary of county health doctor, set at \$7800. Members of the court explained this is established by the state, and the county has no choice but pay the salary, or discontinue receiving state aid for the department.

Sheriff Explains Aides

Sheriff O. T. Carter, in answer to questions concerning additional deputies, explained the county now has one civil deputy who does nothing but serve legal papers over the entire county, and three criminal deputies at the Courthouse. Resident deputies are located at Reedsport, Canyonville and Drain. The budget would supply a relief deputy for the two jailers, a deputy for police traffic at Winchester Bay, and another to be stationed part time at Diamond Lake in the summer and at Camas Valley in the winter.

There was discussion on county home and public welfare expenditures. In both the federal government pays a fixed amount, and the state and county pay the remainder on a 70-30 percent basis. The county is required to pay its share, the court members stated.

Question was raised on appropriation of expenses for an assistant county agent, J. Roland Parker, county agent, said the man would be provided by the state, and he would supervise forestry and grazing matters in the county, on purely an educational basis, and advise farmers where they can get their best returns for their lands.

Other questions of a minor nature were disposed of with minimum discussion.

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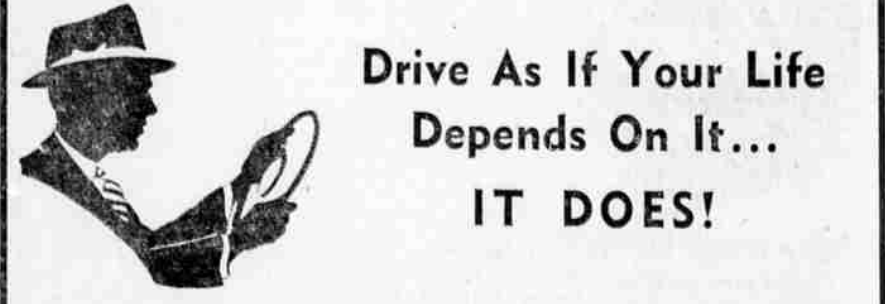
