Allies Protest Russian Barrier On Berlin Route

BERLIN, Germany (AP) — The three Western Allies charged in a note Monday that the Russians violated four-power agreements by restricting Allied use of the international highway to Berlin.

The American, British and French high Commissioners for Germany sent identical notes to Gen. Vasily Chuikov, Soviet commander in East Germany, demanding that the Russians lift a month-old ban on British and American military police patrols along the 110 mile highway leading from the Western zones through Soviet zone territory to Berlin.

The notes rejected as groundless a note from Gen. Chuikov of June 9 that such traffic patrols were "armed patrols" which could be banned for encroaching upon Russian authority.

"The sole purpose of these patrols . . . is to provide assistance where necessary to Allied officials and personnel traveling along the Auto-ban (superhighway) in case of motor trouble or other difficulty," the notes said.

Furthermore, the notes added, the recent Soviet restrictions "appear to be in clear violation of the four-power agreements of May 4 and June 20, 1949 (at the time of the lifting of the Berlin blockade) regarding access to Berlin."

The East German Communists, meanwhile, accused the West of violating the 1945 Potsdam agreement by permitting West Germany to make war weapons, including poison gas. The charge was carried in the official Communist press.

Blended Whisky Quality Blasted By Lawmaker

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Chelf, House spokesman for one of Kentucky's major bourbon producing districts, took a crack Monday at the distilling industry's cheap produce—whisky blended with grain alcohol.

"It's stomach flush," snorted the Democratic lawmaker. "It's nothing but an ulcer agitator."

The outburst came as a House judiciary subcommittee, headed by Chelf, heard a government expert testify that the whisky industry is putting out more blended than straight whisky.

Rep. Keating (R-NY) said he was unfamiliar with the products and wanted to know what blended whisky is.

"I'll tell you," said Chelf. "They aren't blended whisky at all. They are blended alcohols. You mix raw grain alcohol with a little whisky and sometimes you don't even get a color."

"You have to add caramel or prune juice to it to get the color of whisky. I guarantee you there isn't a moonshiner in Kentucky who can't outmix and outblend that stuff. It's a fraud on the American public."
