Auto Daredevils To Give Thrill Circus On July 7

The second annual International Championship open stunt Contest and the combined Joie Chitwood world champion Auto Daredevils thrill circus will appear at the Douglas County Fairgrounds in Roseburg at 8:30 p.m. July 7.

Competition in the contest will take place in crash-rolling stock cars for distance and consecutive rolls, broadjumping new 1932 sedans for distances of approximately 100 feet through space from one ramp to another, precision driving on two wheels, stock car steeplechase with only 1932 cars entered, and many specialty events. Competing in the contest will be 22 drivers from seven different countries who are members of the six team entries in the contest.

Beaucamp High In Rifle Shoot

The perennial winner, Harold Beaucamp, was high gun again Sunday in the invitational shoot with the Bay Rifle Club on the Roseburg range.

He captured a total aggregate of 375x400 in four events. Beaucamp won three merchandise prizes for first in aggregate, 500-yard slow fire and 200-yard off hand events. He had 97 in the off hand event and 94 in the 500-yard competition. His other two scores were 93 in the 200-yard rapid fire and 89 in the 300-yard rapid fire. Paul Robinson and Vern Orr tied for the second-place aggregate score with a 363, but Robinson had 26 VS's to Orr's 12 to tack down the runner-up spot.

Another first-place prize went to Roy Hill for his 94 score in the 300-yard rapid-fire event. Orr won the final prize for his top 94 score at 200 yards.

The top 10 aggregate scores were: Beaucamp 375, Robinson 363, Orr 363, Hugh Harrison 362, Bill Jones 358, Jack Gorthy 358, Roy Hill 353, Dean Paulson 350, W. E. Riesberg 335 and Knute Texell 325.

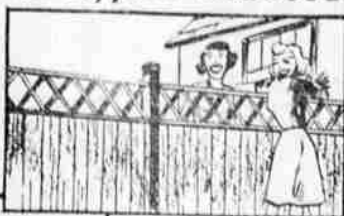

The two managers ask that the players be on hand at 7 p.m. for infield practice and batting warmups. They should bring their own gloves if possible. Both managers are quick to state that they can use more players. They may continue to sign up at the News-Review or with Earl Sargent with their ages and positions.

Meanwhile, the organization of the benefit game for the two 14-year-old Northwest champion skaters continues. At the latest report, the soft drinks for the concession stand had been donated by Schermer Brothers. Talented Drain Black Sox To Play Here On Twin Bill

The Roseburg Chiefs return to the local baseball pastures for the first time in three weeks this Saturday night and Sunday afternoon for the Southwestern Oregon League battle which has all the earmarks of being a "traditional."

The Chiefs host Roy Helser's Drain Black Sox. It's the first meeting of the intra-county rivals and probably the most enthusiastically expected. A good-hearted rivalry has always existed between the two Douglas County communities, but never has Drain been in a position to meet Roseburg on such even terms.

The Black Sox went all out to collect baseball talent for its entry into the rugged SWO League, and its success in the venture is reflected by its current undisputed leadership of the loop. This talent mentioned is highlighted by one of Portland's greatest former pitchers, Roy Helser. The 40-year-old southpaw took over the management of the Drain squad, and, as a sidelight, some of the pitching chores.

Coming with Helser to the Drain baseball kingdom was an array of professional and college stars which would be hard to beat in any loop. Leading this list is another Beaver, Harvey Storer. The "Big Horse", quit San Diego and joined the Black Sox club and has since been scouring the SWO League with his dynamite-laden bat. Still another former Beaver was Bill Beard, who made his debut in the Drain park by blasting a homer.

From college, the Sox picked up the Northern Division's top hitter, Ron Phillips, from the University of Oregon, and his coach, Don Kirsch. Both have aided the Drain club immensely.

The team draws two of its finest lights from the local scene, however. Jerry Cade came back to Drain under his college baseball tutor to make up the left-handed one-two punch with Helser on the mound. Frank Jacobson, another Drain product, balanced him as one of the top hitters.

Chiefs Get Two Top Baseball Stars Off Oregon State Team

The Roseburg Chiefs promoted a gold nugget over the weekend. Manager Earl Sargent reports that Oregon State's great outfielder, Dwane Helbig, will start with the championship squad.

Helbig is the catch of the duo if he continues the form he showed as a sophomore at OSC this spring. The six-foot, 195-pound outfielder was the only unanimous choice by coaches and publicity directors this year on the Northern Division All-Star team.

The 20-year-old Portlander's showing on the all-star vote was even more spectacular since it was his first year in Northern Division ball. He is considered a sure-fire professional prospect. He is a fine hitter and an outstanding defensive outfielder.

Cub Houck, who also comes to Roseburg this weekend, was a third baseman at OSC, but will probably be shifted to the Chiefs outfield when he plays. He has tremendous potential as he showed with his long-ball hitting with Myrtle Creek's semi-pros last year.

The big 185-pounder hit a batting slump with the OSC Beavers this spring, but Sargent hopes to bring him out of it for the summer campaigns.

These two additions to the squad will raise the number of men from the Pacific Coast championship team to four. Already in the fold are Bud Shirliff and Chuck Fiske. Shirliff, however, will not return to the Roseburg pastures for a month because of a military training commitment. Fiske bowed in for the Chiefs Sunday by banging a homer and a triple in his first game with the locals.

PORTLAND (AP) — Dick Hanen of Coos Bay and Pat Lesser of Seattle and Mrs. R. L. Borst of Portland led the field Tuesday as match play started in the 24th annual Oregon Golf Association championships.
