Funds To Widen Aid To Disabled Vets Available

Funds to provide automobiles for seriously disabled veterans and to pay indemnity claims to dependents of deceased servicemen were made available to the Veterans Administration in the third Supplemental Appropriations Bill signed by the President June 5. It was announced by the Portland VA regional office.

The bill provides the VA with more than \$285,000,000 for veterans benefits, including \$25,000,000 for automobiles and \$2,300,000 for servicemen indemnity claims.

Also included in the Bill are \$148,000,000 for subsistence and tuition payments for veterans receiving education or training under the G.I. Bill; \$60,000,000 for compensation and pension payments; and \$50,000,000 for extraordinary deaths under the National Service Life Insurance Act.

Funds to pay indemnity claims to dependents of servicemen and eligible veterans who died since the beginning of the Korean conflict have been exhausted since the latter part of April, 1952.

Under the Servicemen's Indemnity Act of 1951, servicemen on active duty on and after June 27, 1950, are automatically covered against death in active service in the amount of \$10,000 — less any National Service Life Insurance or U. S. Government Life Insurance in force at the time of death.

For those called to active duty for 31 days or more, this indemnity continues for 120 days after separation or release from service.

Because of the lack of funds, the VA also has held up payments on 6,287 approved applications (as of April 30, 1952) for automobiles or other conveyances for seriously disabled veterans under Public Law 387, 82nd Congress.

More than 1,500 other applications were pending on April 30 and the VA estimated that another 3,500 World War II and Korean veterans are eligible for the \$1,600 grant toward the purchase of a car.

VA regional offices will mail each veteran, whose application is approved, authorization to purchase his automobile.

The new automobile law, effective October 20, 1951, did not contain an appropriation. The \$25,000,000 just appropriated is the first money made available under this Act.

The law applies to eligible disabled veterans of World War II and those who served in the armed forces on and after June 27, 1950 — the start of the Korean campaign.

To be eligible for automobiles and other conveyances, these veterans must be entitled to compensation for any of the following service-connected disabilities:

1. Loss or permanent loss of use of one or both feet.
2. Loss or permanent loss of use of one or both hands.
3. Complete loss of sight in both eyes or permanent impairment of vision of both eyes to the degree as to constitute virtual blindness.

Bonus Recipients Of Oregon Given Instructions

The Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs has issued these words of advice to bonus recipients:

1. The state treasurer's office will not recognize the endorsement of a bonus check by any person other than the one to whom it is issued. Mrs. John Doe cannot take her husband's bonus payment to the bank for deposit unless John has signed it. The only exception is where John Doe gave another person power of attorney to endorse his check.

2. If John Doe's bonus check has been lost, destroyed or stolen, he should immediately write the bonus division in Salem, giving his name and address, his bonus application number, and including a statement as to whether he had endorsed the check or not.

3. If John Doe received a bonus payment of \$500 and thinks he was entitled to more than \$500, he should go ahead and deposit his check, then write the bonus division and explain fully why he thinks he should have received a larger payment.

4. If a bonus recipient has died before cashing his check, the nearest next of kin should return the check to the bonus division, and include with it a copy of the death certificate. If the recipient died in military service, the next of kin should include with the bonus check a copy of the armed forces official notice of death. This copy should be verified before any notary public.

5. The bonus check must be endorsed exactly as the name is drawn on the face of the check. For example, the next of kin of a deceased veteran will receive payment drawn "Jane E. Doe, surviving daughter of John Doe, deceased." She must endorse the check the same way.

All recipients of somebody else's check were asked to return these to the bonus division as soon as possible, to prevent delays in the receipt of their own payments.

Deputy State Treasurer Fred Paulus said Monday that about five per cent of the thousands of bonus checks being returned to the treasurer's office are endorsed improperly and must go back to the recipients for correction.

If John James receives a bonus check in which his name was misspelled, then re-sign it directly beneath, as his name should be spelled.

For Vice-President: MacArthur; That's Hint

With two weeks to go for the Republican convention, all 1,206 delegates named and the top contenders scrapping for presidential-nominating votes, a new note sounded Tuesday: MacArthur-for-vice-president.

Such a move reportedly was under discussion by some supporters of Ohio's Sen. Robert A. Taft, a front-runner with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower in the GOP presidential race.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur repeatedly has said he is not a candidate for any office.

But some Taft followers are understood to believe MacArthur would accept second place on the party's ticket if Taft got number one.

Retail Credit Group Meeting Tonight At 6:30

The National Retail Credit Association's Douglas County chapter will hold its monthly meeting at the Turn-Around Inn tonight at 6:30 p.m. Model letters with comments will be presented for discussion by members of the Credit Women's Breakfast Club. All members and interested potential members are invited, said V. Vivian Logsdon, publicity chairman.

In explaining the purpose of the association, Mrs. Logsdon said, "An organization such as the Douglas Retail Credit Association has a proven value to the entire community in which it exists, as well as to the participating members. Membership of a firm in the local association includes membership in the National Federation of Retail Credit Associations by a subscription to its magazine.

"On a local level it is a cooperative effort to amass credit information of incalculable value to those entitled to use it," she stated. "Contrary to common opinion, this credit information is not limited to derogatory information. Customers are often able to open an account with a new firm in a very short time because reliable information has been accumulated and is instantly available by having the cooperation of creditors through an organization such as this."

Attendance of members at meetings and participation offers educational advantages in the ever-growing problems of credit granting. Meetings create good-will among associates and serve as a mental up-lift in the discussion of common experiences, she said.

Mrs. Logsdon pointed out that "one business failure in a community affects many other businesses. To give the community a stronger credit standing is the common desire of every member.

"Credit granting is now recognized as a major phase of merchandising and as such is receiving the special study it requires to be properly expedited in the business. Credit managers will be able to help a customer to decide the exact amount of obligations he can assume and at the same time protect the customers' credit rating in his community."

The Associated Press tabulation of pre-convention delegate strength, based on avowed and conceded alignments, now gives: Taft 478, Eisenhower 395, others 129 and unknown 204.

North Dakota Republicans renominated Sen. William Langer at a primary Tuesday in which he was opposed by Rep. Fred Aandahl. Aandahl, who had been defeated in three previous statewide elections, conceded to Langer although less than half the ballots had been counted.

The Taft-Eisenhower race did not figure in the primary, but Aandahl claimed that Langer, who frequently votes with the Democrats, is closely associated with the Truman administration.

Langer was practically assured of being returned to the Senate for the third time as Democrats rarely win in North Dakota.

New Insurance Offered To Vets

Veterans with service-connected disabilities who were released from active service after April 25, 1951 are eligible for a special form of government life insurance from the Veterans Administration.

According to the VA, the insurance is available in amounts ranging from \$1,000 to \$50,000 and can be obtained on a five-year level premium term plan, ordinary life plan, 20-payment life plan, 20-payment life plan, 20-year endowment plan and endowment at age 60 and 65.

The disability must be one for which compensation would be payable by the VA.

Insurance must be applied for within one year from the date the injury or disability is determined to be service-connected, the VA said.

Veterans who have been in service since June 27, 1950, the day fighting began in Korea and who are interested in obtaining government life insurance are urged to contact the VA immediately after discharge. A time limit of 120 days from discharge for veterans who are not disabled makes that absolutely essential, the VA warned.
