The Padres, Pacific Coast League leaders for two months until Hollywood, the new league leader, was whipped 7-1 by Los Angeles and Oakland shaded San Francisco 1-0. The Portland-Sacramento game was postponed due to bad weather.

Veteran Al Widmar turned in a neat four-hit performance for Seattle. San Diego's Ben Flowers went 5-23 innings without allowing a safety, but then a single, Walt Judnick's triple, and another single made it 2-0. The Rainiers added the others in the seventh and eighth.

It was a pitchers' duel at San Francisco with Oakland's Bill Ayers coming out on top. Al Lien and his reliever, Bob Muncie, held the Oaks to two hits, while Ayers gave up three.

First Race May Be Run In August

Roseburg's auto racing enthusiasts will have a home by August.

This is the report of Larry Newport, who has filed articles of incorporation for a \$30,000 speedway in Roseburg, with three other local men. Named with Newport as signers to the incorporation papers for Roseburg Speedway, Inc. are J. W. Doyle, LeRoy B. Palmer and Paul B. Hult.

According to Newport, the speedway will be a 3.8-mile surfaced track, located about five miles east of Roseburg on the North Umpqua Highway. Dirt moving operations are expected to begin in about ten days. Newport stated the first race should be scheduled by the first of August. "We think we can make it by then," he said.

The original plan was to have the track-building work underway last month, but the plans were bogged for lack of a suitable location.

For seating arrangements, the new Roseburg Corporation will erect temporary bleachers. "Since we got such a late start this year, we won't be able to put up a roof," Newport reported. However, he pointed out that roof will be raised by next year. He also said that no lights could be secured for races this year. "We hope to have night races next year though," he said.

Surfacing material has not been decided upon yet, but Newport said it will either be oil penetration or black top.

The long-awaited speedway will serve as home base for Roseburg's Racing association, which currently has 30 cars on the roster. Newport added that at least 10 more cars will be added when dirt-moving operations begin.

He went on to say that racing would be primarily of the hardtop variety, but the menu will be varied by other types of races. Newport stressed the high interest in the track operation from other Oregon towns. "We've received inquiries from Coos Bay, Primeville, Sweet Home and Albany about our track," Newport stated.

"Racers from these towns will be tickled to death to come here to compete with our boys."

Paul Abeel has been named as general manager of the track.
