Geo. F. Brice, Portland Bank Executive, Dies

PORTLAND — Word has been received here that George Frederick Brice, 71, Portland and Seattle businessman and bank executive, died Wednesday in Pasadena, Calif.

He had gone there, accompanied by his wife and daughter, for a vacation.

Brice, one of the founders of the Multnomah County Bar Association, came to Oregon in 1900 and was admitted to the bar in 1903. He later became active in the loan business.

His widow, Margaret, a son and two daughters survive.

Glen Dodge, Canyonville Resort Builder, Dies

Glen W. Dodge, 65, former owner of Dodge Inn near Canyonville, died Wednesday, June 25, after a long illness.

Mr. Dodge was born July 22, 1886, in Brooks, Iowa. He was married to Stella Gwinn in Des Moines on July 22, 1909. He was a Chicago high school teacher for 27 years.

In 1928 he bought the site of the Dodge Inn and with the help of his father, Harry H. Dodge, built the original four log cabins, log store and filling station. Modern cabins were added later.

In 1935 he moved to this vicinity from Chicago with his wife and three daughters. He sold the Dodge Inn camp in 1942 and entered the merchant marine as a ship's carpenter, the career he followed until his illness.

Surviving are his widow, Stella, and three daughters, Mrs. Frederick Wickert of East Lansing, Mich.; Mrs. Leslie Albright of San Francisco, and Mrs. Arthur Howie of El Cajon, Calif.

Funeral services will be at 2 p.m., DST Saturday in the chapel of the Ganz Mortuary, Myrtle Creek, with the Rev. O. L. Kendall of the Canyonville Methodist Church officiating. After services the remains will be taken to Grants Pass for cremation.

Douglas Cases Of TB Checked

A total of 156 cases of possible tuberculosis are being checked and followed as a result of the Douglas County X-ray survey early this year.

Dr. E. J. Waincott, county health officer, said the 156 cases miniatures X-ray negatives turned out in the chest X-ray program this year.

Of the total X-rays, some 800 to 900 retakes on large negatives were taken because of technical difficulties, suspicion of disease or other reasons.

Eighty-two active cases of tuberculosis are on the health officer records at the present time, Dr. Waincott said. He pointed out that the 156 cases of suspected tuberculosis probably also include a number of those presently being followed as active TB cases.

The discovery of 156 suspected cases, Dr. Waincott said, is "about average" according to the number of X-rays taken.

The suspected cases have been referred to private doctors, and are also being watched by the health department.
