41st Division Second To None, Praise
Given At National Guard Maneuvers

FORT LEWIS, Wash. (AP) — The Fort Lewis Jungleers, or the Butchers as Tokyo Rose called them, are almost ready to fight again, and they rate at the top of all the National Guard divisions in the United States.

That's the opinion of the two men who should know as much about it as anybody does. They are Col. Marcel Cromber, instructor of the Oregon National Guard, and Col. Don Riley, instructor of the Washington National Guard.

Both are regular army officers from the Sixth Army, which embraces the Far Western states. They are the men who teach the citizen soldiers of the National Guard units of the two states.

The Jungleers, who inched their way to glory up the coast of New Guinea to the Philippines in some of the toughest fighting of World War II, are the men of the 41st Division, which consisted of 5,500 guardsmen from Washington and Oregon.

The division is winding up its annual two weeks' training here.

Top Praise Given — Col. Cromber said the Oregon National Guard rates "second to none." Col. Riley said that's right, but the Washington National Guard is just as good.

The exact strength of the 41st Division is a military secret, but it's about 5,500.

A full division has about 18,000 men. If the 41st were sent to war, it would have to get 12,000 or so more troops, probably draftees.
